President's Report

October is finally bringing cooler weather. Of course, here in Alabama we were fooled by a "False Autumn" in mid September, just before "Second Summer" set in to remind us of our latitude!

October is also significant to many of us who have Southern colonial roots. October 7th is the anniversary of the Battle of King's Mountain. There, Maj Patrick Ferguson and his small army of Loyalist Militia met their match in the Tennessee Over Mountain men and Patriot militia from the Carolinas and Virginia. As the screaming Patriots came up the mountain, Loyalist Captain Abraham de Peyster turned to Major Ferguson and said, "These things are ominous – these are the damned yelling boys!"

Ferguson was slain, his men killed or captured. King's Mountain was a turning point for the War on the Southern frontier. Loyalists and the British would never again have any power in the western Carolina Mountains.

One thing we should remember is that Ferguson was the only British Soldier at King's Mountain. All the rest, Loyalist and Patriot were Americans. I pray that we will never again see a time where Americans must fight other Americans to maintain our great nation that was created by the men and women of the Revolution.

I grew up in Arkansas, but my Mom and Dad's family have very early roots in Tennessee. My aunt and uncle William Bean and Lydia Russell Bean were the first white settlers in what is now Tennessee. They were soon followed by my 5th Great grandparents George Russell and Elizabeth Bean Russell. Both George and William, along with all of their sons crossed over the mountains to defeat Patrick Ferguson.

William McElwee lived adjacent to King's Mountain. His farm was plundered by Ferguson's men. When the Patriot forces assembled near his place, he and two of his sons, James and John, kicked in and joined the fight, even though they belonged to no organized militia company. William's daughter Jane is my 5th Great Grandmother.

Did you have Patriot ancestors who were at King's Mountain or served in the Southern theater? The larger battles fought in the East get all the glory and press. The more vicious colonial civil war that raged on the southern frontier is often forgotten in the history books. That is why we should always remember King's Mountain.



In 1939, Twickenham Town Chapter, NSDAR, dedicated a large stone monument carrying the names of the eighty-four Patriots thought to be buried in Madison County at the time. That monument now resides in Huntsville Madison County Veterans Memorial Park. Since 1939, many more Patriots who died in Madison County have been identified. On August 12th two additional monuments bearing the names of twenty-two additional Patriots was dedicated. President Hubbs is shown at the top left presenting a wreath.
