First Reading

Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his power. Put on the whole armour of God, so that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For our struggle is not against enemies of blood and flesh, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places. Therefore, take up the whole armour of God, so that you may be able to withstand on that evil day, and having done everything, to stand firm.

Stand therefore, and fasten the belt of truth around your waist, and put on the breastplate of righteousness. As shoes for your feet put on whatever will make you ready to proclaim the gospel of peace. With all of these, take the shield of faith, with which you will be able to quench all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

Pray in the Spirit at all times in every prayer and supplication. To that end keep alert and always persevere in supplication for all the saints. Pray also for me, so that when I speak, a message may be given to me to make known with boldness the mystery of the gospel, for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it boldly, as I must speak.

Ephesians 6.10-20

Gospel

Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live for ever.' He said these things while he was teaching in the synagogue at Capernaum.

When many of his disciples heard it, they said, 'This teaching is difficult; who can accept it?' But Jesus, being aware that his disciples were complaining about it, said to them, 'Does this offend you? Then what if you were to see the Son of Man ascending to where he was before? It is the spirit that gives life; the flesh is useless. The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life. But among you there are some who do not believe.' For Jesus knew from the first who were the ones that did not believe, and who was the one that would betray him. And he said, 'For this reason I have told you that no one can come to me unless it is granted by the Father.'

Because of this many of his disciples turned back and no longer went about with him. So, Jesus asked the twelve, 'Do you also wish to go away?' Simon Peter answered him, 'Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God.'

Father Michael's Diary

FATHER MICHAEL'S DIARY

20 AUGUST 2012

CALL ME FATHER

Why should you? Of course, you don't have to unless you feel comfortable doing so. But it may be helpful to give some the background to the use of this term for Anglican clergy. It all begins with a man called Charles Fuge Lowder (1820 -1880). In 1856 he moved to St George's in the East as head of mission. In 1860 he began work on a new church – St Peter, London Docks. The church was finally consecrated in 1867 but no sooner had this taken place than a cholera epidemic broke out. Everyone who could get out of Poplar did so, but Charles and the sisterhood attached to St Peter's remained and ministered to the suffering people. HFB Maclay in his book "Saints and Leaders" continues the tale: "As he was seen time after time, carrying some cholera-stricken child in his arms to the hospital, the people began to call him 'Father.' Thus were the title 'Father' won for the secular clergy; it is a title which they will retain only so long as they are true to his ideal."

There is the challenge. Fr Lowder's ideals were inspired by the French priest Vincent de Paul and his work among galley slaves (you can read about them in Les Miserables). Throughout his life St Vincent set an example of selfless devotion to those among whom he ministered, and this inspired Charles Lowder and other slum priests, as Fr Lowder's work among the cholera victims shows. However, it must be said that although the slum priests worked tirelessly to minister to their flocks in the dire conditions of London's docklands it seems they did little if anything to address the main cause of the hardships their people suffered - the system of day labouring. Under this dockers were hired for work on a day-to-day basis and the older and more infirm men were lucky if they got any work at all while the fittest might only manage two or three days work a week.

Nevertheless, the devotion of the slum priests to their people and the austerity of their lives provide an example which would be hard to emulate today. But Maclay's challenge of Fr Lowder's ideals is still there every time a priest is addressed as "Father".
