



FAIR RULES & REGULATIONS

- 1. Exhibitor must be a resident of Platte County Wyoming Trade Area.
- 2. Only 2022 & 2023 products will be shown except in cases where stated otherwise. If evidence is produced to show that this rule is violated, the entry shall be removed from exhibition. Only those classes shown in this book shall be exhibited or judged.
- 3. Youth Exhibitors must submit fair entries no later than Friday July 1, 2023. All entries must be submitted online at fairentry.com Exhibitors may also come into the Fair Office or Extension Office to put their entries into the computer. For entry and judging schedules, please refer to that specific department. All livestock exhibits must remain in place until 7:00 a.m. Sunday. All Open Class, 4-H, and FFA exhibits in the Agriplex will be released between 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. on Saturday. The buildings will open at 7:00 a.m. on Sunday. The Fair Board is not responsible for exhibits left after 10:00 a.m. on Sunday.
- 4. <u>The Platte County Fair and its management will not be responsible for accidents (fire, theft, etc.) that may occur on the grounds to persons or property, although, every precaution to guard against them will be taken.</u> <u>THE FAIR BOARD HAS THE RIGHT TO REMOVE FROM THE PREMISES ANYONE EXHIBITING INAPPROPRIATE BEHAVIOR.</u>
- 5. The distribution of handbills or other advertising material is strictly prohibited and no tacking or posting advertising bills, cards, etc. will be permitted on any of the buildings or elsewhere. No person will be allowed to do any soliciting for any paper, merchandise, or articles unless they first obtain permission from the manager and pay the required fee.
- 6. For special exhibits and concessions, see Fair Manager. The Fair Board reserves the right to close any concession at any time and remove it from the grounds.
- 7. Open class livestock classes will only be offered when at least three unrelated entries are received.
- 8. In June 1982, the 1940 agreement between the Wyoming State Department of Vocational Education and the Wyoming Agricultural Extension Service involving 4-H and FFA youth was reviewed and amended to read as follows:

"If a boy or girl is enrolled in both 4-H and Vocational Agriculture or Home Economics, work done must be different in each. For example: 4-H or FFA members may carry the same type of supervised occupational experience program in vocational agriculture or as a 4-H project, but the exhibit must be different in each. The FFA exhibit must come from a supervised FFA program, and the 4-H exhibit must come from a 4-H project."

- 9. A project done in school should be eligible for display or show through one, but only one organization.
- 10. Underage Tabaco/Vaping, illegal drugs and or contraband and alcohol use will not be tolerated. Use of illegal substances will lead to the local authorities being called and/or other consequences can and will be implemented at the Fair Boards discretion.

PROTESTS

All protests must be filed with the manager and must state plainly the cause for complaint and appeal and must be made within two (2) days following the final date of the Fair and accompanied by a non-refundable \$50 appeal fee, payable in the form of cash, money order or certified check.

CAMPGROUNDS

- Camper parking will be by reservation only. This includes all dry camping as well. Please call the Fair Office (322-9504) to register. Camper slots will be given as a first reserve basis. No camper parking will be permitted prior to July 30th, 2023.
- 2. All campers MUST check in at the fair office prior to parking.
- 3. Camper parking fee **– \$100.00** for the week and MUST be paid prior to parking camper or camper will be towed at owner's expense.
- 4. Dry Camping is allowed in designated areas only. Dry camping is **\$25.00** for the week and MUST be paid prior to parking your camper.

JUDGES

- 1. Judges are requested to read carefully the general and special rules under which this Fair is managed prior to entering their duties making special note of and marking all rules.
- 2. Judges, please report to management before entering the show.
- 3. No judges shall make any award other than those specified in the premium list, without the written consent of the Manager.
- 4. Judges shall report to the superintendent any exhibitor or exhibitors who in any way, whether in person or by agent, interferes with them during their work or shows any disrespect to them. The superintendent shall, at his/her discretion, demand the exhibitor to withdraw from the competition if guilty of such acts.
- 5. At the discretion of the judges, any exhibit not promptly presented when called for, will be ruled out and barred from competition.
- 6. Each Shower will be assigned one (1) pen per two (2) animals per species excluding Poultry, Rabbit and Beef. There will be a \$25.00 pen charge for each extra pen requested. Extra pens will be used for animals only, not tack. All fees will be requested and paid for at the Platte County Fair Office Prior to July 1st or no extra pens will be available.

SUPERINTENDENTS

- 1. It shall be the duty of each Superintendent to inform the judges of their department rules and regulations governing awards and to urge them to carefully read the rules before entering their work.
- 2. Each Superintendent is charged with caring for and placing of the exhibits by class number in their department. THE SUPERINTENDENT MUST SEE THAT ALL AWARDS ARE DULY AND PROPERLY ENTERED.
- **3.** The Superintendent in charge MUST CHECK THE ENTRIES AND KEEP THE EXHIBIT FILE IN ORDER FOR THEIR DEPARTMENT SO THAT THE SAME WILL SHOW WHAT ARTICLES OR ANIMALS WERE PASSED UPON BY JUDGES.
- 4. Where awards are made in all classes, the Superintendent in charge must see that the name, registry number, etc. of the exhibit's awarded prizes are noted on the tags and/or call sheets.
- 5. Each Superintendent will be informed of time of judging in their department. They will endeavor to have all exhibitors present and urge them to lend their assistance by having entries ready.
- 6. All livestock Superintendents will be responsible for collecting health papers and turning them into the fair office.
- 7. All Superintendents will oversee Herdsmanship in their respective areas. All stalls, pens and surrounding areas are to be kept clean and free of trash.

