

# Wildlife Farms & Estates England & Wales

WFE England & Wales is the national version of the European Wildlife Estates label (WE). WE is represented in 19 countries across Europe, in all biogeographic regions. It comprises a network of landowners and land managers who in all aspects of managing their land are committed to giving every opportunity for wildlife and biodiversity to flourish and grow. This network is a service of the European Landowners Organisation (ELO) in its promotion of responsible land management in Europe.

The WE label has two levels, referred to as Level One and Level Two. Level One is a Charter of ten commitments that promote sound management of wildlife across all aspects of an estate's land and activity. Accreditation at the higher Level Two marks out an estate, farm, farm cluster or any landholding as being exemplary in its holistic management of wildlife and biodiversity in line with the principles of species and habitat conservation. It is assessed independently and is backed by objective scientific review. Estates accredited at Level Two currently account for over 1.9m hectares of land across Europe.

## The Wildlife Estates Level One Charter

Level One of the Wildlife Farms & Estates scheme implies recognition and acceptance of Ten Commitments that the landowner/manager must adhere to, in all countries:

- 1. Identifying a manager and supervisor of the estate concerned
- 2. Undertaking active wildlife management following a long-term integrated wildlife management plan
- 3. Maintaining records and monitoring the implementation of the wildlife management plan
- 4. Undertaking sustainable shooting, stalking and/or fishing according to the European Charter on Hunting and Biodiversity or the equivalent in national legislations
- 5. Managing for a sustainable balance of game and wildlife and their shared habitats
- 6. Improving, whenever possible, biodiversity and species notably those favourable to pollinators
- 7. Compliance with all legal requirements, relevant national codes of practice and European environmental legislation (e.g. Natura 2000) or the equivalent in national legislations
- 8. Adhering to the requirements of the agreement between Birdlife International and FACE on Directive 79/409/EEC, the European Charter on Hunting and Biodiversity, and the EU Commission's Guide on Hunting under the Birds Directive or the equivalent in national legislations
- 9. Maintaining active engagement with local communities and undertaking education/awareness raising activities
- 10. Making the required effort to prepare to apply for Level Two accreditation as soon as the estate has in place its strategy, management plans and baseline data (such as referred to in 2 and 3 above), and within a reasonable period (no longer than 5 years).



# Accreditation at Level Two

#### 1. Basis of assessment:

The standards of WE accreditation at Level Two focus on establishing whether a farm or estate:

- Can demonstrate that it goes above and beyond the commitments of Level One in the way that it exercises its responsibilities and duty of care, managing its land actively and in a sustainable manner so that wildlife and biodiversity are correctly prioritised and enhanced
- Can satisfy an independent evaluator of this.

Evaluation is based on evidence provided by the applicant in the key aspects of wildlife and biodiversity. The evaluation will also take into account other indicators including:

- Collaborative work to reverse biodiversity loss or to consolidate fragmented habitat.
- Investment in biodiversity projects.
- Mitigation of threats to biodiversity.

It offers robust evidence that the farm or estate holding can be considered a leader in this sector.

At present, evidence of carbon accounting is included as an option. It will however become a fixed feature of the process as systems develop.

For a farm or estate to secure accreditation, it must achieve a minimum number of points in its evaluation, thereby demonstrating through an independent assessor its exemplary role in the management of wildlife and biodiversity. The evaluator will visit the estate to verify features of the application. A panel of independent scientists can support the adjudication of gueries arising from the application or site visit.



#### 2. Evaluation and assessment process:

The evaluation of the applicant farm or estate is carried out by a qualified and independent assessor who is backed by ISO certification. On receipt of an initial application, the WFE National Committee will, so long as it considers the application to be genuine and reasonable, invite the estate to complete a detailed questionnaire, to which supporting documents such as plans and policies can be attached. It will then pass these to the evaluator appointed. The evaluator will consider the material supplied and will arrange a site visit to the estate. WFE will charge an evaluation fee which will be paid by the applicant estate to WFE. The evaluator will charge their expenses (mileage, food and accommodation) directly to the estate for settlement. Fee details are included in the membership prospectus.

The evaluator will report their assessment to the WFE National Committee in the first instance, noting the scores achieved and indicating whether in their opinion the estate demonstrates the high standards that warrant accreditation. Where a score is marginally below the pass-mark and/or where the evaluator feels that improvements can be readily made, the terms of any subsequent dialogue between the farm or estate and the evaluator (advice, guidance or second assessment) will be a matter for the parties to agree.

Where an estate is deemed by the evaluator to have reached the pass-mark, the WFE National Committee will forward a summary of its features to the WE European Steering Committee with a recommendation that the estate should be awarded accreditation at Level Two of the Wildlife Estates scheme. Once this final approval has been secured, the estate will be presented with a certificate of accreditation, which is valid for five years. On

B. Please read the Wildlife Estates Charter. The Charter, on page two of this form or available <a href="here">here</a>, is a list of ten commitments to which all landowners within the ELO WE scheme must adhere, in all countries. It represents Level One of the WFE scheme.

This is a prerequisite for applying for accreditation at Level Two. Supporting the principles of WE through Level One is common to all landowners in the network but does not confer any rights to use the WE label.

To start an application for accreditation at Level Two:

- C. Please read the Standards included with this document pack that are applied in the accreditation process. Although at first sight these might appear complex, they allow you to consider the type of questions that will show that your farm or estate is indeed an exemplar. The likelihood that every applicant will feel comfortable with or able to satisfy all the requirements is relatively low, for many reasons. Nevertheless, it will be a thought-provoking exercise (perhaps at times challenging) which will help to shape and accredit your 'journey' as owner/manager of a Wildlife Farm or Estate.
- D. Please then complete the initial application form below. This asks for basic data about your estate. It also asks you to write a brief statement about your achievements to date, your plans and targets for the estate, and how these will be implemented and judged. This shows 'Your Journey'.
