### **First Reading**

A reading from Paul's letter to the Ephesians:

So stop telling lies.

Let us tell our neighbours the truth, for we are all parts of the same body. And "don't sin by letting anger control you."

Don't let the sun go down while you are still angry,

for anger gives a foothold to the devil.

If you are a thief, quit stealing. Instead, use your hands for good hard work, and then give generously to others in need.

Don't use foul or abusive language. Let everything you say be good and helpful, so that your words will be an encouragement to those who hear them.

And do not bring sorrow to God's Holy Spirit by the way you live. Remember, he has identified you as his own, guaranteeing that you will be saved on the day of redemption.

Get rid of all bitterness, rage, anger, harsh words, and slander, as well as all types of evil behaviour.

Instead, be kind to each other, tender-hearted, forgiving one another, just as God through Christ has forgiven you.

Imitate God, therefore, in everything you do because you are his dear children. Live a life filled with love, following the example of Christ.

He loved us and offered himself as a sacrifice for us, a pleasing aroma to God.

This is the Word of the Lord **Thanks be to God.** 

### Gospel

Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.

Then the Jews began to complain about him because he said, "I am the bread that came down from heaven." They were saying, "Is not this Jesus, the son of Joseph, whose father and mother we know? How can he now say, 'I have come down from heaven'?" Jesus answered them, "Do not complain among yourselves. No one can come to me unless drawn by the Father who sent me; and I will raise that person up on the last day. It is written in the prophets, 'And they shall all be taught by God.'

Everyone who has heard and learned from the Father comes to me. Not that anyone has seen the Father except the one who is from God; he has seen the Father. Very truly, I tell you, whoever believes has eternal life. I am the bread of life. Your ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness, and they died. This is the bread that comes down from heaven, so that one may eat of it and not die.<sup>1</sup> I am the living bread that came down from heaven. ## Father Michael's Diary

6 AUGUST 2021

DESTROYER OF WORLDS

Today the Church keeps the Feast of the Transfiguration of our Lord, but it also marks a much grimmer anniversary the dropping of the atomic bomb on the Japanese city of Hiroshima in 1945. The Hiroshima bomb which killed up to 80,000 people, 30% of the population of Hiroshima and injured a further 70,000 was followed on 9 August by an attack on Nagasaki which killed 35-40, 000 people and injured a further 60,000. By 1953 the hydrogen bomb, hundreds or even thousands of times as powerful as the atomic bomb had been tested.

The development of these terrible weapons had been spurred on by the need first to bring the war against Japan to a close and then by the escalating Cold War between Russia and the west. The power of these weapons daunted the scientists who developed them. On witnessing the first test of an atomic bomb Robert J Oppenheimer one of those involved later recalled:

"We knew the world would not be the same. a few people laughed, a few people cried, most people were silent. I remembered the line from the Hindu scripture, the Bhagavad-Gita. Vishnu is trying to persuade the prince that he should do his duty and to impress him takes on his multi-armed form and says, "Now, I am become Death, the destroyer of worlds." I suppose we all thought that one way or another."

Indeed, the world would never be the same: once something has been invented you can't turn back the clock you simply have to live with your new capability and to live with it constructively. So far, for the last 68 years, we have mostly managed to do that. At any rate we are still here to tell the tale.

But the existence of this terrible power is a constant challenge to those in positions of authority across the world. Thankfully we seem to be making some progress: a second round of disarmament talks between the USA and Russia is due to start about now. Let us pray for all those involved and for their success.

## <u>Singing hymns and spiritual</u> <u>songs...</u>

William Chatterton Dix (14 June 1837 – 9 September 1898) was an English writer of hymns and carols. He was

born in Bristol, the son of John Dix, a local surgeon, who wrote *The Life of Chatterton* the poet, a book of *Pen Pictures of Popular English Preachers* and other works. His father gave him his middle name in honour of Thomas Chatterton, a poet about whom he had written a biography. William Chatterton Dix was educated at the Grammar School, Bristol, for a mercantile career, and became manager of a maritime insurance company in Glasgow where he spent most of his life. His hymns and carols also include *As with Gladness Men of Old, What Child Is This?*, *To You, O Lord, Our Hearts We Raise*, as well as *Alleluia! Sing to Jesus* which is our Offertory hymn this morning.

Hyfrydol (meaning among other things "melodious") is a Welsh hymn tune that appears in a number of contemporary hymnals in various arrangements. Composed by Rowland Prichard (1811 - 1887), it was originally published in the composer's handbook to the children's songbook *Cyfaill y Cantorion* ("The Singers' Friend") in 1844. Prichard composed the tune before he was twenty years old. This tune is set for our Offertory hymn Alleluia, sing to Jesus this morning.