GOVERNING ANIMALS AT PLATTE COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS

- 1. All animals presented for exhibition or competition at the Platte County Fairgrounds will be considered under quarantine and not eligible for exhibit until a certificate of veterinarian inspection documenting that the animal's to be exhibited are in good health and free of contagious disease is presented to superintendent for review prior to unloading on grounds.
- 2. No animals will be allowed to exhibit or compete at the Platte County Fair without a current certificate of veterinarian inspection. Certificates of Veterinary Inspection for all animals except poultry and rabbits are only valid for thirty (30) days.
- **3.** The Platte County Fair Board's veterinarians may implement any special inspection or quarantine procedure that is believed necessary to prevent the spread of contagious diseases to humans or other animals. An animal showing symptoms of a contagious disease shall be placed under quarantine or removed from the County Fairgrounds at the discretion of the Platte County Fair Board's veterinarians.
- 4. The professional judgment of the Platte County Fair Board's veterinarian's will be the final deciding factor in all animal health decisions.
- 5. The Platte County Fair Board's management team reserves the right to develop, employ, and enforce individual animal health inspections at any time. The Management of fair advisors will make this decision if they feel it is necessary for the health and/or well-being of animals, public health, or other specific health

concerns.

- 6. All livestock entering the Platte County Fairgrounds will be required to be health inspected at the designated check point, except for horses, dogs, rabbits, and cats. These animals will be required to get health inspections from the veterinarian prior to entering the grounds.
- 7. All vehicles with livestock will enter the east arena gate. After passing inspection they will enter fairgrounds through the track area and around the arena. Animals will not be permitted to unload and stall until health papers are turned into area superintendent. Beef, swine, sheep, goats, rabbit, and poultry will not be permitted on the grounds to stall prior to 7:00 a.m. on Tuesday.
- 8. Each Shower will be assigned one (1) pen per two (2) animals per species excluding Poultry, Rabbit and Beef. There will be a \$25.00 pen charge for each extra pen requested. Extra pens will be used for animals only, not tack. All fees will be requested and paid for at the Platte County Fair Office Prior to July 1st.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT

- 1. Only 4-H or FFA members may compete in any of the classes in this department. 4-H members must turn 8 years old by January 1of the current year and not passed their 19th birthday before December 31of the current year.
- 2. A review board will deal with any questionable situations that may arise during the county fair. The review board will be composed of two Fair Board members, 4-H Leaders' Council President, 4-H club leader/FFA Advisor from club to which member belongs, Division Superintendent, Sale Committee Member of species in question, and 4-H Educator.
- 3. Exhibit must be the result of the exhibitor's project for which he or she is enrolled this year.
- 4. Members must be present to show their own animals when judging takes place. If unforeseen circumstances arise, the superintendent must be notified of who will be showing in place of member.
- 5. Animals are allowed one check weight prior to accepting the final weight.
- 6. Herdsman AWARDS in Beef, Swine, Sheep, all Goats, Rabbits and Poultry will be awarded to individuals <u>or</u> clubs doing the best job of keeping their areas clean during the fair.
- 7. Superintendents in their division have the authority to ask that exhibitors remove their exhibit if animal(s) are not cared for in a husband like manner. Unruly animals or those that get away more than twice, may be asked to be removed from the Fairgrounds.
- 8. GENERAL CARE: Feeding, watering, cleaning pens/stalls, etc. of animals during the Platte County Fair should be the responsibility of the 4-H or FFA member. Older members are encouraged to help younger members
- 9. All livestock brought to the fair must be ready to show (cattle and horses' halter broke).
- 10. No boars, stallions, dairy bulls, beef bulls, or billies will be allowed in any 4-H showmanship event.
- 11. Showmanship contestants must own and show their own animal.
- 12. Any FFA or 4-H youth that takes Jr. Livestock Sale animals to Wyoming State Fair is still responsible for delivering that animal to the buyer of his or her animal. In the case of a resale animal the resale amount must be reimbursed to the buyer of said animal if animal cannot be delivered.
- 13. No Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Rabbits, or Poultry will be allowed on the Fairgrounds prior to 7:00 a.m. Tuesday. All Livestock exhibits must remain in place until 8:00 am Sunday morning at which time animals will be released. Exception: Horses, Dogs, Cats and Calves born in 2022 are not required to remain on the fairgrounds for the entire week.
- 14. Each Shower will be assigned one (1) pen per two (2) animals per species excluding Poultry, Rabbit and Beef. There will be a \$25.00 pen charge for each extra pen requested. **Extra pens will be used for animals only, not tack.** All fees will be requested and paid for at the Platte County Fair Office Prior to July 1st.



Only livestock with health inspections will be permitted to unload and stall signs will be posted. This is for your safety and to ensure all livestock is healthy and free of disease. We want everyone to have a safe and healthy fair. Fair discretion to remove any animal that is deemed sick.

LIVESTOCK SALE

GUIDELINES AND REGULATIONS

ANIMALS PROPERLY CARED FOR

Animals must be fed and watered, and stalls cleaned, or animals will be sent home.

