First Reading

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their faces, and with two they flew.

And one called to another and said:

'Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory.'

The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. And I said: 'Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the LORD of hosts!'

Gospel Reading

There was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. He came to Jesus by night and said to him, 'Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God.' Jesus answered him, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above.' Nicodemus said to him, 'How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?' Jesus answered, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. Do not be astonished that I said to you, "You must be born from above." The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit.' Nicodemus said to him, 'How can these things be?' Jesus answered him, 'Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things? 'Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man.

And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.'

Father Michael's Diary

INCOMPREHENSIBLE

"...and the whole (expletive deleted) thing incomprehensible!" that famous remark, usually attributed to the 20th century writer Dorothy L Sayers sums up what a lot of people are probably

thinking as once again we approach Trinity Sunday. And the doctrine of the Holy Trinity, one of the most distinctive features of Christianity, certainly is very hard to explain, it is reckoned the people who have to preach on Trinity Sunday have drawn the short straw.

The problem arises because the Doctrine of the Trinity is trying to draw together two incompatible modes of thought: the Greek mode which defines things by what they *are* and the Hebrew mode which defines things by what they *do*. We tend to think in Greek way with the result that most of our images of God are static and so fail to capture the essential nature of the Godhead which is active and dynamic.

Try to think of it this way – picture three people dancing together but now, if you can, imagine that the three people in addition to dancing around one another are also dancing *through* each other.

Three persons of the Trinity are separate and distinct from one another, yet together they make up only one God. This means while each Person acts alone, the action of each is is held in dynamic tension with the other two. The Father begets the Son, the Son carries out his Father's will in creation and redemption, the energy their self-giving love is the Holy Spirit But it's here that human language and human thought desert us, before the Triune God we can only fall on our faces in speechless adoration.

In Rublev's famous icon a copy of which hangs over the credence table by the nave altar the three angels represent, reading from left to right the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. The Father and the Holy Spirit incline their heads towards the Son who reaches out towards the chalice standing the centre of the table. The chalice represents the Passion so the icon shows the moment when the Son accepts the incarnation (that he must be made man) with all the suffering that will entail. It is the nearest thing we have to a representation of the Trinity inaction. The position of the figures and the perspective of the picture draw us into it, we are part of the action the dynamic energy of the Trinity includes us, we have our part to play in God's great work of creation, redemption, and glorification.

Singing hymns and spiritual songs...

Understanding the doctrine of the Holy, blessed and indivisible Trinity has challenged theologians, religious philosophers as well as

churchgoers for centuries and I assure you I have nothing useful to contribute to the discussion! The idea of our God being a single person and yet recognisable to us in the form of Father, Son and Holy Spirit throughout all eternity and of equal substance to each other is something which most of us find difficult to comprehend. I have to concede that because I don't understand something completely, this does not mean that it is not fundamentally true and real. Today is Trinity Sunday when we celebrate the fullness of God. A favourite hymn we sing at the time to express our worship and celebration of the Trinity is "Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty".

Reginald Heber (1783 – 1826) was an English Priest, hymn writer and latterly Bishop of Calcutta. He studied at Oxford and attained a reputation as a poet and orator. Heber was vicar of Hodnet in Shropshire, following on from his father before him. During his short life he wrote 57 hymns, of which "Holy, Holy, Holy" is probably the best known, although "Brightest and best of the sons of the morning" and "Bread of the world" are also in our repertoire. Heber was a successful preacher and is credited with bring many of the local population to Christ during his ministry in India. We usually sing this hymn to the tune "Nicaea" by John Bacchus Dykes, another noted author and priest, remembered for having written over 300 hymn tunes including Melita, the tune set to the hymn "Eternal Father, strong to save". Nicaea was written for the first edition of *Hymns Ancient and Modern* in 1861 and the name is a tribute to the First Council of Nicaea, held by the Roman Emperor Constantine I in 325, which formalized the doctrine of the Trinity.

Holy, Holy, Holy! Lord God Almighty! Early in the morning our song shall rise to Thee; Holy, Holy, Holy! Merciful and Mighty! God in Three Persons, blessed Trinity!

Holy, Holy, Holy! All the saints adore Thee, Casting down their golden crowns around the glassy sea; Cherubim and seraphim falling down before Thee, Which wert, and art, and evermore shalt be.

Holy, Holy, Holy! though the darkness hide Thee, Though the eye of sinful man, thy glory may not see: Only Thou art holy, there is none beside Thee, Perfect in power in love, and purity.

Holy, holy, holy! Lord God Almighty! All thy works shall praise thy name in earth, and sky, and sea; Holy, Holy, Holy! merciful and mighty, God in Three Persons, blessed Trinity!
