Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them, 'Rulers of the people and elders, if we are questioned today because of a good deed done to someone who was sick and are asked how this man has been healed, let it be known to all of you, and to all the people of Israel, that this man is standing before you in good health by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead. This Jesus is "the stone that was rejected by you, the builders; it has become the cornerstone."

Gospel

Jesus said to the Pharisees: 'I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away – and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father.'

Father Michael's Diary

23 APRIL 2021

LIVING THE RESURRECTION

"When you walk through the storm, Hold your head up high, And don't be afraid of the dark...."

Many of you will be familiar with the lyrics of this ballad, the anthem of Liverpool FC. The anthem which sustained Liverpool's supporters throughout their battle to obtain justice for the 96 fans who were crushed to death in Hillsborough Stadium on 15 April 1989, a fight which continues to this day.

But it is also a summary of resurrection living. In our lives there is bound to be a great deal of darkness, not only the death of our loved ones but also a whole host of "little deaths": failures, mistakes, disappointments, injustices, abuses, unfairness and all the rest, all part of living in a fallen, less than perfect world. Indeed, it would be all too easy to let the darkness overwhelm us and lead lives of sadness, bitterness and disillusionment.

To all this our resurrection faith says "no" for our resurrection faith teaches us that death in any of its forms is never, can never be, the end. Beyond death there is resurrection, new life, bigger and better than what went before. The song's lyrics speak of "a golden sky and their sweet silver song of a lark" but that is a mere shadow of the glory of resurrection. If we can hold on to that resurrection faith then we can pass though these temporal sufferings and find beyond them that our lives have been transformed, with the discovery of different perspective, a different set of values. In the midst of this fallen world, we have discovered eternal life.

Resurrection faith gives us the courage to face whatever death, great or small, that confronts us. The lyrics say "walk on walk on with hope in your heart and you'll never walk alone". If indeed that hope is the hope of resurrection, then as we walk through the storms of life we certainly won't walk alone because our resurrected, risen Lord, Jesus Christ, will be walking beside us. His pierced feet will walk beside ours and his pierced hands will guide us to the realm of truth and peace and eternal life.

Revd Canon Younis Francis was born in Pakistan in 1966. He pursued theological studies first at Christ the King Seminary, Karachi, the University of Malta and the Pontific Selesian University, Rome, Italy.

Younis was ordained as priest in 1995. He worked as Assistant Parish Priest and Director of Formation in Pakistan. After 4 years of ministry as a Catholic Priest, he went to Malta in search of a different career before moving to the UK in 2001.

Younis joined the Anglican Church in 2005. After two years of Theological training at South-East Institute of Theological Education and the University of Kent, he served his curacy at St Mary's, Addington. Before his appointment at St Philip's in 2016, he worked as a Team Vicar in the Cheam Team Ministry from 2011 to 2016.

Father Younis was made an Honorary Canon of Southwark Cathedral in 2017.

Father Younis is married to Nancy and they have a son Zeron. In his spare time, Younis is interested in Cricket, Football, reading and listening to music.

Singing hymns and spiritual songs...

A weekly round up by Ian Brentnall our Choir Master

Christ the good shepherd is an image we will hear described in our Gospel reading this morning, a theme also reflected in our Psalm for the morning, being Psalm 23. There are a number of paraphrased versions of Psalm 23 set to music which have won a place in the hearts many who have faced difficult and troubling times; the versions set to the tune "Crimond" and Brother James' Air to name but two. One sung less often but of which I was always fond is "The King of love my shepherd is", written by Sir Henry Williams Baker (1821 – 1877). Sir Henry was educated at Cambridge University after which took Holy Orders and moved to Durham. He became a noted author, hymn writer and is also remembered for his role as promotor and editor of Hymns Ancient and Modern. The tune most usually associated with this hymn is Dominus regit me by John Bacchus Dykes, another noted author and priest, remembered for having written over 300 hymn tunes including Melita, the tune set to the hymn "Eternal Father, strong to save".

The King of love my Shepherd is, Whose goodness faileth never; I nothing lack if I am his And he is mine for ever.

Where streams of living water flow My ransomed soul he leadeth, And where the verdant pastures grow With food celestial feedeth.

Perverse and foolish oft I strayed, But yet in love he sought me, And on his shoulder gently laid, And home, rejoicing, brought me.

In death's dark vale I fear no ill With thee, dear Lord, beside me; Thy rod and staff my comfort still, Thy cross before to guide me.

Thou spread'st a table in my sight; Thy unction, grace bestoweth: And O what transport of delight From thy pure chalice floweth!

And so through all the length of days Thy goodness faileth never; Good Shepherd, may I sing thy praise Within thy house for ever.