SALE ORDER

When you leave the show, ring tell your Livestock Superintendent you are going to sell an animal. Be polite and concise. Check the bulletin board to see if your superintendent listed all sellers, if not, let superintendent know. Only if it is our mistake will you be added to the sale order after it is made! ALSO, check bulletin board Friday afternoon so you will know when you sell. <u>Please be ready with your animal and on time to sell, do not make us come look for you!</u> No substitution of animals will be allowed.

NO SALES & CHECK DEDUCTIONS

Once an animal enters the sale ring, it must be sold to the highest bidder. No sales are not allowed. There will be a commission taken out of every check and brand inspection fees are taken out of beef, sheep, and goat checks.

SALE RESPONSIBILITIES

After you have sold your animal in the sale ring, someone will help you put your animal back while you take the sales receipt and a buyer board to the buyer, be sure to ask and see if your animal is to be a buy back. **BE POLITE AND THANK THEM.** Then **RETURN** the sales receipt to the front table and check on your animal and make sure it is back in its pen. Remember that the animal is still your responsibility until you deliver it to the buyer. <u>You must feed water and care for it until you deliver it to the buyer</u>. It must stay on the fairgrounds until at least 7:00 a.m., Sunday.

BUY BACKS

A buy back list will be posted on Saturday. Check and see if you are on it. <u>If so, be there to help</u> <u>load your animal</u>. <u>If you are going to State Fair with your sale animal, let us know immediately or it will</u> <u>be gone with the rest of the buyback animals</u>. **The Fair Board has requested that Buy Back animals be loaded out on Sunday morning if possible.** All animals sold, whether a buy back animal or not, must be delivered to or arrangements made for delivery of the animal, within fourteen (14) days of the end of State Fair (by September 1.) *If the animal is not delivered or prior arrangements made for delivery, the sale will be treated as a "no sale" and the buyer will be refunded their money and the seller will keep the animal.* **No resale of buy back animals will be allowed on the fairgrounds.**

THANK YOU NOTES

Thank you notes should be neatly written, in an unsealed, addressed, stamped envelope, and submitted to the Extension Office soon after County Fair, no later than September 15, *or you run the risk of forfeiting your sale check.* You must bring a thank you note into the Extension Office in person to pick up your check. <u>Remember, you must write a thank you note to your buyer(s)</u> and bring it/them into the Extension Office before your check will be released!! *Checks WILL NOT be given to anyone but the seller or their parent.*







- 1. The "Household Pet" cat is a mixed breed of unknown descent.
- 2. A purebred cat is one belonging to a recognized breed with characteristics maintained through generations of unmixed descent; may be registered with a recognized registry.
- 3. Kittens must be at least 4 months old and not older than 8 months of age. Adult cats are older than 8 months. Because of susceptibility to disease, no kitten under 4 months of age will be accepted for competition.
- 4. No pregnant or nursing cats may be entered.
- 5. All cats and kittens must have their claws clipped. Declawed cats may enter the show and will not be counted down for declawing.
- 6. Do not enter your cat if you feel it will not be easily handled by the judge.
- 7. Each cat or kitten must be wearing a harness or collar (not a safety collar) and a leash. The exhibitor must always wear the leash on their wrist for safety reasons.
- 8. **Exhibitors must furnish their own carpet square during judging.** Exhibitors must provide a proper cage or carrier for their cats/kittens. Exhibitors must bring their own litter and litter box.
- 9. All exhibitors should wear long-sleeved shirts or blouses with trousers or skirts. No shorts allowed.
- 10. All cats exhibited must be in the name of one individual owner by June 1, of present year, which is the ownership deadline.

Health Requirements:

Cats must have current rabies and distemper shots. It is strongly suggested, but not mandatory, that all entries have the combination vaccinations, plus feline leukemia. Vaccinations should not be received within three weeks prior to the show. Health Certificates are required.

Cats found to be ill or with parasites (fleas, ear mites, etc.) will not be allowed to show and will be dismissed from the grounds. No cat or kitten may enter the show if there is any (feline) infectious or contagious disease in the household within three weeks prior to the show date.

 - a. Showmanship Champion Junior, Intermediate & Senior
 - b. Obedience receiving a qualifying score of 170 or above.
 - c. *Confirmation* Youth placing in the top 4 at County Fair
 - d. *Agility & Rally* Must compete at the same level at the State Show that they qualified for at the county level.
- 2. For Purposes of classification into junior (age 8-10), intermediate (age 11-13) and senior (14 years of age but not 19) age divisions, all 4-H members ages are determined as of January 1 of the year of the show.
- 3. All dogs must be at least 6 months of age by May 1 to compete at the State 4-H Dog Show and 1 year of age by May 1 for agility classes.
- 4. All animal entries of Wyoming origin must be accompanied by an official health certificate issued at the point of origin by an accredited veterinarian. Certificates for dog entries must show current immunizations as per state veterinary guidelines. No animals will be allowed to exhibit at the Platte County Fair and the Wyoming State Fair without a valid Animal Health Certificate. Shot records will be checked.
- 5. Vicious dogs will be dismissed from the ring and must be removed from the premises.
- 6. Females in heat will be allowed in classes. However, they will go through at the end of all classes.
- 7. Spayed, monorchid and neutered dogs may be shown without judging discrimination.
- 8. Dogs must be clean and well groomed.
- 9. The show committee reserves the right to ask anyone violating these rules to leave.
- 10. Judging of classes will be done with AKC rules as guidelines; however, *specific Wyoming 4-H Dog Show Rules (Rule numbers 1, 2, 3 & 4) will supersede AKC Rules.*
- 11. Entries for Rally classes and Agility classes will need a current Wyoming 4-H Jump Height card at check-in to verify correct class entries.
- 12. All dogs must always be on leash (excluding competition) and under control. Platte County Fair rules prohibit any dog from being any place but the campground and the site of the dog show. Dogs must NOT be taken near stock barns. Once judging is completed, all dogs must be removed from the Fairgrounds.

