"Call To Artists" The Nash is an educational and performance center owned by Jazz in Arizona. It invites emerging and established artists to submit artwork for their juried group show. "Peel Me A Grape" of artwork depicting or inspired by food.

Located in the heart of Roosevelt Row Arts District in Phoenix, audiences and patrons will be at *The Nash* to attend and participate in varied events including concerts, workshops, clinics, jam sessions, recitals, fundraisers, and First Friday and Third Friday Art Walks.

Accepted artwork includes 2D and 3D work that can be hung on the wall and does not exceed 5" in depth, 36 " in width and 48" in height. Please refer to the website <u>http://www.thenash.org</u>.

Application fees are non-refundable, regardless of acceptance to gallery shows..

Sebastio Rerreira

Sebastio Perreira, had many people who made a difference in his life, and now he strives to make a difference in other people's lives.

"I resort to my parents' work as a source for influence and inspiration," said acrylic artist Sebastiao, who displayed some of his paintings on campus in November. "My father wove bamboo baskets and my mother wove wool blankets.

"I remember our house having bamboo ceilings. The designs were simple but at the same time effective and intriguing. "My mother created blanket patterns based upon the rural surroundings where she grew up in Brazil. Dying the wool, using paints and minerals, led my mother to develop a great color sense.

In 1981, I was teaching Portugese to members of the Peace Corps in Brazil, when I met Mr. and Mrs. Winkle, who came to Brazil to work in an orphanage. They were having difficulty speaking Portuguese, but were comfortable working with me and requested that I work with them more. Their morale went up as they made progress." Later the Winkles asked Pereira if he would like to come to the United States to go to school. They sponsored his art education for four and a half years at ASU where he received his bachelor's and master's degrees.

Rip Woods, a nationally known artist and professor at ASU, influenced Pereira's 'formation as an artist." He made him think of who he was and what his role in terms of being an artist was."

Pereira taught drawing and painting in the Magnet Visual Arts Program at South Mountain High School. One of his students had a dream of attending Chicago Art Institute, but was apprehensive about applying, Pereira told him one of two things would happen, he would be accepted or he would not and the only way to find out was to apply. Pereira wrote a letter of recommendation and the student was accepted.

Pereira lives in Phoenix and maintains a full professional exhibition schedule and has collected many honors for his work. He was a featured artist in "International Artists" magazine, displaying his watercolors and working techniques. He works in a photorealist style, His works are large, precise, vividly and intensely colorful, and often feature still life materials. He uses fractals, based upon mathematical concepts, many compositions based on plant shapes. He is interested in patterns, colors and designs. He is exhibited locally and nationally.

Sheila Bellinger is originally from Kent, England, and worked for British Airways. She decided to move to Australia to escape the harsh English winters. There, she was employed by Ansett-ANA, an Australian airline and met her husband to be, an American sailor.

Sheila and her husband settled in Arizona, where they raised a son. It was here in Phoenix, where Sheila took up oil painting, studying first with Garnet Widdifield. Her art took a cessation for a few years until she began taking lessons with our Elaine Waters. Sheila says she has learned so much and wants to continue studying. Her subjects range from landscapes to animals. Two years ago she travelled to Skiatook, OK, to take a two day painting workshop with Jerry Yarnell. That was fun.

Recently she was commisssioned by a sister-in -law topaint both the Piestewa Peak and the Camelback Mountain to appear on the same canvas for her nephew who lives out of state. Over the holidays, the nephew proposed to his fiancee on top of Camelback Mountain. Sheila's efforts paid off and she completed the painting to everyone's delight.

A painting of hers was sold at the AZ State Fair this year and at last year's Glendale Art Show her penguin painting sold. Four oils are displayed at the Paradise Valley Community room this month. She is currently working on an ocean scene. While painting, Sheila feels more relaxed than at any other time. She is a talented, happy, busy lady.

Limited Painting Chalenge

It won't be a critique - each artist will tell of their painting experience - what pigments they used - how they mixed the colors what they liked and what problems they had. Rules for the challenge:

One red pigment, one blue pigment and one yellow pigment to be used with black and white if desired. Oranges, purples and greens will be mixed from these primaries. Stay with your chosen pigments. Bring these efforts to the Feburary meeting 5:30 critique time. They will not be critiqued or judged. It is primarily a learning experience, not a competition. Have fun with this!

Creative Corner

Elaine Waters

There are many reasons to critique your own art... And, you should do it... Because it is one of the best ways to become a better artist. Using basic critiquing skills to evaluate your own work, you can check for composition, value, design, color, etc. Critiquers can help you also, but usually, a critiquer does not know what is in your heart as an artist. They do not know what you are trying to say, what you like, what kind of art stirs your soul.

But, there is another step you should take to become the artist you wish to be. Consider the works of Your Favorite Artist (YFA). Study them carefully, Why do you like YFA works? Is it the color palette, the exciting brushwork, the striking use of value contrasts? Or is it something else about YFA's works that make you want to paint like him (her)? You don't need to copy the work to learn to incorporate some of YFA skills into your own work. First: awareness of what you like and Second: bringing what you like into your own art. You are the only one who can take your art from where it is to where you want it to be, so take that next step without looking back. Look forward, learn and grow as artists!

ARIZONA ART ALLIANCE

As many of you probably already know, the Gallery will close its doors on 5/31/14 due to loss of lease. Big changes will be forthcoming. The final juried artist show at the gallery is a 2-month show titled "How Sweet It Is", and will run from March 5th through April 27th, with Reception April 26th from 6-9 pm, and will be a celebration of the 3 and a half year gallery operation, the previous 10 year history of the Alliance, and where the Alliance is going from here. There will be cash prizes for 1st, 2nd and 3rd, and Best of Show across all media, and finally an Artists Choice award. Deadline for application is February 24th, by 5 pm. Panel cost is \$25 each, gift shop participation is free if showing in the gallery, and \$10 a month if not. Juried and nonjuried artists can show in the gift shop.

The new President, Mike Brady, has outlined a new direction plan for the Alliance which will include a regrouped and expanded marketing plan, and 4 short shows per year (Fall, Christmas, February and April) at locations throughout the state. These will be planned to be event-marketed.

The primary short term objective of course is to obtain an office, storage and workshop location and space. This is scheduled to be by May 1st. Summer months will entail getting all systems functioning.

For artists planning to apply for juried status, the final cycle deadline under the current system is February 1st, to the gallery. After that, there is planned a new process system readying for Fall of this year.

Because of the major changes necessary due to the gallery's closing, information will be relayed as specific objectives and timelines become available. This is a major focus shift for the Alliance. However, its goals have not changed and its benefits to its member organizations are growing. In the meantime we all need to be patient.
