Carbondale Meeting: A Grand Success

The 1988 Annual Meeting of the Association of the Nepalese in Midwest America (ANMA) was successfully completed in Carbondale, Illinois on Sunday, May 29, 1988 (Memorial Day Weekend). The Meeting was hosted by the Nepalese Students Association and sponsored by the College of Technical Careers at Southern Illinois University. It was attended by Nepalese and Americans from several states including Florida, Illinois (host state), Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, Missouri, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, and Toronto, Canada.

The morning session began with opening remarks by Dr. Thomas C. Britton, Vice Chancellor, S.I.U. and a presentation by Dr. Harry G. Miller, Dean, College of Technical Careers on "Technical Education, Economic and Micro Enterprise Development in Nepal".

Padam P. Devkota presented a paper "Our Culture and Nepalese Living in the U.S." (in Nepali) and Dharma R. Shakya a paper "Nepalese Customs and Manners". ("The Viewpoints" is planning to publish the papers in the future issues.) Additionally, Dr. Madhav Sharma presented a symposium on "The Problems of Brain Drain in Nepal."

The afternoon session was addressed by Dr. Charles B. Klasek, Associate Vice President, Academic Affairs, S.I.U. He spoke on "25 Years of Southern Illinois University and Tribhuwan University".

During the ANMA business meeting, three outgoing officers — Secretary Prahlad Pant, Treasurer Sharda Thapa, and President Ram Bashyal — presented their reports. (A summary of President Bashyal's address is published in page 2.) A general discussion on several items of interest to ANMA members followed. It was addressed by Dr. Padam Paudel on an "umbrella" organization for all Nepalese associations in the U.S., by Dr. Prahlad Pant on "The Viewpoints", by Mr. Dharma R. Shakya on sponsorship of ANMA membership for students, by Dr. Jagdishwar Devkota on a nationwide "Board of Directors" for Nepalese associations, by Ex-Minister Mr. Tripuwar Singh on "Politics in Nepal", and by Mr. Kumar Pandey on initiating an effort for sponsoring a college in Nepal. An election of ANMA officers conducted by Raj Rathi followed. Sharda Thapa was unanimously elected President of ANMA for the year 1988-89. (see page 3) A plaque award was presented to outgoing President Ram Bashyal for his "loyalty, dedication, and leadership".

The evening program began with a fine dinner followed by an address by Dr. George A. Williams, President, College of Technical Careers, S.I.U. who spoke on "Establishing Scholarship Fund for The Nepalese at Southern Illinois University". The final item of the evening and perhaps the most entertaining item of the day was a fine talent show directed by Dr. Srijana Bajracharya and performed by a large number of Nepalese living in Carbondale and other cities.

Just in case you have not noticed, we have been publishing "The Viewpoints" on alternate months since December, 1987. Now it is official. We are pleased to announce that the ANMA Executive Committee has approved the publication of "The Viewpoints" on a bimonthly basis. Thanks to all who are helping us on this voluntary endeavor. -Editor

Let us change our attitude from "What does the association do for me?" to "What can I do for the association?

We are proud of our newsletter. We need more people to support and sustain the momentum. Communications among us has to grow. Without communication, we can not develop our social consciousness.

DR. MANORANJAN DHAUBHADEL'S VIEWS: Nepalese Culture: Where Are We Going?

It is a pleasure to see Dr. Srijana Bajracharya throw some light on our culture in the April issue of "The Viewpoints". She is to be commended for, what I believe, is an appropriate response. Nepalese may be poor but we certainly do not lack in the richness of culture. Our cultural heritage has been a thing to envy for many Westerners. A visitor (American) to a recent international festival in Muncie, Indiana had the following remark to make about Nepal: "You have a rich culture (which is) backed by a record of many centuries". So the question is not whether our culture is rich but whether or not we are moving in the right direction.

