Psalm Today: Psalm 19

First Reading

For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written,

"I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe.

For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

Gospel

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money-changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, 'Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a market-place!' His disciples remembered that it was written, 'Zeal for your house will consume me.' The Jews then said to him, 'What sign can you show us for doing this?' Jesus answered them, 'Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up.' They then said, 'This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that Jesus had spoken.

Could we remind everyone of the following:

Coronavirus is highly infectious. Older people and those with underlying health problems are at increased risk of severe illness and potentially death

A message from Gill Sharpe

I have been (slowly!) working through the church library which, as you probably know, has been very much enlarged by the legacy of Douglas and



Sandra Walford, to weed out books which now need a new home. I have delivered the first lot to Book Aid, and received the following letter from the Director. I thought the congregation would like to see it, as I will certainly be asking them for spare bibles (see last paragraph).

Dear Gillian

Thank you for your phone call today and I hope that you manage to drop off the boxes of books successfully! Book Aid has been closed during this recent lockdown hence the lack of a response recently. However we are poised waiting for the go-ahead to reopen, unsure, of course, when that will be!

We are always grateful to receive good books to send abroad on our programme. Last year we sent approx. 400,000 in shipping container loads to our partner bookshops in Kenya, Ghana and Nigeria which help to maintain Christian bookshops in those countries. The ministry is founded on the principles of making books available 'at locally affordable prices' so that the shops can support themselves and last for many years.

The next country we will be packing for is Zimbabwe although they are in such need that they have asked us for half the shipping container to be filled with Bibles. We know that humanly speaking this is just not possible so we have to trust God to provide. Would St John's 'Spread The Word' about this for us? There is some urgency and Bibles in usable condition would be a real blessing.

IMAGINATIVE CONTEMPLATION

Continuing our look at methods of mental prayer this week we come to imaginative contemplation. This forms the basis of St Ignatius' Spiritual Exercises. In their original form these are made in the form of an individually guided retreat lasting thirty days and leading to a life changing decision. But beyond that they can form part of an ongoing intimate relationship with God. What it involves is using your imagination to enter into a Gospel incident and using that as a basis for a dialogue with the Lord Jesus. The basic method goes like this.

- 1. Make yourself comfortable in your usual prayer place and select a Gospel passage to form the basis of your meditation.
- 2. Preparatory Prayer Take a moment to call to mind the attitude of reverence with which you will approach this privileged time with God ask God to direct your imagination, your thoughts, feelings and actions all to his praise and glory.
- 3. Read the Gospel passage through twice and put the Bible away.
- 4. Visualise the setting of the Gospel passage on which you are going to meditate: the location and the people involved.
- 5. Ask God for the benefit you hope to acquire through the contemplation.
- 6. Bring the Gospel incident to life in your imagination: envisage the people, what are they doing, what are they saying.
- 7. Continue to bring the incident to life as vividly as you can using all the senses, not only sight and hearing but taste, smell and touch as well.
- 8. Enter into the incident yourself by talking to our Lord and the other people involved and listening to their replies
- 9. Finally speak to Jesus or as one friend speaks to another, or an employee to an employer: asking for some grace, or apologising for some misdeed, or telling your story and asking advice; ending with a suitable familiar prayer, perhaps the Lord's prayer.

People are sometimes nervous of allowing the unfettered use of their imagination in this sort of exercise. But remember your imagination is a gift from God and before you started you asked God to direct it. What emerges in your mediation should be accepted as a gift from God. If you are really worried by what emerges then you should seek the advice of a spiritual director.

Singing hymns and spiritual songs... A weekly roundup from Ian Brentnall



On this, the third Sunday of Lent and the first Sunday in

March, we see at last the first tentative steps toward returning to some form of normality as we throw open the doors of our church once again for public worship. Personally, throughout the past year when we have been unable to gather for worship as we would have wanted, I have come to appreciate more deeply the church as a body of people united in worshipping God rather than just a (sometime bitterly cold) building! Indeed, our Gospel reading warns against places we regard as holy, as well as that which takes place within them, becoming the object of worship and even idolatry themselves. The hymn "We love the place, O God" was written by William Bullock (1798-1874) and Sir Henry Williams Baker (1821-1877). During his time as a missionary at Trinity Bay, Newfoundland, Bullock built a church there for which he wrote a hymn beginning 'We love the place, O Lord'. This hymn was published in Bullock's Songs of the Church (Halifax, Nova Scotia, printed for the author, 1854), in six verses. It was substantially rewritten by Baker for the First Edition of Hymns Ancient and Modern. We usually sign this to the tune "Quam dilecta" written by Henry Jenner. The New English Hymnal confidently attributes the title of Bishop to Jenner. Although he was appointed as Bishop of Dunedin, Christchurch, New Zealand in 1866 he was never accepted locally and was asked to give up his claim to the See, which he did reluctantly in 1871.

Lord Jesus, give us grace on earth to love thee more, in heaven to see thy face, and with thy saints adore.
