Opening Prayer

Psalm Today:

First Reading

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt – a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the Lord. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, 'Know the Lord', for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the Lord; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Gospel

Among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, 'Sir, we wish to see Jesus.' Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honour.

'Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say — "Father, save me from this hour"? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name.' Then a voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again.' The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, 'An angel has spoken to him.' Jesus answered, 'This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgement of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself.' He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

That is why the diocese is focusing the Bishop's Lent Call this year on food insecurity, both here in the Diocese and in our Link Dioceses.

Could we remind everyone of the following:

Coronavirus is highly infectious. Older people and those with underlying health problems are at increased risk of severe illness and potentially death

It is critical that we follow strict rules if we wish the church to remain open

- 1 Everyone must wear a mask properly unless they have a compelling reason not to do so and must sanitise on entry to and departure from church
- 2 Spacing is critical, please do not huddle together and please keep 2m apart unless you are in a bubble, sit on chairs which have a green square on them

- 4 Windows need to be open, as does the back door

A message from Gill Sharpe

I have been (slowly!) working through the church library which, as you probably know, has been very much enlarged by the legacy of Douglas and

Sandra Walford, to weed out books which now need a new home.

I have delivered the first lot to Book Aid and received the following letter from the Director. I thought the congregation would like to see it, as I will certainly be asking them for spare bibles (see last paragraph).



Dear Gillian

Thank you for your phone call today and I hope that you manage to drop off the boxes of books successfully! Book Aid has been closed during this recent lockdown hence the lack of a response recently. However we are poised waiting for the go-ahead to reopen, unsure, of course, when that will be!

We are always grateful to receive good books to send abroad on our programme. Last year we sent approx. 400,000 in shipping container loads to our partner bookshops in Kenya, Ghana and Nigeria which help to maintain Christian bookshops in those countries. The ministry is founded on the principles of making books available 'at locally affordable prices' so that the shops can support themselves and last for many years.

The next country we will be packing for is Zimbabwe although they are in such need that they have asked us for half the shipping container to be filled with Bibles. We know that humanly speaking this is just not possible so we have to trust God to provide. Would St John's 'Spread The Word' about this for us? There is some urgency and Bibles in usable condition would be a real blessing.

Father Michael's Diary

DOORS TO HEAVEN

If you visit a Greek Orthodox Church you will find the layout rather different to what we are used to. The altar for instance instead of being the most prominent feature is hidden away behind a screen, a screen made up of pictures. Only they are not



pictures, they are icons and the screen is the iconostasis. Icons are most distinctive feature of Orthodox Christianity and as well as in churches every orthodox home will have its icon corner, the place of prayer in the house.

Icons are pictures, but very stylised pictures. The subject matter varies enormously but each subject is always represented in the same way, for instance all icons of the Transfiguration have the same design, but interpreted in slightly differently by each iconographer, for whom the preparation of the icon is at every stage an act of prayer. The image is reduced to a minimum of details and the perspective is distorted so that lines move toward rather than away from the person at prayer before the icon thus drawing them into it.

An icon is an instrument for the transmission of Christian tradition and faith, an aid to mental prayer and a means by which through sacred imagery the Holy Spirit speaks to the believer. Wherever an icon is set that place becomes more easily a place of prayer. An icon is not an end in itself but assists the believer in in going beyond what can be seen with our physical eyes into the realm of mystical experience. An icon is a door to heaven.

Orthodox Christians pray generally standing before the icon with their eyes open, waiting to be drawn towards the person or scene represented. Standing before an icon the believer stands in the presence of God. Like lectio divina and imaginative contemplation icons are an aid to mental prayer, icons draw us into the life of the Trinity. The internal dynamic of the Trinity is love and it is into that love we are drawn. What matters is love, love of God, love of others, even love of our enemies.

<u>23 March</u> – Tuesday – day of reflection on the first anniversary of the first coronavirus lockdown - John 11.45-end – the raising of Lazarus – that we may be raised to new life in the Spirit

24 March – Wednesday – Daniel 3. 14-28 – the burning, fiery furnace – for God's protection

<u>25 March</u> – The Annunciation of Our Lord to the Blessed Virgin Mary – Luke 1.26-38 - "Here am I the servant of the Lord" – that through our lives Christ may come again into our world

<u>26 March</u> – Friday – John.8.51-end - before Abraham was, I am-thanksgiving for Christ the eternal high priest.

27 March - Saturday - John 11.45-end.

Singing hymns and spiritual songs... A weekly roundup from Ian Brentnall



The vernal Equinox is upon us. We are marking the transition from winter to spring and can now look forward to daylight hours exceeding those of the night. As if with a great sigh of relieve and renewed vigour, our gardens and woodlands are showing signs of abundant new life bursting into view. Even my Rhubarb is looking great!

Today is Passion Sunday marking the start of that period in the Church's year known as Passiontide. After the brief, moment of relief from our Lenten disciplines in the form of a day of refreshment last Sunday, our observance of Lent now takes on a different pace. During the next two weeks, we are invited to focus upon the journey to the cross and to look afresh at the familiar events of Holy Week. In our Gospel reading this morning, our Lord speaks of the time when He will be lifted up to heaven, drawing all mankind to himself. A much-loved hymn that speaks to us of that most awful road to the cross is "My song is love unknown", written by Samuel Crossman (1624 – 1683). Crossman was born in Suffolk and educated at Cambridge. He was an Anglican priest with heavy puritanical leanings. After the 1662 Act of Uniformity he, along with thousands of others, suffered expulsion from the Church of England because of their Puritan beliefs. Shortly afterwards he renounced Puritanism and was ordained back into the Church. He went on to become a Royal Chaplain and Dean of Bristol Cathedral.

The much-loved tune set for this hymn is John Ireland's "Love Unknown". Ireland taught at the Royal College of Music and for many years was organist at St Luke's Church, Chelsea. He is probably best known for his orchestral works as well as his many song settings for voice and piano. Apart from the hymn tune "Love Unknown", John Ireland's best-known piece of church music is the anthem "Greater Love".

My song is love unknown, My Saviour's love to me: Love to the loveless shown. That they might lovely be. O who am I, That for my sake My Lord should take Frail flesh, and die?

2 He came from His blest throne Salvation to bestow: But men made strange, and none The longed-for Christ would know: But oh, my Friend, My Friend indeed, Who at my need His life did spend.

Sometimes they strew His way, 4 They rise and needs will have And His sweet praises sing; Resounding all the day Hosannas to their King: Then "Crucify!" Is all their breath. And for His death They thirst and cry.

My dear Lord made away; A murderer they save, The Prince of life they slay. Yet cheerful He To suffering goes, That He His foes From thence might free.
