First Reading:

Peter began to speak to those assembled in the house of Cornelius. 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ – he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem.

They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

Acts 10:34-43

Gospel

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom lesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.' Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes. But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of lesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' which means Teacher.

Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

THE BISHOP OF SOUTHWARK'S LENT CALL 2021

In the last year so much has changed and we have all become much more aware of the fragility our lives and our communities. The footballer, Marcus Rashford, has helped to raise everyone's awareness of the need to ensure that our children are adequately fed during school holidays. But it is not just schoolchildren who are at risk. Whole families are in need of help, as well as couples and individuals. That is why the diocese is focusing the Bishop's Lent Call this year on food insecurity, both here in the Diocese and in our Link Dioceses.

RECALLED TO LIFE

Recalled to life" might be a suitable motto for us today as we approach both Easter and the ending of the coronavirus restrictions. But it's not only a motto it's also a challenge. Also "recalled to life" might not be the best way of describing the resurrection. Resurrection is not a recalling to life but the gift of an entirely new sort of life altogether which totally transcended life as we know it. It is this sheer unlikeness of resurrection anything we might know that gives to the resurrection stories their unworldly, you might almost say spooky, atmosphere.

Here was something totally new, totally unexpected, totally outside human experience. But not outside human expectation. The resurrection of Jesus far exceeded earlier speculations. Through resurrection we shall come to share the eternal life of the Godhead, we shall live eternally and never die. We are not so much recalled to life as called to eternal life. Yet in many ways the restrictions from which we are now starting to emerge do resemble a return to life from death. One feature of death is isolation, we must face death alone, and alone go into that silence: cut off from family and friends and from life itself. Something very similar has befallen many people over the last year. Lots of us have not seen most of our relatives for over a year, particularly if they live any distance away. There have been some small outdoor gatherings of friends, but most people have had to spend most of the time alone or with their partner and immediate family. The toll this has taken on our mental health is only now beginning to be recognised.

As, please God, all these onerous restrictions will be coming to an end we shall emerge form a sort of death ... into what.? And this where the concept of a recall to life challenges us. Is a recall to life enough. Is it enough for us to go back to the way things were. The toll the pandemic has taken has shown up how many things are wrong in our society, the death rate of socio-economically poor and BAME communities is much higher than for other parts of society. The huge growth in the use of food banks shows how much poverty there is, how far from an equitable distribution of resources we are. Our impoverished health and social care services have been stretched to the limit and sometime beyond. In a rich country like this that should never have happened. And then there is the way the whole pandemic has been managed right across Government. Only time will tell, if we ever get an official enquiry, just how many mistakes were made, how many decisions delayed, how many resources wasted.

But of course, there is an upside to all this. We have rediscovered the community, we have found that for many people working from home is a more than acceptable alternative to the daily commute. Churches have learned to live stream and record services which in some cases has vastly increased the number of worshippers. We have also learned how holding meetings by Zoom and Teams has saved time and money in travelling and increased attendance. In grappling with the Pandemic, we have had glimpses of a better world. Are we going to let all this go? Or are we prepared to be resurrected.?

Singing hymns and spiritual songs...

Christ is risen: He is risen indeed, Alleluya! This is known as the Paschal Greeting we use during the season of Easter, reminding us of the words of the angel spoken to Mary, mother of our Lord and Mary Madelaine at the empty tomb. We may feel that the joy of our Easter celebration in church is somewhat muted this year – no hymns, no choir and no warm embrace or handshake at the Peace. We might be forgiven for feeling sad at how much seems to be missing from our worship.

One thing I always miss during Lent is use of the word "Alleluya" in any part of the liturgy or in our hymns. That exuberant shout of praise figures as part of many Easter hymns and I always love that moment when the first Alleluya is sung as part of our Easter celebrations. We probably each have our own favourite Easter hymns, one of my favourites is "Alleluya! Alleluya! Hearts to heaven and voices raise". The author was Christopher Wordsworth (1807 – 1885), nephew of the famous poet. Wordsworth was educated at Winchester and Cambridge and undertook several distinguished roles, culminating in his being consecrated as bishop of Lincoln in 1869. He was a noted author on a variety of subjects and wrote several hymns which we still use today. The tune we usually use to this one is "Lux eoi" by Sir Arthur Sullivan, half of that infamous collaboration Gilbert and Sullivan. Although best known for the G&S operas, Sullivan was a prodigiously gifted musician who in his younger days was regarded on the continent as being comparable in talent to Brahms.

So, although we can't sing Alleluya, we can nevertheless with the greatest joy join loudly and enthusiastically in the response:

He is risen indeed:

ALLELUYA!!

Alleluia, alleluia!
Hearts to heaven and voices raise: sing to God a hymn of gladness, sing to God a hymn of praise.
He, who on the cross a victim, for the world's salvation bled,
Jesus Christ, the King of glory, now is risen from the dead.

Christ is risen, Christ, the first fruits of the holy harvest field, which will all its full abundance at his second coming yield: then the golden ears of harvest will their heads before him wave, ripened by his glorious sunshine from the furrows of the grave.

Christ is risen, we are risen!
Shed upon us heavenly grace,
rain and dew and gleams of glory
from the brightness of thy face;
that we, with our hearts in heaven,
here on earth may fruitful be,
and by angel hands be gathered,
and be ever, Lord, with thee.

Alleluia, alleluia!
Glory be to God on high;
Alleluia! to the Saviour
who has gained the victory;
Alleluia! to the Spirit,
fount of love and sanctity:
Alleluia, alleluia!
to the Triune Majesty.