Obedience Rules:

- A 4-H member may compete in only one obedience class per dog. A 4-H member may enter a maximum of two dogs in obedience classes. For class entries, their first dog is referred to as the "A" dog. The other dog is referred to as their "B" dog. An exhibitor competes in an "A" class with their first dog and in a "B" class with their second dog.
- The first-year beginner novice class is for members who are in their first year of the dog project, not the first year with a new dog. It is designed as a training class for members who do not feel competent to start in the On-Leash class. Members may compete in the first-year beginner novice class only once.
- 3. Members advance from On Leash A to Novice A or from On Leash B to Novice B. On Leash B is for the dog or exhibitor with previous experience in the class. An exhibitor who begins in the A group stays in the A group for each class. The same is true for the B group.
- 4. 4-H members with an obedience dog shown previously by another 4-H member, or a dog that has a title from another organization or has three qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show, handler or an obedience

title must show the dog by these guidelines:

- a. Junior and Intermediate 4-H'ers may move back or down one level.
- Senior 4-H'ers must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved. b.
- 5. Males and females will be shown in the same class. Females in heat will be shown last and must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.
- 6. A dog having a qualifying score of 170 points at the designated County Fair may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show. Once the higher level of obedience is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
- 7. Score Sheets: The Wyoming 4-H dog score sheets were designed for the benefit of 4-H members. They are intended as guides for judges. Judges use their discretion in deciding the seriousness of errors.
- 8. All dogs must enter/leave the show ring and compete with a six-foot leash.
- 9. High in trial will be calculated based on the raw score plus 5 additional points with each increase in level of difficulty.
- 10. Bait and/or toys are not allowed in obedience competition.
- 11. Dogs soiling or urinating in the ring during judging will be disqualified and receive no score. Please see the current Wyoming State Fair Book for complete guidelines for state fair

- 3. The level at which a member qualifies at the county level is the level in which they will compete at the State 4-H Dog Show.
- 4. A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 75 points at the county 4-H show fair may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores from the designated county 4-H show. Once the higher level in agility is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
- 5. Youth, with a dog shown in previous years by another 4-H member, or a dog that has a standard agility title from another organization, or has received three qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show, must show the dog under these guidelines:
 - A. Junior and Intermediate aged 4-H youth may move "back" or "down" one level.
 - B. Senior aged 4-H youth must show the dog at the highest level that the dog achieved.
- 6. An entry in the State 4-H Agility Contest must have competed in a county agility contest to qualify. To enter Agility, you must also have participated in another 4-H dog exhibit (obedience and/or conformation) during the current 4-H year at your county fair. A qualifying score is not required in obedience classes, only participation at county fair.

- 7. Level 1 leashes can be up to 6 ft. in length. Level 2 dogs must run off leash or with a tab no longer than 6 inches.
- 8. Collars must be of a flat, buckle variety with nothing hanging from it such as tags.
- 9. All Dogs must enter and leave the ring on the leash.
- 10. Bait is not allowed in agility competition.
- 11. Dogs in heat will run at the end of each class.
- 12. All Dogs will be measured and placed in the proper height class before their agility class starts.
- 13. Fastest times will be used to break ties on scores at all levels.
- 14. A time for handlers (only) to familiarize themselves with the course they are competing in will be established and announced.

- 4. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. Those competing in on leash classes should do so with a 6-foot leash.
- 5. Collars may be flat buckle (leather or nylon) or choke chains.
- 6. No bait (dog treats or toys) is allowed in the ring.
- 7. Entries must achieve qualifying scores at their county level before competing in the state 4-H Dog Show. The level at which a member qualifies at the county level is the level in which they compete at the State 4-H Dog Show.
- 8. A dog must advance levels after receiving 3 qualifying scores. Once a level is selected for the dog, the member may not drop to a lower level to compete with that dog.
- 9. Rally Advanced Excellent (RAE) Class Only-Participation ribbons will be given in the Advanced and Excellent classes regardless of qualifying score. If qualifying scores are received in both classes, then placement ribbons will be given.

Classes are based on age of the youth and the experience of the dog and include:

Novice Dog: A dog competing which has not obtained three qualifying scores from competitions nor has a Rally title from another organization.

Pre-Advanced Dog: A dog which has received three qualifying scores as a Novice Dog but has not earned a qualifying score as an Advanced Dog.

Advanced Dog: A dog which has received three qualifying scores from competitions, received a score of at least 70 points in a Novice Dog class, or that has a Rally title from another organization.

Excellent Dog: A dog which has received three qualifying scores from competition, received a score of at least 70 points in an Advanced Dog class, or that has a Rally title from another organization.

Rally Advanced Excellent (RAE): After receiving three qualifying scores from competitions, the handler and dog move up to this level. At this level, the handler and dog will compete in both Advanced Dog and Excellent Dog classes at the same show. The handler and dog must earn a qualifying score of 70 in each of the classes (Advanced and Excellent) to earn ribbons and or prizes. Handler and dog may show at this level indefinitely.

