


From The Pastor's Desk

Former professor Rev. Harold Senkbeil and founder of Doxology-The Lutheran Center For Spiritual Care and Council writes, "By our Lord's own mandate, he has so arranged it in his church that we grow, are fed, nourished, guarded, and protected not out of the weakness and ineptitude of our ministers but rather by the tools Christ has entrusted into their hands. The gospel and the sacraments are not static entities—mere object lessons by which we advertise and promote the kingdom of God. Rather, the gospel and the sacraments throb with vitality. They are filled to the brim with the energy and life of God's own Spirit." (The Cure of Souls, p.30).

Sin, death, and devil do not to give relief even during the summer months. There are good questions to consider, "When can a person call upon their pastor? How has the servant of Christ been a part of my life? Why is pastoral care an extension of God's Divine Service from Sunday? The answer comes, "You are the precious sheep of Christ and He cares for you!"

Here is a list of a few things I as pastor can extend in Christ's Name and for your benefit.

- · You are ill, in the hospital, or had surgery
- · Have a new baby, stillbirth, or miscarriage
- Need for baptism of child or adult
- Communion at home for physically distressed
- Personal or family strife
- Breakdown of marriage or facing divorce
- Comfort of Private Confession/Absolution
- Bereavement over loss of loved one
- Are leaving for college or military service
- To be included in the pastor's daily prayers
- · Healing and spiritual care with abuse or violence
- Coping with changes before life such as retirement
- Go over funeral preparations and the church service
- Blessing of a home as gift of security to the family
- Guidance for private and family devotional life
- Support with ethical matters on infertility, end of life, vocation, etc....
- Demonic affliction, dealing with persecution, or facing addictions
- Need help from losing job or other unfortunate circumstance to bear

Call Day 2025 celebrates seminarians sent to serve in Christ's name

112 students receive assignments, first calls After years of preparation and a Call Day filled with joy, 112 Concordia Seminary, St. Louis students learned their placement of first calls to pastoral and diaconal ministry and assignments as vicars and deaconess interns.

First calls to serve as pastors, deaconesses, chaplains and missionaries in <u>The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod</u> (LCMS) were announced at a 7 p.m. worship service in which Dr. Dien Taylor, president of the LCMS Atlantic District, delivered the sermon.

"Serving sisters and preaching brothers are the 'today' answers to many past prayers offered by the humble saints long before their deaconesses and pastors were ever there. Now, wounded healers will proclaim and explain that Jesus is 'my Lord and my God,' not because we see clearly – but because we believe that the Lord still saves valiantly – proclaimed in words of hope and embodied in acts of charity," said Taylor.

"Broadcasting His victory over sin and death, the whole people of God will witness how the risen Christ who conquered death defeats their fears, hushes their worries and excites them for a promise-filled future. 'I know the plans that I have for you,' says the Lord. 'Plans to prosper you and not to hurt you; to give you a hope and a future." The pastoral students receiving calls included 42 Master of Divinity (M.Div.), three Residential Alternate Route (RAR) students, three Center for Hispanic Studies (CHS) students, five Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Theology (EIIT) students and three Cross-cultural Ministry Center

(CMC) students. Five residential Deaconess Studies Program students also received calls.

Earlier today, 42 M.Div. and three RAR students who will serve as vicars and six residential Deaconess Studies students who will serve as interns received their assignments at a 3 p.m. worship service. The vicarage and deaconess internships assignments provide students the opportunity for in-service education.

During the vicarage and deaconess internship assignment service, Dr. Bill Harmon, president of the LCMS Southeastern District, preached. "I guarantee you that over this next year — in fact, over the course of your entire ministry you will have seasons of doubt and uncertainty. It might happen right after your first voters meeting. It certainly could happen after you leave the ICU as you share the commendation of the dying with someone you've grown to love who dies in a tragic way, and everything else in between that happens in ministry," said Harmon, addressing the students. "When those times happen, remember that in the midst of things we cannot understand, we believe and trust in the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins and life everlasting. Remember that now all the vault of heaven resounds. Christ has triumphed! He is living! And that victory is in your heart. That victory is your strength. That victory is your hope. That victory is your promise."

All calls and assignments will be served in LCMS congregations and ministries. A complete list of assignments and placements, including an interactive map and photos, can be found at csl.edu/call-day

Calls and assignments were shared on X, formerly known as Twitter, in real time during both services, and many people shared their celebratory comments and photos with the hashtag #callday2025.

"Jesus Christ is 'the faithful witness, the firstborn of the dead, and the ruler of kings on earth' (Rev. 1:5 ESV). His merciful salvation and eternal promises are worthy of declaring to the ends of the earth, and these new servants of Christ will go forth to do just that," said Seminary President <u>Dr. Thomas J. Egger.</u> "Each of these calls and placements represents the ongoing work of our risen Lord. He is providing pastors, missionaries, chaplains and deaconesses for His church, until He comes again."

While today marks the campus' primary annual

Call Day celebration, the Seminary recognizes and celebrates additional calls throughout the year. CTSFW Announces Calls and Assignments



FORT WAYNE, April 30, 2025—Students at Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne (CTSFW), learned where they will be serving as pastors, vicars, and deaconess interns in two special services held April 28 and April 29 in Kramer Chapel. The Seminary announced 84 assignments and placements in 26 of the 35 districts of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS).

Forty men receive calls. At the call service April 29, 40 students, including 35 Master of Divinity students and five Alternate Route students, received their first calls into pastoral ministry. Most candidates will be serving LCMS congregations in the US, with one receiving a call from the LCMS Board for International Mission to serve as a missionary.

Dr. Scott Murray, third vice-president of the LCMS and chair of the CTSFW Board of Regents, served as preacher for the service, focusing in his sermon on the power of the Gospel as the only power of the ministry.

"The Gospel must be preached with promiscuous generosity," said Murray. "We don't listen to it, accept it, believe it, or cling to it by nature. It is a miracle every time it comes to us and every time it is believed. The scriptural revelation is so rich and varied in its multifaceted Gospel content that you preachers will never—and I mean never exhaust it."

rector of certification and placement at CTSFW, provided a snapshot of this year's call process befice of the Holy Ministry was receiving a call.

As has been the case in recent years, the number of calls available exceeded the number of new pastors available from the two LCMS seminaries, with 54 of 165 calls going unfilled. Pulse asked everyone to keep congregations not receiving a pastor in their prayers.

CTFSW President Dr. Jon S. Bruss echoed Pulse's plea at the end of the service. "Keep those blood-bought flocks in your prayers," Bruss said. "Pray that the Lord of the harvest would continue to raise up pastors."

He then offered a recruiting message.


"Men, don't be stingy with the gifts that the Lord has given you. The Lord has gifted you in significant ways. Come to the seminary. And families, do not hold back your sons, but help them see what a blessing it is to serve in the ordained ministry of Word and Sacrament."






