First Reading

A reading from Paul's second letter to the Corinthians:

So we are always confident, even though we know that as long as we live in these bodies we are not at home with the Lord. For we live by believing and not by seeing. Yes, we are fully confident, and we would rather be away from these earthly bodies, for then we will be at home with the Lord. So, whether we are here in this body or away from this body, our goal is to please him.

For we must all stand before Christ to be judged. We will each receive whatever we deserve for the good or evil we have done in this earthly body.

Either way, Christ's love controls us. Since we believe that Christ died for all, we also believe that we have all died to our old life. He died for everyone so that those who receive his new life will no longer live for themselves. Instead, they will live for Christ, who died and was raised for them. So we have stopped evaluating others from a human point of view.

At one time we thought of Christ merely from a human point of view. How differently we know him now! This means that anyone who belongs to Christ has become a new person. The old life is gone; a new life has begun!

This is the Word of the Lord Thanks be to God.

Gospel

He also said, "The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come."

He also said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples.

Could we remind everyone of the following:

CATHOLIC AND REFORMED

The Church of England has always claimed to have a foot in both camps, catholic and reformed and for its distinctive

spirituality arises out of the tension between them. It is easy in this age of religious pluralism to underestimate what a great upheaval the reformation was. In the west (i.e. Europe) there was up to the 16th century only one church which since the time of the Emperor Constantine (272-337) has ruled supreme in matters of faith and civic order, kings and emperors were subject to its authority. Now that authority was challenged and, in some cases, completely swept away. The invention of printing had made the scriptures widely available, and the church was replaced by various forms on Bible based religion much of which aimed to return to the practice of primitive church of the apostles. This was the aim of the puritans who aimed to return the church to what they saw as its original purity.

In general, the Church of England did not go down this route, instead it retained three salient features of the pre-reformation church: the creeds, the threefold order of bishops, priests and deacons and the dominical (established by our Lord) sacraments of baptism and the eucharist. This enabled the Church of England to claim as it does to this day that it is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic church.

Of course, the reformation left its mark on the newly formed Church of England, with a much greater use of the Bible in its services and services in English, but especially in regard to the eucharist. At the time debate raged over what the eucharist was and in rejecting much of the traditional doctrine the Church of England did not have much to put in its place and ended up in its form in the final prayer book of 1662 with something which has always struck me as an ecclesiastical Burns' Supper - but dedicated to the immortal memory of Jesus Christ.

But of course, there is far more to the eucharist than that and gradually over the last 200 years a greater depth of meaning has been recovered while at the same time the rest of catholic Christendom has recovered the greater use of the Bible and moved to worshipping in English (and other languages) so these two parts of the catholic church have moved close together.

Singing hymns and spiritual songs...

For my hymn this week I'm diving into the resources offered by our 800 book. I find this an interesting

collection of hymns and songs which fall into three broad categories: firstly worship songs originating from free and Pentecostal churches mostly written several decades ago; secondly, songs which through popularity have been adopted by the wider church and subsequently included in contemporary hymn books. Thirdly, contemporary hymns which follow the traditional format and are generally sung to well-known tunes. Some may say that the 800 book is well overdue for a re-vamp but that is a discussion for another day, one in which I will only participate in once I have donned full body armour and a tin hat!

Our Gospel reading this Sunday taken from St Mark's Gospel speaks to us about how we should think of the Kingdom of God and how faith of a seemingly tiny and insignificant proportion can grow into something far more substantial and meaningful. The hymn I have chosen falls into the third category I mentioned earlier: "For the fruits of his creation" by Fred Pratt Green (1903 – 2000). Fred Pratt Green was born in Lancashire, became a Methodist Minister and was awarded a CBE. He had written a few hymns during his ministry but it was not until he retired in 1969 that his output became prolific. He rejected fundamentalism and concerned himself greatly with social issues. Many of his hymns were written to provide for the liturgical needs of the modern church speaking to topics or appropriate for events for which there were few traditional hymns available. His obituary in *The Times* of 24 October 2000 quoted him on the subject of hymn singing as saying, "It's such a dangerous activity ... you get this glow which you can mistake for religious experience".

The tune we use for this is "All through the night", the traditional Welsh tune. However, where this hymn has been included in recent hymn books, Frances Jackson's great tune "East Acklam" is more frequently used. Dr Francis Jackson CBE (b. 1917) has a life-long association with Yorkshire, having been born in Malton, sung as a boy at York Minster under Sir Edward Bairstow and was himself organist and Master of the Choristers at the Minster from 1946 – 1982, succeeding Bairstow. He is a much loved figure in church music, having written a number of pieces for choir and for the organ. Happily, he is still with us and still living in his beloved Yorkshire.

For the fruits of His creation, thanks be to God; For the gifts to every nation, thanks be to God; For the ploughing, sowing, reaping, Silent growth while men are sleeping, Future needs in earth's safe keeping, thanks be to God!

In the just reward of labour, God's will is done; In the hop we give our neighbour, God's will is done; In our worldwide take of caring For the hungry and despairing, In the harvests men are sharing, God's will is done.

For the harvests of His Spirit, thanks be to God; For the good all men inherit, thanks be to God; For the wonders that astound us, For the truths that still confound us, Most of all, that love has found us, thanks be to God!