- 8. ABUSE: The Platte County Fair does not condone excessive bracing, slapping, or lifting the legs of market goats in the show ring or while on grounds.
- 9. The slapping or lifting of Market Goats in the show ring is not allowed. All goats must have four feet on the ground during the judge's inspection or handling. Lifting feet off the ground or placing feet on any support or altered ring surface is not acceptable. Exhibitors will receive one warning if they are found lifting or slapping goats. Second offenses will result in automatic exhibitor and animal disqualification.



- 5. Poultry can be fed only commercial feed during the fair.
- 6. AN EXHIBITOR MAY NOT EXHIBIT MORE THAN TWELVE (12) LOTS TOTAL. NO MORE THAN TWO (2) ENTRIES PER PERSON PER CLASS.
- Competition in chickens and turkeys will be limited to the following specific breeds and varieties. Each contestant
 must provide own feed, feeders, and waterers. Each contestant is responsible for pen cleanliness in area around pen.
 The Bird of Show can come from any cage except for Open Class.
- 8. EXHIBITOR MUST BE PRESENT DURING JUDGING
- 9. Poultry Exhibitors should use sawdust under all cages and keep soiled sawdust cleaned each day replacing with clean sawdust each day. There will be awards in herdsmanship for Poultry.



1.All exhibitors must be residents of Platte County, in the Wyoming trade area, or members of the Platte County Art Guild.

2.Exhibitors need to pre-register with the Fair Office. All entries must be executed within the last 3 years and not previously entered in the Platte County Fair. Exhibitors are entitled to enter one (1) exhibit per class. Entries need not have a western theme 3.Entries must be art done from an original idea conceived by the participating artist.

Copies of work by other artists or from published photos are not accepted.

- Hanging attachments for wall display. All hanging works of art and photography must be framed, mounted with eye screws and wire is the preferred method. Any exceptions are to be approved with Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent. For safety purposes, ONLY entries with the approved proper hanging attachments will be accepted. Entries that do not comply with these requirements will be turned away until properly submitted. NO string or wire affixed by tape or saw tooth hangers. Children's division are the only work that does not need to comply with the above, but it must be able to hang from large hooks on pegboard display walls. (Yarn or string thru holes on cardboard or mat board are acceptable.)
- 2. The artists name, address and phone number must appear on the back of pictures or on the bottom of sculptures. Seniors and Children must indicate their age on entries. Business cards and prices can only be shown on the back of pictures or on the bottom of standing articles. Any artwork sold or unsold must remain in the Agriplex until the "fair" closes.
- 3. All entries need to be brought Agriplex from 8:00am to 1:30 pm on Tuesday, July 28, no late entries can be accepted. Strings for tags and entry tags will be furnished at the Agriplex. All artwork and photos will be released between 5:00 and 6:00pm on Saturday, Aug 1st. Work left will be at the Fair Office.

DEFINITIONS

PROFESSIONAL: Refers to those who derive significant income from their art or those who have a certificate, degree, diploma, or three or more years of formal training or teach visual art.

ADVANCED AMATEUR: Refers to those who have exhibited and won first prizes in

accredited or recognized shows (Platte County Fair or State Fair) OR who have had professional schooling but have not completed more than three years.

AMATEUR: Refers to those who have not previously won first prizes as an amateur and have little or no schooling. **JUNIOR:** Refers to those who have not reached their 19th birthday before Aug 1, of current year.

CHILDREN: Refers to Those who have not reached their 12th birthday before Aug 1, of current year. The children's display will be in the main 4H hall and will be judged by a qualified member of the Platte County Art Guild who will be generous with awards.

SENIOR: Refers to exhibitors 65 years of age or older as of Aug 1st, of current year.

EXHIBITORS: may place into a higher proficiency level (except professional) if they feel they are qualified to compete; however, an exhibitor cannot go to a lower level.

LIFESTYLE/HISTORICAL: Works of art depicting how people work, live, think, or play, past or present

NON-OBJECTIVE: The art may be non-objective, abstract, or an inventive way of using different media

MATTED AND FRAMED UNDER GLASS OR PLEXIGLAS: Works of Art will meet the same standards as in the past. Photography exhibitors may use canvas wrapped frames when the work extends around all four sides of the frame, or a border is printed and extends around all four sides. Work printed on metal, glass wood or other material must cover the entire facing surface and be able to hang safely on wire and glass or Plexiglas is not required. No raw or unprinted areas should be seen when approaching these pieces. Large pieces of artwork or photography (over 2 ft by 2 ft or 576 sq. in.) should not be under glass for safety reasons. Exhibitors may use Plexiglas on large pieces but will not be required to. SUPERINTENDENTS: Any exceptions and appeals to these requirements must be approved by the Superintendents. The guide for Superintendents is to facilitate displaying as much work as possible including <u>minor</u> assistance with hangers,

Vegetables and Fruits

The following information will aid in preparing vegetables for exhibit.

Apples - Specimen should be uniform in variety, color, size, and maturity. Fruit should be clean and free from disease or mechanical damage. Leave stem intact and remove leaves.

Asparagus—It should be fresh, tender, and firm, with close compact tips. The stalks should be green for almost their entire length and taper uniformly. Each should be the same size in diameter at the butt and in length.

Basil – Specimen should be fresh and crisp with a strong, pleasing aroma; should be clean, free of damage, blackening, and yellowing.

