First Reading

Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread.

At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. Then the Lord called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" and ran to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call; lie down again." So he went and lay down. The Lord called again, "Samuel!" Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call, my son; lie down again." Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. The Lord called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." Then Eli perceived that the Lord was calling the boy. Therefore Eli said to Samuel, "Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, 'Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening." So Samuel went and lay down in his place.

Now the Lord came and stood there, calling as before, "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening." Then the Lord said to Samuel, "See, I am about to do something in Israel that will make both ears of anyone who hears of it tingle. On that day I will fulfill against Eli all that I have spoken concerning his house, from beginning to end. For I have told him that I am about to punish his house forever, for the iniquity that he knew, because his sons were blaspheming God, and he did not restrain them. Therefore, I swear to the house of Eli that the iniquity of Eli's house shall not be expiated by sacrifice or offering forever."

Samuel lay there until morning; then he opened the doors of the house of the Lord. Samuel was afraid to tell the vision to Eli. But Eli called Samuel and said, "Samuel, my son." He said, "Here I am." Eli said, "What was it that he told you? Do not hide it from me. May God do so to you and more also, if you hide anything from me of all that he told you." So, Samuel told him everything and hid nothing from him. Then he said, "It is the Lord; let him do what seems good to him."

As Samuel grew up, the Lord was with him and let none of his words fall to the ground. And all Israel from Dan to Beer-Sheba knew that Samuel was a trustworthy prophet of the Lord.

Samuel 3.1-10(11-20)

Gospel

When he returned to Capernaum after some days, it was reported that he was at home. So many gathered around that there was no longer room for them, not even in front of the door; and he was speaking the word to them. Then some people came, bringing to him a paralyzed man, carried by four of them. And when they could not bring him to Jesus because of the crowd, they removed the roof above him; and after having dug through it, they let down the mat on which the paralytic lay. When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, "Son, your sins are forgiven." Now some of the scribes were sitting there, questioning in their hearts, "Why does this fellow speak in this way? It is blasphemy! Who can forgive sins but God alone?" At once Jesus perceived in his spirit that they were discussing these questions among themselves; and he said to them, "Why do you raise such questions in your hearts? Which is easier, to say to the paralytic, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Stand up and take your mat and walk'? But so that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins"—he said to the paralytic— "I say to you, stand up, take your mat and go to your home." And he stood up, and immediately took the mat and went out before all of them; so that they were all amazed and glorified God, saying, "We have never seen anything like this!"

Father Michael's Diary



DIVINE COMPASSION

Next Friday Anglican Franciscans will be celebrating the Festival of the Divine Compassion of Christ. This feast has its foundation in the Roman Catholic feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus which falls on the same day. Devotion to the Sacred Heart which can be traced back to the Middle Ages, a reference to it can be found

in Julian of Norwich's Revelations of Divine Love, was popularised following the visions of St Margaret Mary Alacoque a 17th century religious.

There is more to devotion to the Sacred Heart than religious sentimentality. In honouring Christ's love and compassion for humanity there is a call for social justice and a commitment to help the most marginalised members of the community. This is well expressed in the following prayer by Eric Milner White which forms the Anglican collect for the feast.

Almighty God, whose Son, our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, was moved with compassion for all who had gone astray and with indignation for all who has suffered wrong, inflame our hearts with the burning fire of your love, that we may seek out the lost, have mercy on the fallen and stand for truth and righteousness.

With this in mind a group of men formed a Franciscan Community in Plaistow in East London, where Franciscans are still to be found today. They took the name of the Society of the Divine Compassion. The most well-known member of this community, and its superior throughout its existence, was Henry Hardy who as Father Andrew was highly regarded as a <u>confessor</u>, spiritual guide and religious writer. (A bishop described him as a great man, such as God sends only once or twice in a generation.)

One of his many hymns was "O dearest Lord, thy sacred head" the last verse of which reads:

O dearest Lord thy sacred heart with spear was pierced for me. O pour thy Spirit in my heart. that I may live for thee.

Singing hymns and spiritual songs...

This is the first Sunday after Trinity and stretching before us into the far distance are six months of what are referred to as "Ordinary

Time", in other words a time in the church's year which fall outside events relating to Christmas and Easter together with their preparatory periods of Advent and Lent. Not a lot happens during Ordinary Time and, as a church musicians tasked with planning choir music lists, we often regarded as "open season" where anything goes, as there are few liturgical or ecclesiastical pegs upon which to hang one's musical hat! One of the few notable festivals is that of Corpus Christi which take place each year on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday. It is otherwise known as the Day of Thanksgiving for the Holy Communion. You may have noticed that we celebrated the institution of the Holy communion on Maundy Thursday, but this was of course within the context of the events of Holy Week and was hardly a celebration. St. Thomas Aquinas first proposed a festival focussing solely on celebrating the Eucharist and this was adopted by the church in 1264.

For my choice of hymn this week I'm delving into one of the dustier corners of the hymn book that rarely sees the light of day. "Of the glorious body telling" is a hymn written in Latin by St. Thomas Aquinas (1227 – 1274) (*Pangue lingua gloriosi corporis mysterium*) translated by the priest and scholar John Mason Neale. St. Thomas Aquinas is considered as being one of the Roman Catholic church's greatest theologians and philosophers whose influence is still felt in the teaching of the church and more generally in western thought to this day. The tune we would usually set to these words is another plainsong melody, based on Mode iii called Pange Lingua after the first line of the hymn in Latin.

Of the glorious Body telling, O my tongue, its mysteries sing, And the Blood, all price excelling, Which the world's eternal King, In a noble womb once dwelling, Shed for this world's ransoming.

Given for us, for us descending, Of a Virgin to proceed, Man with man in converse blending, Scattered he the Gospel seed, Till his sojourn drew to ending, Which he closed in wondrous deed.

At the last great Supper lying Circled by his brethren's band, Meekly with the law complying, First he finished its command, Then, immortal Food supplying, Gave himself with his own hand. Word made Flesh, by word he maketh Very bread his Flesh to be; Man in wine Christ's Blood partaketh: And if senses fail to see, Faith alone the true heart waketh To behold the mystery.

Part 2. Tantum ergo. Therefore we, before him bending, This great Sacrament revere; Types and shadows have their ending, For the newer rite is here; Faith, our outward sense befriending, Makes the inward vision clear.

Glory let us give, and blessing To the Father and the Son; Honour, might, and praise addressing, While eternal ages run; Ever too his love confessing, Who, from both, with both is one. Amen.
