From The Pastor

"Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God." 2 Corinthians 5:20

You would have to be loveless not to admit the brokenness of our times. Families have lost the stability of married life as God's blessing for a man and a woman. Many churches run after a social Gospel or try to surf the current cultural waves that has nothing to do with forgiveness for sinners. Government fights over policies for a direction or to balance a fiscally sound budget, but who knows how an election year will stir the pot even more. Society wonders about a terrorist attack, but plenty fear

the lawless violence lashing out in another city. Here is the reality check at the present time. Rather than reconciling, we are trying to live with divorce.

Lent takes us from brokenness between others to show the brokenness of all before God. This gaping hole is not going to be fixed on our terms whether a person denies God, pretends that all religions are the same, or claims a private Christianity against the visible Church. The call of repentance during Lent is



for all to consider Christ and Him crucified. As one writer states, "Between people, reconciliation is a two-way street. But it is not so with God's reconciliation of the world. God is the subject; we are always the objects. He reconciles us. We are passive...Christ's work is the cause of God's reconciliation" (Just Words, 139).

There is no superglue to hold together what today is in so many pieces and shambles. However, God already had plans for our broken lives being the great reconciler by sending His Son. St. Paul goes on to declare, "For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Corinthians 5:21).Rather than divorce, God gives unthinkable love. Here is the reality check of Lent. Reconciliation is not only possible, but proclaimed, lived, and shared in Christ for sinners. Since God has reconciled the world to Himself, righteousness by faith in Jesus has brought reconciliation into the world. In view of His Word and Sacraments at work by the Gospel, we will take up the topic of reconciling for our midweek services during this Lent season.

Such peace established by God is also effective before life by His grace shared between sinners. If things are fractured and faltering, it means we are only dancing around the need for a reconciled life. Even churches will fail if they try to reconcile to a culture today that has divorced itself from God and His Word. Mending life without Christ leaves it to be manmade apart from what God delivers for men by the Gospel. The Lord has our best interest in mind, since His aim is on our eternal salvation. From this hope to save by His Son, there is a place to reconcile relationships. "'Peace, peace, to the far and to the near,' says the Lord, 'and I will heal him" (Isaiah 57:19). Lent offers healing to us and any by way of the cross. Christ bears the brokenness with love from God and this love can be shared with one another.