Beans, Lima—Pods should be green, firm, and contain at least 3 seeds. Pods should be uniform in color, size and shape and be free from damage.

Beans, Snap—Green and wax beans should be clean, firm, crisp and free of blemishes. Long straight pods of the same length and color should be selected. The ends of the pods should not be broken, and the seed should be about half grown. **Beets, Pickling**—See Beets, Table. Diameter should be ¾ to 1 inch.

Beets, Table—Diameter should be 2 to 2 1/2 inches. Side rootlets should be removed, but taproot should not be removed. All specimens should be uniform in color, shape, and size. Tops trimmed, leaving 1 inch of leaf stalk above crown.

Broccoli – Heads should be uniform in dark green color; conditions and size should be compact, not less than 3 inches in diameter, and free from damage by disease, insects, worms, or wilting. Cut the stems squarely above the first whorl of leaves to give an overall length of 5 inches.

Brussels Sprouts – All the heads should be firm, compact, fresh, a good green color, and uniform in shape and size. Heads not less than 1 inch in diameter are desirable. Stems should be smoothly trimmed to 1/2 inch.

Cabbage - Heads should be the same variety, uniform in color, shape, and size, and should be firm, heavy inch comparison to size, free from damage by freezing, disease, or insect. Midribs should not be large, and the leaves should not be trimmed too closely. Leave stem 1/4-inch-long to hold leaves firmly.

Cantaloupe – specimens should be the same variety, free from decay, cracks, and any damage caused by insects, disease, hail, or any other means. They should be fully ripe, picked on full slip. If several days elapse between picking date and exhibit, they may be picked on half-slip and permitted to ripen with stems attached.

Carrots – Select carrots should be smooth, straight, firm, deep orange in color and free from greening at the tip. Specimens should be typical of their variety avoiding oversize, and should be free from side roots, cracks, or other damage. Cut off tops to 1 inch. Do not trim taproots.

Cauliflower – Heads should be pure white, solid, uniform, and close flowered and should not have leaves appearing through the head. Trim the green outside leaves to 1 inch above the head. Trim the butt or stem to allow 4 to 6 leaves to remain. **Celery** – Stalks should be uniform in color and size. Trim outside stalks until color is uniform. The heart, which is made of stocky inner branches, should be well developed. The outer leaves should be crisp, free from prominent ribs, splits and damage by disease and insects. Wash the plant until it is clean. Trim the root to a triangle-shape not over 1' long.

Cherries – Select fruit that is plump and fresh-looking, uniform in size, shape, color, and maturity and typical of variety. Handle carefully to prevent bruising. Stems should be attached; remove leaves. Specimen should be clean and free from disease or damage.

Chives – Should be dark green with hollow, thin leaves, preferably without flowers. Leaves should be evenly green with no signs of drying, wilt, unevenly colored leaves, or damage.

Chokecherries – Specimen should be uniform in color, size, shape, and maturity. Color should be deep, dark purplish/red.
Specimen should be clean and free from disease or damage. Remove leaves; stems may be cut to uniform length.
Corn, Sweet – Ears should be well formed and filled out to tip, free from any kind of injury. Kernels should be soft, tender, and filled with thick, opaque, milky juice. Ears should be uniform in size and should be husked and trimmed for judging, free from silks. The shank should be trimmed to 1/4 inch from the base of the cob. The tip of the ear may be neatly clipped, although only a small portion (no more the 1/2 inch) of the cob should be removed.

Crab Apples – See Apple instructions.

Cucumber, Pickling – Specimens should be of the same size, not oversized and not more than 1-1/4 inches in diameter or 4 inches long and should be mostly straight with blunt ends. Clean by brushing with a soft brush to avoid removing spines. Trim stem to 1/4 inch.

Cucumber, Slicing – Specimens should be straight, firm, uniform in color shape and size variety; not overgrown, but should be uniformly medium or dark green, 6-9 inches long. Clean by gently brushing with a soft brush to avoid reducing the natural bloom. Cut stem off to 1/4 inch.

Dill—Flower heads should be green and fragrant. Trim stems to uniform length; may leave green leaves attached. Heads should be immature and not shedding seeds. Specimen should be free of dirt, damage, discoloration, or wilted foliage.
 Eggplant – Specimens should be smooth, firm, heavy but not too large, uniform in shape and size, free from blemishes, select uniform purple coloring, free from bronzing and greening. Wipe with soft cloth, but do not wash. Trim stems to 1 inch.
 Garlic—Bulbs should be 1 1/2 – 3 inches in diameter. Bulbs should be firm and undamaged with papery dry skin.

Gherkin, West Indian - Separate from cucumbers, as the gherkin and cucumbers are different species. Avoid oversize, not more than 1-1/2 inches in diameter and not more than 3 inches long. Trim stem to 1/4 inch.

Grapes – Specimen should be firm, compact, and uniformly ripened. Select bunches that are uniform in size and color with plump, fresh-looking fruit. All grapes must be firmly attached to the stem. Handle gently to avoid skin breaks. Rinse quickly to remove dust. Do not soak as fruits may split from absorbing water. Stems may be cut to uniform length. Specimens should be free from broken skins, disease, or damage.

Kohlrabi – Specimens should not be hard, woody, or pithy. They should be 3 to 4 inches in diameter and very smooth. Skin should be easily punctured by thumbnail. Clean but do not wash. Remove all leaves by trimming the stems to 1 inch long. Cut off the stem portion just below the ball.

