# **General Rules for all Home & Garden Departments**

Home & Garden Check-In: Sunday, August 3, 2025 from 10am to 3pm

Home & Garden Judging: Monday, August 4, 2025 at 9am (closed to public)

Special Baking Contests Live Judging: Monday, August 4, 2025 (closed to the public, results will be live streamed)

# **Entry Fees**

- Pre-register by July 18, 2025: No entry fee
- Check-in day registrations: \$1 per entry

### Rules

1. All Home & Garden entries are encouraged to be pre-registered for no entry fee. Exhibitors should list every entry that they may have available to bring. Any entries received on the day of check-in will be \$1 per entry.

Registration will be permitted during Home & Garden Check-In on Sunday, August 3 from 10am to 3pm. You may encounter a line and experience delays. Exhibitors are encouraged to pre-register to save time.

- 2. Entry fees must accompany entry form, no refunds on entries.
- 3. Entries for exhibitors 19 and under should be entered in Department 11. Entries received in any other home and garden department will compete with adult entries. The same item cannot be entered in both age categories!
- 4. Actual items to be exhibited will be accepted ONLY between 10am and 3pm on Sunday, August 3, 2025. The Special Baking Competition entries (pre-registered only) will be accepted on Sunday, August 3, 2025 between 10am and 3pm or Monday, August 4, 2025 between 8am and 10am.
- 5. Fair management reserves the right to refuse to accept any entry deemed by fair management to be in poor taste.
- 6. Fair management has the right to open any and all canned good items.
- 7. Only two\* entries per category per exhibitor will be accepted, unless noted otherwise. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to decide in which category an item will be entered.
- 8. Judging for the Home & Garden classes will take place on Monday, August 4. No exhibitors or spectators will be permitted in the hall during the judging.
- 9. Any entry not deemed worthy will not be placed. Judges' decisions are final.
- 10. "Best of Show" rosettes will be awarded at the discretion of the judges.
- 11. Exhibits will be guarded and every effort will be made to protect them from damage. However, neither the Fair Board nor the management is responsible for accidents, loss or damage.
- 12. Fair management may at any time order the removal of any exhibit or part of any exhibit that has become unfit for show.
- 13. Exhibits will be removed from the hall only on Sunday, August 10 between noon and 2pm. No exceptions will be made. Perishable items will be destroyed if not picked up at this time. Others will be kept for one week.
- 14. Premium checks will be available when you pick up your entry. All checks must be cashed before 60 days. No rewrite of checks after 60 days.

# **PA Department of Agriculture**

To further protect Pennsylvania's \$7.1 billion poultry in from the threat of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza, Secretary Russell Redding announced a guarantia banning the exhibition of poultry and eggs at co fairs in Pennsylvania. The ban is in effect until t depa ent rescinds the order.

The ban prohibits the presence and diala f poultry and poultry products, including eggs, leath nd other parts and items made of these parts. The b pplies to the 108 county and local fairs that receive state funding under the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act.

# PA Preferred™ Junior Baking Contest Cookies, Brownies and Bars

The goal of the PA Preferred™ Junior Baking Contest is to encourage young people across the Commonwealth to participate in Pennsylvania's agricultural fairs by showcasing Pennsylvania grown and produced products in their contest entries.

### Rules

- 1. Participant must be an individual amateur baker (age 8 through 18 years old) who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
- 2. Entrants may not have won 1st place in the PA Preferred™ Junior Baking Contest at any other fair in 2025.
- Entry must be a plate of six (6) individual sized portions of the baked entry item (cookies, brownies or bars).
- Entries must be made from scratch. Pre-made mixes are not acceptable ingredients. All ingredients and decorations must be edible.
- 5. At least two (2) PA Preferred™ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients are PA Preferred™ grains (such as oats or flour), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
- 6. A PA Preferred™ logo is not required because not all PA Preferred™ products carry the label. The name of the ingredient and the source is sufficient. Contact RA-AGPAPreferred@pa.gov for any assistance with qualifying ingredients.
- Entry must be submitted for judging on a food safe disposable setting. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
- Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8-1/2"x11" paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. The PA Preferred™ ingredients must be listed clearly in the ingredient list, specifying the ingredients and the company that made/grew them (ex. PA Preferred Eggs - Weis brand; PA Preferred Milk - Galliker's brand). Entrant's name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and cookies-brownies-bars will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
- Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.

### 10. Judging Criteria:

Flavor (aroma, taste, good balance of flavorings)	30 points
Texture (appropriate for the type of cookie, brownie or bar)	25 points
Inside Characteristics (even grain, evenly baked; free from air pockets)	20 points
Outside Characteristics (uniform size, shape, appearance; overall appeal)	15 points
Creativity	10 points
TOTAL	100 points



- All entrees must be pre-registered and brought into the Home & Garden Department on Sunday, August 3, 2025 between 10am and 3pm or Monday, August 4, 2025 between 8am and 10am. Judging will be closed to the public, but results will be live streamed.
- The first place winner will be required to enter the 2026 Pennsylvania Farm Show competition. If unable to do so the 2nd place winner will be eligible to go. Premiums for the PA Farm Show competition (First - \$500.00; Second - \$250.00; Third -\$100.00; Fourth - Rosette; Fifth - Rosette).