With regard to economic development, we sure can and should do a lot better. A few years can make a whole lot of difference. The problem is that we seem to have been moving in the wrong direction. According to a World Bank report (1985-86) our per capita income has fallen from \$190 in 1981 (Planning Commission) to \$133 in 1986 and we have moved past some other countries which were worse off before. People in power or otherwise for that matter, seem more and more interested in individualistic gains. This is in sharp contrast with our cultural practice of putting the national agenda first before anything else. The reasons for this are manifold and western influence is only one of them. The result is that our nation, instead of being a garden of blooming diversities, is looking more like a boxing arena for people from different cultural backgrounds. Policies to rectify the situation, if there are any, seem to have failed. Consequently, we are weakened in our ability and efforts to plan and manage important problems of far reaching implications, for example, the uncontrolled migrations to our big cities especially the cities in Kathmandu Valley. Our failure to regulate this migration may very well have contributed to the worsening sanitary and like problems in our cities.

To sum up, it seems that we will have advanced a big step if we could only stop moving backwards. Hopefully, all Nepalese, specifically those in positions to have significant impact, will stick to our cultural principle of putting the national agenda first and help start and expedite development in the right direction. Let us not forget that Japan did not have to abandon its culture to become the world's number one economic power.

Dear Editor,

As in the past, I had the opportunity to attend this year's ANMA annual meeting held at Carbondale. The program was a grand success. Throughout its short history, the ANMA, through annual meetings, has been extending opportunities for meeting friends, relatives, and fellow Nepalese citizens who are separated by time and distance in North America. These meetings have also been providing opportunities for finding ourselves, at least once a year, amid our material Nepalese culture about 8,000 miles away from the home of our parent culture. In addition to the annual meetings, "The Viewpoints" is also continuously increasing our awareness of what is happening here and in Nepal. I would like to thank Dr. Prahlad Pant for his personal efforts and dedication in raising the status of this newsletter to a bimonthly publication. With a rise in status, we are now able to exchange our ideas and opinions and share the Nepalese news more frequently than in the past.

However, in spite of these achievements, ANMA seems a failure in one respect -- namely, its inability to offer any pragmatic opportunities for expressing the desire inherent among many Nepalese in North America to help our Nepalese citizens and students with financial resources. I would, therefore. like to request the members on the executive committee to design a policy for the creation of a trust fund which can be used for those who need and deserve

I would also like to mention that many American citizens (especially the donors to the American Nepal Education Foundation) whom we call the product of western materialistic civilization and, therefore, oriented more towards individualism (please see Dr. Srijana Bajracharya's article in the April issue of "The Viewpoints") have been supporting many Nepalese students in the United States. They have proved that they are not materialistic and individualistic. We, whom we label ourselves as the product of spritual culture and, therefore, less materialistic and less individualistic, are in an embarrassing situation to find ourselves far behind them in this direction. I sincerely wish that we be no longer embarrassed and that all of us enjoy the happy feelings that come from helping those who need and deserve it.

NEWSLETTER: The ExCom members endorsed "vote of thanks" for Mrs. Indira Koirala for assisting "The Viewpoints" activities during 1987-88. She served as Associate Editor of the newsletter. She continues to be an active executive member of the association. Indira received an award for her excellent job during the annual meeting. Congratulations and Thank You!

The continuing Editor of the newsletter Dr. Prahlad Pant was highly commended for his excellent job. Dr. Prahlad Pant will be the chairman of the editorial committee with Dr. Jagdishwar Devkota, Associate Editor, and Mr. Ram Bashyal on behalf of the President of ANMA, as other members. Six issues will be published this year. Dr. Dinesh Koirala will assume responsibility to solicit advertisements, sponsorships, and other contributions for the newsletter.

"LIFE" MEMBERSHIF: The ExCom appreciated those who had pledged to become "life" members during the business meeting of ANMA and passed a resolution to acknowledge "Special Thanks" to each of them. The initiative started by Mr. Raj Rathi about two months ago was appreciated. It was decided by ExCom that the contribution received by "life" membership will subsidize ANMA activities to a tune of no more than twenty percent per year of the total money received.

AGGRESSIVE MEMBERSHIP PLAN: Mr. Raj Rathi will be assisted by six ExCom members to conduct an aggressive "membership" drive. The Nepalese in the area will be contacted to become "life" members. Mr. Rathi will coordinate this activity with these members who have been assigned territorial responsibilities.

