From The Pastor

"I will sing of the steadfast love of the Lord, forever; with my mouth I will make known your faithfulness to all generations." Psalm 89:1

Beyond the waves of radio tunes, glimmering songs by popstars, and shopping songs made for the holiday cheer is another sound. Caroling is a unique part of the Christmas season linked to the Church. The tradition of this coming together to sing goes back into the 13th century. Certainly inspired out of the Renaissance times, it was during the Reformation when singing entered in the mainstream. Luther put sacred music back into the mouths of common people to sing. Of course, making music is something that even the Psalmist above desired - singing to the Lord is to be for all generations.

The Devil greatly hates the music of God's people. Next to a true confession of the Gospel is the glorious sound that comes with the voice. Most associate such an occurrence taking place at public worship between the pastor and people in the liturgy or in congregation singing hymns. This is good and proper in view of God's Word and Sacrament in our midst to praise how the Lord is at hand. However, the sound of song does not stop within the walls of the church. It is to be taken into the family and into the streets.



Common songs today like Joy to the World, Silent Night, and other tunes go into the lives of people with the Gospel sung before their lives. Yet, there has been a decline in Christmas caroling over the years. Maybe it is because no one has time to make music. Maybe it is because pushing a button to listen is easier than singing. Maybe it is because people want to keep the church's song distinct from their life of chosen sounds. Whatever the reasons, the carols coming from the TV or radio will never make up the difference of having the presence of God's people singing to the Lord.


God's Word intimately ties the beauty of music sung to the saving faith, to believe and proclaim. Silencing the truth only silences the voice of song to others of Christ. For instance, "Carols suffered a decline in popularity after the Reformation in the countries where Protestant churches gained prominence...but survived in rural communities until the revival of interest in carols in the 19th century." Fascinating piece of history that reminds us of how Jesus hides Himself in the small sounds of life sung. As He was born in a manger, so the angels too wonderfully sang their carol to a few lonely shepherds.


What good will our caroling do as we gather on December 10th to sing at St. John? It reminds us we are not alone as the baptized, but belong together. Singing is a sacrifice to bring the gift of song to others to be a Gospel presence. Finally, sung carols carry the victory of Christ to be light in this dark world. Martin Luther says it the best, "...The devil, the author of depressing care and distressing disturbances, almost flees from the sound of music as he does from the word of theology."² Carolers unite for the Spirit of God in song is to share our Savior and Lord for all.


