
"The Lord Is Risen"

The Apostle Paul declared that our faith stands or falls on the basis of the Resurrection. I believe that declaration remains true today. If I didn't believe in the resurrection, I wouldn't be a Christian and I certainly wouldn't be in the pulpit. If I didn't believe in the resurrection I would also search for another faith. It is because I believe in the resurrection of Christ that I am not only a Christian but a minister of the His gospel. My concern for the church of today is that God's people will continue to believe in the resurrection. Some of you might be inclined to say; "Well, don't all people who call themselves Christians believe in the resurrection." My answer might startle some of you because my answer would be "yes" and "no." Now that I have not only startled you but also confused you, allow me to explain. When I say that I believe in the Resurrection of Christ I am referring to the bodily resurrection. I believe that Jesus died and that He rose again from the grave. I believe that He had a body that people were able to see and recognize with the human eye. I believe that He talked, that He ate and that He ministered in a bodily form. The Bible teaches the bodily resurrection of Christ but when some well-meaning people today (including some ministers) say they believe in the resurrection what they are actually laying claim to but will not always tell you is that they believe in the spiritual resurrection of Christ. What does it mean to believe in the Spiritual Resurrection? The Spiritual Resurrection is the belief that the presence of Jesus rose in the hearts and minds of his followers but that his body rotted in the grave.

There is only one resurrection and that is a bodily resurrection anything less and you are left with a ghost and he's not the holy one either! Some people might say "but that's a narrow interpretation" and they would be absolutely correct. It is a narrow interpretation but then again, the Bible declares; "Enter ye in

at the strait gate' for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat: Because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life and few there be that find it" (Matt. 7:13-14). Someone once took the time to list the reasons for belief in the bodily resurrection and I want to pass them on to you.

- 1. Jesus predicted His resurrection (Matt 16:21; Mark 9:9-10; John 2:18-22).
- 2. The Old Testament prophesied it (Psalm 16:10; compare Acts 2:25-31; 13:33-37).
- 3. The tomb was empty and the grave clothes were vacant. If those who opposed Christ wished to silence His disciples, all they had to do was produce a body, but they could not (John 20:3-9).

- 4. Many people saw the resurrected Christ. They looked on His face, touched Him, heard His voice, and saw Him eat (Matt. 28:16-20; Luke 24:13-39; John 20:11-29; John 21:1-9; Acts 1:6-11; 1 Cor. 15:3-8).
- 5. The lives of the disciples were revolutionized. Though they fled and even denied Christ at the time of His arrest, they later feared no one in their proclamation of the risen Christ (Matt 26:56, 69-75).
- 6. The resurrection was the central message of the early church. The church grew with an unwavering conviction that Christ had risen and was the Lord of the church (Acts 4:33; 5:30-32; Rom. 5:24).
- 7. Men and women today testify that the power of the risen Christ has transformed their lives. We know that Jesus is alive not only because of the historical and biblical evidence but also because He has miraculously touched our lives.

Scripture Reading — John 17:6-19

"As you sent me into the world [Father], I have sent them into the world."

The Bible describes Jesus' followers in a number of ways. We are called forgiven sinners, adopted sons and daughters, and beloved members of the body of Christ. All of these are key aspects of who we are in Christ.

But one of the most important identities we have is as "sent people." Just as Jesus was sent into the world to show God's love, so he now sends us to do the same.


After Jesus' resurrection, his followers received the Holy Spirit to empower them for mission. As Jesus' followers today, we are called to share the good news of Jesus in our words and actions, inviting people

to place their faith in Jesus just as we have done.

Too often, local churches become wrapped up in their own concerns. Christians spend so much time running programs and dealing with internal conflicts that they have little energy to build relationships with people outside the church. It's not surprising that many of our churches are shrinking and that a lot of church "growth" is just a result of Christians transferring from one congregation to another. Jesus' teaching makes clear, however, that his followers are partners in God's mission of saving people who are lost in sin. It's not enough to simply talk about sharing our faith—it's part of our identity in being the people God calls us to be.

Father, use my words and actions to help others understand the gospel and see their need for you. Amen.

