### **First Reading**

But we have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us. We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be made visible in our bodies. For while we live, we are always being given up to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus may be made visible in our mortal flesh. So, death is at work in us, but life in you.

But just as we have the same spirit of faith that is in accordance with scripture— "I believed, and so I spoke"—we also believe, and so we speak, because we know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and will bring us with you into his presence. Yes, everything is for your sake, so that grace, as it extends to more and more people, may increase thanksgiving, to the glory of God.

So we do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal.

For we know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. For in this tent we groan, longing to be clothed with our heavenly dwelling— if indeed, when we have taken it off, we will not be found naked. For while we are still in this tent, we groan under our burden, because we wish not to be unclothed but to be further clothed, so that what is mortal may be swallowed up by life. He who has prepared us for this very thing is God, who has given us the Spirit as a guarantee.

### Father Michael's Diary

ENGLISH SPITIUALITY

We saw last week how Anglicanism spans the divide between Catholic and Protestant there is something else which makes Anglicanism unique and that is the character of English spirituality. In his 1963 study the theologian Marin Thornton identified six characteristics which distinguish English Spirituality. They are:

- 1. a union of heart and head prayer, worship and the whole of life must be grounded in sound theological teaching with little room for the ecstatic or the spectacular.
- 2. the unity of the church the Book of Common Prayer was meant to be just that a form of worship suited equally to the parish church, a monastic basilica, a college chapel, and a family home.
- humanism and optimism the conviction that, in Julian of Norwich's words, all shall be well because whatever befalls us God will sustain us
- 4. a firm liturgical foundation built of course on the Book of Common prayer and now on Common Worship.
- 5. the practice of habitual recollection a continual awareness of Christ's presence in daily life unifying worship and work
- 6. spiritual direction helping people to find God in their daily lives by responding to what life brings rather than applying some form of spiritual discipline.

English spirituality may seem rather difficult to pin down, it's more a question of you know it when you see it, but its expression is a vital characteristic of Anglicanism. It may strike you as rather dour and unemotional but that reflects the English character generally, but that is not the whole story. The spirituality of Julian of Norwich for instance is full of joy and love. This distinctive spirituality should inform and influence not only the worship but also the daily lives of all our people.

### Singing hymns and spiritual songs...

Back to the green hymn book this week for a hymn to complement our Gospel reading from St. Mark. Jesus,

asleep on board a boat crossing the Sea of Galilee is woken by his terrified disciples as they are caught in the grips of a sudden storm. Jesus' love and care for his friends in calming the storm and saving them must have been in the thoughts of a multitude of seafarers across the centuries as they faced the peril of a raging storm. The hymn "Eternal Father, strong to save" was written in 1860 by William Whiting (1825-1878) who was an English writer and poet. He was educated at Winchester College and eventually rose to become master of Winchester College Choristers' School. "Eternal Father" is his best-known hymn, inspired by the words of Psalm 107 (They that go down to the sea in ships) and is most frequently associated with Remembrance and the Royal Navy. The hymn has also been adopted by other branches of the armed services in the UK and the US and the text of the hymn has been adapted and extended accordingly. The tune most usually associated with this hymn is Melita by John Bacchus Dykes, a noted author and priest, remembered for having written over 300 hymn tunes including Dominus regit me, the tune set to the hymn "The King of love my shepherd is".

Eternal Father, strong to save, Whose arm hath bound the restless wave, Who bid'st the mighty ocean deep Its own appointed limits keep; O hear us when we cry to Thee, For those in peril on the sea.

O Christ, Whose voice the waters heard The winds and waves submissive heard, Who walkedst on the foaming deep, And calm amidst its rage didst sleep; O hear us when we cry to Thee, For those in peril on the sea. O sacred Spirit, who didst brood Upon the chaos dark and rude, Who bid'st its angry tumult cease, And gavest light and life and peace; O hear us when we cry to Thee, For those in peril on the sea!

O Trinity of love and power, Our brethren shield in danger's hour; From rock and tempest, fire and foe, Protect them wheresoe'er they go; And ever let there rise to thee Glad hymns of praise from land and sea.