1989 ANNUAL HERTING: The ExCom decided to hold the 1989 Annual Meeting in Chicago on Sunday, May 28, 1989 (Memorial Day Weekend).

Additionally, the ExCom considered several other issues which will be reported in the future issues as the plans take concrete shapes.

NEVS FROM NEPAL

Stadium Deaths Laid to Nepal Sports Council: Minister Resigns

An inquiry into the deaths of 70 people in a soccer stadium stampede here in March has blamed the Nepal Sports Council. The council, headed by Education Minister Keshar Bahadur Bista, "did not meet the responsibility of ownership" of the stadium, said the report published in government newspapers last week. "No proper arrangements were made for the repair or maintenance of the gates or stairs, and the security arrangements and the relief work of the organizers were not satisfactory," it said. The inquiry, by Judge Bhairav Prasad Lamsal, also criticized what he called unsatisfactory emergency services at hospitals to which 97 injured people were taken after the crowd had rushed the gates during a sudden hailstorm. Witnesses said the milling crowds had found the gates locked. (India Abroad, May 27)

The Nepal government has decided to dismiss the officials and members of the National Sports Council and the All Nepal Football Association because of the stampede. Following the release of the inquiry report on the stampede, Keshar Bahadur Bista, Nepal Education Minister and chairman of the Sports Council, tendered his resignation to King Birendra on "moral grounds". The government also decided to remove the director of the Bir Hospital, saying that the services at the hospital on the fateful day was "not satisfactory". (India Abroad, June 3)

Aid Commitments for Arun-III Hydro Power Project

A meeting of prospective aid donors for the proposed Arun-III Hydro Power Project was held at Paris on May 12. The donors, which included West Germany, Japan, World Bank, Asian Development Bank as well as Belgium, Finland, Italy, Sweden, and the United KIngdom, made provisional commitments totalling 550 million dollars subject to the findings of detailed engineering studies, which are said to be underway. (Rising Nepal, May 13)

Bikash Gurung Arrested

Bikash gurung, the main accused in the attempted murder of Fadam Thakurathi in August 1986, was arrested in Kathmandu on May 12 along with a country-made gun and five rounds of ammunition. (Rising Nepal, May 14)

Nepal Joins UN Military Assistance Group in Afghanistan

A six member team of Nepali Army officers left for Afghanistan on May 4 to join the UN Military Assistance Group set up to monitor the withdrawl of Soviet troops and the return of the Afghan refugees. (Rising Nepal, May 5)

Nepal-U.S. Relations

In an interview to the Rising Nepal (May 4), the new American Ambassador, Milton Frank, made the following statements: "The United States is very pleased that SAARC has come into existence. U.S. support for Nepal's Zone of Peace proposal is not only a gesture of goodwill but also a deep appreciation of the history of Nepal and its position in the region. The U.S. respects Nepal's independence and progress. It has continuing admiration for Nepal's participation in the UN peace-keeping operations, such as UNIFIL. The U.S. is also pleased that Nepal has accepted a role in the UN Military Assistance Group in Afghanistan".

"The U.S. has the willingness and the desire to take a look at its aid program to be sure that what it is doing and has planned for the future are supportive of Nepal's development objectives and prioritites. The U.S. admires and encourages the excellent program of providing basic needs to the entire Nepali people by the turn of the century". (Rising Nepal, May 4)

China-Japan-Nepal Everest Expedition

members of the China-Japan-Nepal Friendship Expedition to Mt. Everest added "a new milestone in the history of mountaineering on May 5 by simultaneously scaling Mt. Everest from the northern and southern sides and later cross-traversing the 29,028 ft peak". The summit activities were beamed throughout the world by several TV cameramen reaching the peak. (Rising Nepal. May 6)

AIDS Test Services

AIDS test services, so far available only in Kathmandu, would be extended to Pokhara and Biratnagar in the near future, and ultimately to all fourteen zones in the Kingdom. 3,000 AIDS tests had been carried out in the country so far, but no AIDS had been detected. (Rising Nepal, May 4)