Lettuce, **Head/Leaf** – Specimens should be uniform in color, shape and size and should be crisp, firm, clean, and free from damage. Remove loose and damaged outer leaves. Cut off the stem 1/4 inch from the bottom leaf.

Marjoram – The leaves should look fresh and be a vibrant green gray in color; the stems should be firm. Specimen should be free from damage and blemishes.

Melon, Cantaloupe—Remove stem and all soil with a soft brush. Avoid over or under ripe, cracked, poor colored, or damaged melons.

Melon, Citron—See "watermelon".

Melon, Honeydew—See "watermelon". Stem should be removed.

Mint – Specimen should be green, fresh, and crisp with a strong, pleasing aroma; should also be clean, free of damage, and yellowing.

Onions – Specimens should be of the same variety, uniform in color, shape, and size, and should be clean and free from damage of any kind. Avoid large sizes but should not be less than 2 inches in diameter. The bulbs should have most of their papery skin intact. Do not peel to give a slick appearance. The tops (neck) should be small and trimmed to 1 inch. Green onions should be tender, medium sized stems with long, white shanks. Shanks should be smooth and uniform in size. Cut roots to 1/2 inch long. Do not peel heavily.

Oregano – Specimen should be rich green in color and firm. It should also be clean, free of damage and blemishes.

Parsley – Leaves and stems should be fresh, bright green, and free of soil, yellow or discolored leaves and damages. Trim stems to uniform length. Specimen should not be flowering or have seed heads.

Parsnips – Specimens should have firm roots and be smooth, tapering evenly; they should be small in diameter (1-1/2 to 2-1/2 inches), without side roots and should be a light creamy color, with top root left on. Trim top to 1 inch.

Peas – Pods should be fresh, bright green and well-filled with tender peas. They should be uniform in color, shape, and size, with green calyxes attached, free from any kind of injury, such as insects, disease, or hail damage.

Peppers – Specimens should be the same variety, must be the same color and should be uniform in shape and size. Sweet green peppers should be healthy with no reddish blush or other discoloration. Sweet red or yellow peppers should have healthy, clear red or yellow color, with no greenish tinges. All peppers should be free from sun scald or damages caused by

insects and diseases. Leave stem on and trim to 1 inch.

Plums – Select fruit that is plump and fresh-looking, uniform in size, shape, color, and maturity and typical of variety. Handle carefully to prevent bruising. Stems should be attached; remove leaves. Natural length of stems may vary. Specimen should be clean and free from disease or damage.

Potatoes—Remove soil with a soft brush. Should be firm, heavy for their size and true to shape for variety. Should be free of green spots and any type of damage.

Pumpkin, Pie – Specimens should be uniform in color, shape, and size, free from insects and mechanical injury. Do not wash, maybe brushed clean. Leave stem attached and trim to 1 inch.

Radishes, Winter – They should be uniform in color, shape, and size. Flesh should be crisp and tender not pithy, and be free from injury caused by disease, insects, growth cracks or mechanical damage. Trim leaf tops to 1 inch. The basal husks should be removed from the bottom of the stalk.

Raspberries - Select ripe fruits of good color, uniform in size, shape, and color. Leave stems and calyces attached; remove leaves. Specimen should be clean and free from disease or damage.

Rhubarb – Stalks should be pulled from the crown of the plant. Hold the stalk firmly near the base of the plant, close to the soil, and pull straight up. Leaf should be trimmed to show one inch of leaf at the end of each stalk. Do not trim the base of the stalk. Remove any remnants of the crown sheath and gently wash off any soil or debris. Specimen should be uniform in size and color, and free from damage.

Rutabaga—Should be firm, solid, and exhibit clear color. Should be medium sized (4-6 inches) in diameter. Remove tops, leaving 1-inch stems and clip side roots. Should be free from soil and any kind of damage.

Sage – Leaves should be aromatic and should have no soft spots or dry edges. Specimen should be free from blemishes and damage. Clean gently to remove soil if necessary.

Spinach – Specimens may be harvested as entire plant with leaves left attached to the pinkish root crown. Leaves should be dark green from either the smooth or crumpled variety.

Squash, Summer – Pick when small (best eating 4 to 7 inches, depending on variety). The shell should be extremely soft, mostly tender and have undeveloped seeds. All specimens should be uniform in color, shape, and size, free from damage or blemishes. Brush to clean off dirt, do not wash. Trim stem to 1 inch.

Squash, Winter – Pick when mature, when shells are hardened. Specimens should be uniform in color, shape, and size, free from insect injury or mechanical damage. Brush to clean, but do not wash. Trim off roots and trim butt to a triangular shape. **Swiss Chard** – Specimens must be fresh, crisp, with bright green leaves and clear white stems. They should be uniform in color and size. Clean by brushing if necessary. Trim off roots and trim butt to a triangular shape.

Strawberries – Select fruit that is uniform in size, color, and shape. Fruit with white shoulders or tips should not be included. Stems and calyces should be left attached and look green and fresh; remove leaves. Specimen should be clean and free of disease and damage.

Thyme – The leaves should look fresh and be a vibrant green gray in color. They should be free from blemishes and damage. **Tomatoes**—Specimens should be uniform in color, shape, and size and free from cracks, sun scald and blemishes, ripe, solid and without stems. Specimens should be true to type and variety. Leave stems on the pickling or preserving types.

