<u>Second Reading</u> – A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians - I Corinthians 12.1-11

Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. You know that when you were pagans, you were enticed and led astray to idols that could not speak. Therefore, I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says, 'Let Jesus be cursed!' and no one can say 'Jesus is Lord' except by the Holy Spirit.

Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John 2.1-11

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.'

Now standing there were six stone water-jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, 'Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward.' So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, 'Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.' Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

Father Michael's Diary

14 JANUARY 2022 WHAT A SWELL PARTY THIS IS

Perhaps you remember that catchy number from "High Society"? Well parties seem to be in the news now. We have just emerged



from what is sometimes called the party season – the time of the year in the run up to Christmas when all sorts of firms, voluntary organisations, and, yes, Civil Servants, feel it is incumbent upon them to put on some social event when people can get together and socialise freed perhaps a little from conventional restraints of the working environment. On balance that is perhaps no bad thing, parties enable people to relate to one another as people and not as bosses and staff or employers and employees. They help to make the wheels of commerce, industry and government go round. Although I never worked in Downing Street I did spend a number of years in a similar environment and must confess to some sympathy with the staff involved

The word party has several meanings besides a social gathering. We talk of working parties, political parties, parties in a legal action to mention just a few. What unites them is that they all speak of people coming together to do things: mark a significant event, carry through a programme of work, change society, and settle a legal dispute. What they all point to is that as human beings we are not much good on our own; people need people. We need one another in countless ways to achieve anything.

And that goes for the church too: we are community, a party. The Greek philosopher Plotinus may have described life as "the flight of the alone to the alone" but nothing could be further from the truth. In our Judeo-Christian context the Old Testament is the story of a community, the Jewish community from their experience of salvation at the Red Sea and God's judgement in the exile in Babylon and beyond. The New Testament records the foundation of a new community the Catholic Church, the community, the party of which we are members today, perhaps the most "swelegant, elegant party" of all!

The Church is here to bring in the Kingdom of God, we are if you like, the Kingdom of God party but we cannot attain our objective unless we all work together. So its vitally important that every congregation should not only strive to achieve a sense of corporate identity it should also see itself as part of a greater community, a greater party – the Deanery, the Diocese, the Province and, ultimately, the world.