Key Things The Evangelism Task Force Has Learned About Evangelism

- Praying is essential in order to share Jesus with others. This is God's work, so we need to be relying on Him before we can consider sharing.
- The more time we spend with Jesus, the more we start to look like Him. (Matt. 5:14) We need to make sure that we are showing the world Jesus, and we can't do this unless we spend time in Him word and in prayer.
- We have the Holy Spirit in us. (John 14:26) We can not lead anyone to Christ without the power of the Holy Spirit. This is God's work, not our work.
- Never give up and never quit telling others, even if they are negative or say no. (2 Pet. 3:9, I Cor. 3:5-8) Don't take it personal.

• Jesus died for everyone. Everybody doesn't look like us. No one is too broken or too far gone for God's grace. (Rom. 5:20) Changed behavior requires: "Know Be Do". They can't "Do" (change) until they have Jesus. They can't "Be" until they know. They can't "Know" unless they are told. (Rom. 10:17) Behavior is a symptom, not a problem. Change in a life can take a long time. The longer sin is allowed to stay in a life, the harder the heart becomes. (Heb. 3:13). The nudges of the Holy Spirit are harder to feel.

God doesn't call the equipped. He equips the called. As Christians, we're commanded to share the gospel. (Matt.28:19)

May the Lord use us to grow His Kingdom!

STEWARDSHIP & FINANCE

Welcome to April and the Easter season. This is the time of year when most are thinking about the resurrection and looking toward Easter Sunday. But I tend to think about the crucifixion. That is the part of this that is so incredibly unbelievable for me. I firmly believe that Jesus, before turning himself over to the Roman guards, knew exactly what was going to happen. What He volunteered for was not a unique occurrence during His time on earth so He had probably seen it or at least heard about it in gory detail. But, He marched ahead saying "not my will, but Yours be done". And He did this so that you and I could have eternal life with Him. I find it absolutely incredible that anyone would do that for me. Think about this, Jesus is in the garden praying and during that time He knew exactly the pain, suffering, and humiliation that lay in store for Him. What was going to happen had been done to others and many of them did not even survive the scourging so never got to the crucifixion. Yet with the thought that "not my will, but Yours be done", He presented himself to the guards. The other thing that I am constantly awed by is just the fact that for me to receive the blessings that He purchased all I must do is believe! Wow!


Okay, the first quarter is passed, and we are on a positive financial footing meaning that we are spending less than what you are giving. We were a little concerned during February but pulled ahead in March, so we are about where we had projected. However, now starts the period when our attendance usually falls off a bit as our part-timers head north and the travel season gets into high gear. So, please continue to pray for our church and consider what you can do to ensure our continued growth going forward. I still remind you to consider the growth that we are experiencing in our area and what we must do to enable us to show the pathway to our Heavenly Father that is so desperately needed. I read an article recently that outlined the 17,000 new homes that have been platted for this area. Most of these are within five miles of our property on US 27 with the others only slightly further. What is hard for me to wrap my head around is remembering that the town that I grew up in is about 20 miles from here. During the time that that I was there the local weekly newspaper spoke of having about 5,000 residents within 7 miles of the downtown area. But, that range extended well outside the city limits and several miles into the county. Now, there are plans for several times that number to be added to Leesburg within the next 5 to 7 years and it has already begun. Will we be there to welcome them?

I recently read an insightful excerpt from a book by Rev Laura Dunham. She wrote that Scripture teaches us that all we have is a gift from God and that we live by His grace. This perspective should

help to keep us humble when we are deciding how we will use the income and assets He has put under our care. A theology of stewardship must keep in mind that all of creation is under the reign of God, and He made it our responsibility to care for His creation by using the time, talents, and money He has allowed us to control.

One final thought, if you are currently giving at a level at which you are comfortable that you are doing all that you can, my feeble attempts to describe our greater need will hopefully meet with some agreement. Maybe a positive nod, and nothing more. However, if you are bothered by my trying to highlight those needs, then maybe Someone is tapping on your shoulder. Remember, our job is to spread the gospel and that means that we must bring new people into our services and activities. However, to do that in a meaningful way we need more space than we currently have available.




GriefShare News!


