From The Pastor

"I am astonished that you are so quickly deserting him who called you in the grace of Christ and are turning to a different gospel— not that there is another one, but there are some who trouble you and want to distort the gospel of Christ." Galatians 1:6-7

As the month of October is a reminder of farmers in the fields and hunters out looking for wild game, we take a moment to recall our Lutheran heritage and the benefit it gave to the entire Western Church. Many picture Martin Luther hammering the 95-theses on to the castle door church in Wittenberg as what opened the floodgates for true Reformation. However, the Gospel is not merely something "discovered" like a scientist in a lab. It is not about just doing the right thing and "poof" the Reformation just falls into place. Instead, what happened was truly a miracle that let light shine once again in the darkness. Yet miracles are short lived, especially when attention spans today are at an all-time low. You can hear St. Paul clearly say, "I am astonished that you are so quickly deserting him who called you..."

The problem remains for us just as it did for Luther AFTER the Reformation. It is not as if hammering on the door sounded forth change and victory in Christ. Luther tells us the reality he faced, "So we today complain with Paul that the blindness and perversity of men

is so horrible that no one is willing to accept the doctrine of grace and salvation. Or if there are some who accept it, they soon fall away from it. Nevertheless, it brings with it every benefit, both spiritual and physical, namely, the forgiveness of sins, peace of heart, and eternal life. It also brings light and sound judgment about everything. It approves and supports civil government, the home, and every way of life that has been ordained and established by God. It eradicates all doctrines of error, sin, death, sedition, confusion, etc. In short, it uncovers all the works of the devil and opens to us the works of God. What madness is the world up to when it so bitterly hates this Word, this Gospel of eternal comfort, grace, salvation, and eternal life, and when it blasphemes and persecutes it with such satanic rage?" (Luther's Works Vol. 26).

Madness abounds not merely from darkness, but when distorting the Gospel no longer allows for the Gospel. If the devil cannot hold a person in captivity, he will just throw them into chaos. We are facing chaos in our time. It extends far beyond governance, economics, or even defining family. Only Christ and His Word can save sinners from spinning out of control in this world. "And he is before all things, and in him all things hold together" (Colossians 1:17). Holding the course is to confess the Reformation by teaching the Word of God in truth and purity while administering the sacraments according to Christ. Herman Sasse, a modern day Luther, understood Lutherans in American were in a land of confused Christianity. He says, "Only by means of this 'rigid' (as the world calls it), firm, and clear position was Lutheranism able to maintain itself. There was no Lutheranism that was receptive to the influences of the world, that was broad-minded, liberal, and modern. There were indeed Lutherans who became liberal. But then they ceased to be Lutheran" (Letters to Lutheran Pastors, Vol. 1 167).

Here are a few questions for you...What is *celebrated* at Christmas? Of course, we as Christians know the answer is Jesus' birth. What is *celebrated* at Easter? Again, the answer is obvious - Jesus' resurrection. Here's a little harder one...What is *celebrated* at Thanksgiving? According to Britannica, we celebrate the harvest and other blessings of the past year. Christians, particularly, give thanks to God.

Now, if I asked you **how** we celebrate each of these observances, there we'll get a whole list of answers that both Christians and non-Christians agree on. Christians, of course, put up Christmas trees, hunt for Easter eggs and look forward to Santa and the Easter Bunny's visits. Christians also make a point to **worship** God on those high festivals because we understand what is truly **celebrated**.

What is a Christian to do about October 31 then? So many traditions and activities associated with Halloween center around fun for children so we, in our Lutheran school grapple with this question annually. We know that Halloween has pagan and even demonic historic roots and that Christians have nothing to *celebrate* on that day. So here's how we've chosen to mark the end of October. In our school we let children have fun and dress up, but we're careful to stress that costumes may not be scary. We have classroom parties, but our activities are careful to avoid demonic symbols and characters such as witches and ghosts. Of course we pass out candy....because...it's candy!!!

As a school we don't want to squelch fun or be serious all the time. The Christian life should be joyful! We are also charged to live IN the world, just not OF it. We want our Christian witness to reflect the freedom we have as God's chosen people. That means that we are very intentional about how we observe October 31...and we never, never celebrate it.


Cardinal Music
