Father Michael's Diary



19 February 2021

A couple of weeks ago I wrote about establishing a Rule of Life if you have been thinking about this you may have been considering where prayer fits in with this, so are some pointers to get you thinking.

Why? The basic purpose of prayer is to establish a personal relationship with God. This is one of the essentials of the spiritual life. There is no substitute for it. The relationship we need to cultivate needs to be unique, a close personal one. It needs to develop and grow as we develop and grow spiritually. It needs to right for you and your personality, as they say "pray as you can, not as you can't". Although formal prayer and liturgical worship should be parts of our prayer life, they are less important than the cultivation of that unique relationship with God which should undergird our whole spiritual life.

When? Prayer must be regular, so we need to pick a time of day when we can be reasonably sure we shall be able to devote the necessary time (between a quarter and a half of an hour) without distraction or interruption. The best time of day depends on what sort of person you are. If you are a morning or an evening person then one of those may be the most suitable time for you. Last thing at night is not to be recommended as we are almost always too tired then. We also need to take account of the routines and habits of those with whom we share our lives.

Where? We need somewhere quiet, comfortable and free from interruption. Jesus went to desert places to pray – where do we find the desert places in our lives? Some people have a whole house or flat at their disposal, others may only a have bedroom or possibly a spare room. Ideally the space should not be used for any other activity so that going there puts you immediately in a prayerful state of mind. The place should be comfortable, including warm enough, as being physically comfortable is an important preliminary to opening our souls to God.

How? There are a number of elements to prayer and formal prayer, "saying our prayers", is just one of them. Remember that the main purpose of prayer is to cultivate a close personal relationship with God and there are a number of ways of doing that: lectio divina, imaginative contemplation, meditative prayer among them and I shall be describing some of them in the following weeks.

Singing hymns and spiritual songs... A weekly roundup from Ian Brentnall

Father Michael reminded us a couple of weeks ago that the word Lent refers to the Spring season, having its origins in a shortened form of the old English word "Lencten". Such is the extraordinary diversity and extremes of the British weather that we have gone from unseasonably cold to unseasonably mild within the space of two weeks, spring bulbs are erupting into life and our thoughts may be turning from the dark days of winter towards sunnier and happier times ahead.

This Sunday our Gospel reading from that of St. Mark reminds us of our Lord's baptism and his temptation in the wilderness. Although more usually sung at Whitsun, the hymn "Come down, O Love divine" is also appropriate to our theme this Sunday. It was originally a poem by the Italian mystic Bianco da Siena (also known as Bianco di Santi) who lived c. 1350 – 1399 (or possibly 1434). Being part of a company of itinerant Jesuits he eventually settled in Venice. His poem "Discendi amor santo" was translated at the beginning of the 20th century by Richard Frederick Littledale into the form we are familiar with today. The popularity of the hymn was enhanced when Ralph Vaughan Williams set the words of the hymn to his tune "Down Ampney" in 1906, taking its name from the village in Gloucestershire in which Vaughan Williams was born in 1872.

1 Come down, O Love divine!
Seek thou this soul of mine
And visit it with thine own ardour glowing;
O Comforter, draw near,
Within my heart appear,
And kindle it, thy holy flame bestowing.

2 O let it freely burn
Till earthly passions turn
To dust and ashes in its heat consuming;
And let thy glorious light
Shine ever on my sight,
And clothe me round, the while my path illuming.

3 Let holy charity
Mine outward vesture be,
And lowliness become mine inner clothing;
True lowliness of heart,
Which takes the humbler part,
And o'er its own shortcomings weeps with loathing.

4 And so the yearning strong,
With which the soul will long,
Shall far surpass the power of human telling;
For none can guess its grace,
Till he become the place
Wherein the Holy Spirit makes his dwelling.