Turnips— Specimens should be uniform in size, shape, and color, medium sized, 1-1/2 to 2 3/4 inches in diameter. Flesh should be crisp, fine grained and not pithy. They should be free of damage, clean and bright in color, but not washed. They should be firm, with secondary rootlets removed. With 2 to 3 inches of taproot remaining. Trim tops to 1".

Watermelon— Specimens should be the same variety, uniform in color, shape, and size, and should be mature but not overripe. They should be free from decay or damage from sunscald, hail, insects, or disease. Wipe off dirt but do not wash. Leave stem 1".

- 1. All exhibitors must be residents of Platte County, or in the Wyoming trade area.
- 2. Exhibitors need to pre-register with the Fair Office. All entries must be executed within the last 3 years and not previously entered in the Platte County Fair. Exhibitors are entitled to enter one (1) exhibit per class. Entries need not have a western theme.
- Entries must be done from an original idea conceived by the participating artist. Copies of work by other artists or from published photos are not accepted.
- 4. Hanging attachments for wall display. All hanging works of photography must be framed, mounted with eye screws and wire is the preferred method. Any exceptions are to be approved with Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent. For safety purposes, ONLY entries with the approved proper hanging attachments will be accepted. Entries that do not comply with these requirements will be turned away until properly submitted. NO string or wire affixed by tape or saw tooth hangers. Children's are the only work that does not need to comply with the above, but it must be able to hang from large hooks on pegboard display walls. (Yarn or string thru holes on cardboard or mat board are acceptable.)
- 5. The artists name, address and phone number must appear on the back of pictures. Seniors and Children must indicate their age on entries. Business cards and prices can only be shown on the back of pictures. Any artwork sold or unsold must remain in the Agriplex until the "fair" closes.
- All entries need to be brought to Agriplex from 8:00am to 1:30 pm on Tuesday, no late entries can be accepted. Strings for tags and entry tags will be furnished at the Agriplex. All photos will be released between 5:00 and 6:00pm on Saturday. Work left will be at the Fair Office.
- 7. Judges will consider entries based on:
 - Content and appropriateness of class designation
 - Composition
 - Technical quality and overall presentation

Extra Category Information

- 1. Miniature images should be no larger than 5"x7" or 35 square inches before matting and framing. Frame size should be appropriate.
- 2. All photographic images must be at least 7.5 by 9.5 inches. All work must be matted and framed under glass or Plexiglass when appropriate.
- 3. In regular photography, prints may be in black and white or color. Prints must be made from exhibitor's original negative and printed on photographic paper by hand or by a photo lab.
- 4. Digital photography is any photo made with a digital camera, prints may be in black and white or color. Prints must be made from exhibitor's original file and printed on photographic paper, canvas, glass, metal, or any other suitable medium by hand or by a photo lab.

DEFINITIONS

PROFESSIONAL: Refers to those who derive significant income from their art or those who have a certificate, degree, diploma, or three or more years of formal training or teach visual art.

ADVANCED AMATEUR: Refers to those who have exhibited and won first prizes in

accredited or recognized shows (Platte County Fair or State Fair) OR who have had professional schooling but have not completed more than three years.

AMATEUR: Refers to those who have not previously won first prizes as an amateur and have little or no schooling. **JUNIOR:** Refers to those who have not reached their 19th birthday before Aug 1, of current year.

CHILDREN: Refers to Those who have not reached their 12th birthday before Aug 1, of current year. The children's display will be in the main 4H hall and will be judged by a qualified member of the Platte County Art Guild who will be generous with awards.

SENIOR: Refers to exhibitors 65 years of age or older as of Aug 1st, of current year.

EXHIBITORS: may place into a higher proficiency level (except professional) if they feel they are qualified to compete; however, an exhibitor cannot go to a lower level.

MATTED AND FRAMED UNDER GLASS OR PLEXIGLAS: Works of Art will meet the same standards as in the past. Photography exhibitors may use canvas wrapped frames when the work extends around all four sides of the frame, or a border is printed and extends around all four sides. Work printed on metal, glass wood or other material must cover the entire facing surface and be able to hang safely on wire and glass or Plexiglas is not required. No raw or unprinted areas should be seen when approaching these pieces. Large pieces of photography (over 2 ft by 2 ft or 576 sq. in.) should not be under glass for safety reasons. Exhibitors may use Plexiglas on large pieces but will not be required to.

SUPERINTENDENTS: Any exceptions and appeals to these requirements must be approved by the Superintendents. The guide for Superintendents is to facilitate displaying as much work as possible including <u>minor</u> assistance with hangers, providing available material and suggestions for meeting requirements.

- 7. Due to the rapid development of diseases in poultry, certificates of veterinary inspection must be issued within 48 hours of the show. - 8. Poultry can be fed only commercial feed during the fair.
- 9. AN EXHIBITOR MAY NOT EXHIBIT MORE THAN TWELVE (12) LOTS TOTAL. NO MORE THAN TWO (2) ENTRIES PER PERSON PER CLASS.
- 10. Competition in chickens and turkeys will be limited to the following specific breeds and varieties. Each contestant must provide own feed, feeders, and waterers. Each contestant is responsible for pen cleanliness in area around pen.
- 11. EXHIBITOR MUST BE PRESENT DURING JUDGING
- 12. Poultry Exhibitors should use sawdust under all cages and keep soiled sawdust cleaned each day replacing with clean sawdust each day.
