Father Michael's Diary

PROBLEMS WITH PRAYER

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of next week are Rogation Days – days set aside for praying for a good

harvest and by extension for God's blessing on the labours of humankind.

"Rogation" means "asking" and illustrates a very frequent misunderstanding about prayer - that prayer is asking God for things. When we are small and helpless it's comforting to think that we have a big super-daddy in the sky who can do for us whatever we want but that is an illusion we have to grow out of if we are to grow up spiritually.

If we look at the Lord's prayer, we can see that there is a lot more to praying than asking God for things. Of course the Lord's Prayer does include asking for things, but the petition for daily bread is asking for the basic necessity for survival - that's a long way from asking God to buy a Mercedes Benz as one popular song goes. We also pray for forgiveness of our sins but that is related to the way we forgive others. We pray for the coming of God's kingdom and that God's will may be done.

That is perhaps the most important petition of all because the whole purpose of prayer is to align our wills with the will of God. In prayer we open ourselves to the Holy Spirit that God's will may be done in us and through us. God's will may be for life and health and peace for everyone but in our less than perfect world that is just not possible. The creation of the universe involved on God's part an act of self-limitation. The laws of creation bind God as much as they bind us, God cannot set them aside any more than we can. We are all mortal; we are all going to die no matter how hard we may pray for that not to happen. What we can ask for a perfect and peaceful end and the same for those we love. Prayer for others, intercession, is to open a channel by which God's grace and love can flow to the person prayed for.

The problems we have with prayer often arise because we fail to take on board what prayer is about. God wants to be known, wants to reveal Godself to us and wants us to open ourselves to God's life giving, transforming love.

Revd Canon Younis Francis was born in Pakistan in 1966. He pursued theological studies first at Christ the King Seminary, Karachi, the University of Malta and the Pontific Selesian University, Rome, Italy.

Younis was ordained as priest in 1995. He worked as Assistant Parish Priest and Director of Formation in Pakistan. After 4 years of ministry as a Catholic Priest, he went to Malta in search of a different career before moving to the UK in 2001.

Younis joined the Anglican Church in 2005. After two years of Theological training at South-East Institute of Theological Education and the University of Kent, he served his curacy at St Mary's, Addington. Before his appointment at St Philip's in 2016, he worked as a Team Vicar in the Cheam Team Ministry from 2011 to 2016.

Father Younis was made an Honorary Canon of Southwark Cathedral in 2017.

Father Younis is married to Nancy and they have a son Zeron. In his spare time, Younis is interested in Cricket, Football, reading and listening to music.

Singing hymns and spiritual songs...

A weekly round up by Ian Brentnall our Choir Master

Our Gospel reading this morning has been the inspiration for many hymns and anthems, John Ireland's "Greater Love" and

Samuel Sebastian Wesley's "Blessed be the God and Father "to name but two choral pieces our choir is very familiar with. Charles Wesley (1707 – 1788) wrote over 6,500 hymns during his lifetime, an astonishing average of one hymn every four and a half days! He was of course a leader of the Methodist movement, being the younger brother of the founder John Wesley. Charles was also father of the musician Sebastian Wesley and grandfather of Samuel Sebastian Wesley, mentioned earlier. Charles accompanied John on many preaching tours of this country as well as America. Although they were close, Charles never agreed with the decision to allow Methodism to split with the Anglican Church, into which they had both been ordained.

The tune to which this hymn is most commonly set is Blaenwern, a Welsh hymn tune composed by William Penfro Rowlands (1860–1937), during the Welsh revival of 1904–1905. It was first published in 1915. The tune is named after Blaenwern Farm near Tufton, Pembrokeshire, where Rowlands sent his poorly son to stay with friends of the family to convalesce, as it was thought the fresh air would assist his recovery. He named the tune in honour of them.
