First Reading

Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. In fulfilment of his own purpose, he gave us birth by the word of truth, so that we would become a kind of first fruits of his creatures.

You must understand this, my beloved: let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak, slow to anger; for your anger does not produce God's righteousness. Therefore, rid yourselves of all sordidness and rank growth of wickedness, and welcome with meekness the implanted word that has the power to save your souls.

But be doers of the word, and not merely hearers who deceive themselves. For if any are hearers of the word and not doers, they are like those who look at themselves in a mirror; for they look at themselves and, ongoing away, immediately forget what they were like. But those who look into the perfect law, the law of liberty, and persevere, being not hearers who forget but doers who act—they will be blessed in their doing.

If any think they are religious, and do not bridle their tongues but deceive their hearts, their religion is worthless. Religion that is pure and undefiled before God, the Father, is this: to care for orphans and widows in their distress, and to keep oneself unstained by the world.

James 1.17-27

Gospel

Now when the Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around him, they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with defiled hands, that is, without washing them. (For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, do not eat unless they thoroughly wash their hands, thus observing the tradition of the elders; and they do not eat anything from the market unless they wash it; and there are also many other traditions that they observe, the washing of cups, pots, and bronze kettles.) So the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the elders, but eat with defiled hands?' He said to them, 'Isaiah prophesied rightly about you hypocrites, as it is written,

"This people honours me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines."

You abandon the commandment of God and hold to human tradition.'

Then he called the crowd again and said to them, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand: there is nothing outside a person that by going in can defile, but the things that come out are what defile.'

For it is from within, from the human heart, that evil intentions come: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person.'

Father Michael's Diary

27 AUGUST 2021

A HOLY REBEL

The Beheading of St John the Baptist is celebrated each year on 29 August (not this year because the 29th is a Sunday). This sordid incident marks the end of a remarkable

life which prepared the way for Jesus' own ministry.

Naturally our focus on John is the forerunner of Jesus but that obscures his significance as the last of the prophets. Some six months older than Jesus John would have been in his early thirties when he emerged in the Judean wilderness in garb of an Old Testament Prophet. But we know nothing of his life before that beyond his miraculous birth. Perhaps he joined a community of the Essenes (a quasi-monastic Jewish community) or possible the Qumran community which produced the Dead Sea Scrolls. Qumran is on the shores of the Dead Sea near to where John appears to have ministered in the Jordan delta, like him they had strong apocalyptic interests.

John's arrest by Herod and the scandalous events surrounding his death must have been the subject of intense gossip in the souks and bazaars, with wild speculation about the depravity of Herod's court. This also fascinated two much later writers, Oscar Wilde and the composer Richard Strauss. Wilde wrote a play Salome on which Strauss based his opera. In both John is portrayed as a figure of compelling purity, irresistibly attractive to Herod's stepdaughter Salome who as a reward for dancing to entertain the guests at Herod's birthday banquet demands his head, which Herod grants her.

John is therefore honoured not only as the last of the prophets but also, in a way, the first of the martyrs.
