I discovered my latent artistic bent in the 1990's when I joined the Decorative Art's Society in Phoenix. In 2002 I was attending Glendale Community College and registered for a drawing class (as an elective).

My passion for art began in that class! I joined the Arizona Watercolor Association, Inc. in 2004 and have been an active member of the Board of Directors for ten years. Having been juried into local, regional, and national exhibitions over the past ten years, in 2012 I received my AWA Signature Membership.

My passion for watercolor is forefront in my life; HOWEVER, I do love to experiment!! Acrylics, solar prints, collage, and mono printing just to name a few.

When I began mono printing in 2008 it was on a handmade gelatin plate. Then, two years ago I was introduced to the Gelli Arts plate which is made of silicone and mineral oil. I first used the plate at the Arizona Women's Expo as a demo artist for Arizona Art Supply. This plate can be used over and will not break down. It will last many years when it is cared for properly.

I began teaching classes at Arizona Art Supply in late 2012, beginning with Gelli printing followed by collage classes which I am currently teaching.

I look forward to demonstrating for you and showing you just how much fun mono printing on a gelatin plate can be.

ARIZONA ART ALLIANCE by Dr. Carl Hoelle, AAA Representative

Since the closing of the gallery in 2014, the Alliance has focused on establishing relationships with other galleries around the greater Phoenix area to bring exhibit opportunities to member organizations from a variety of locations. Annual exhibits currently are planned at:

HOLLAND GALLERY (October 2016) 34250N.60th St., Scottsdale,AZ 85266 WHAM GALLERY (March 2017) 16560 N. Dysart Rd., Surprise AZ 85378 VISION GALLERY/Chandler Center for the Arts (July/August 2016)10 E.Chicago ST./250 N. Arizona Ave. Chandler. AZ 85225.

Other private art galleries are being sought to increase Alliance-sponsored exhibits. Additional current offerings include the ongoing ON-LINE GALLERY, an "on-line only" show ("Beat the Heat"), both on the Alliance website, and availability for individual artists to show for a month on the Alliance Newsletter and more (see later in this article for application directions). Specific application information for the 'Beat the Heat" and VISION gallery show are available in the March 2016 Newsletter.

It is important to note that the HOLLAND, WHAM, and VISION gallery shows are basically art galleries in competition with the many "Scottsdale Row" galleries but with greater sales possibilities due to lower costs for quality art than at the Scottsdale galleries.

The move away from the paper-based application processes for exhibits through the "entry-thingy" process has been problematic for many PAG members. Thanks to Grant Washburn, our Membership Chairman, he plans to develop a step-by-step procedure for the entry-thingy method.

Regarding the free availability of individual artists showing in the Alliance Newsletter, Newsletter Editor, Kathy Koneski, has provided the following for entering: a good artist biography, about 4 to 6 JPEG images of their artwork with their name, PAG membership, artwork titles, medium used, and (optional) an okay to the Alliance to use their pictures in other types of advertising for the Alliance; finally, email all the materials to Kathy at joekathy@prodigy.net, or joekathy@century link.net. Note that there is no charge for this.



Creative Corner The Unifying Effect of Light By Julie Frye

Have I written about this before? Are you listening? If so here it is once again! (Apparently we all need reminders)

In nearly every critique that Elaine Waters and I have done, the question of "light" comes up more than once. It is of course a requisite factor in seeing! LIGHT SOURCE, so very important is often ignored or taken for granted. When plein aire painting, the light will change frequently as you work. Therefore it is necessary to establish ONE light source when you begin and then keep it consistent throughout the painting even though it changes as your painting progresses. (A camera to capture the moment, early on in the work will help you to refer to later in the studio)

In outdoor light, the yellow color of direct sunlight influences the light side of all objects while the cool reflection of the blue sky will influence the cast shadows and shaded sides of objects. Always remember not to make your cast shadows too dark – cast shadow is merely an interruption of light – can you sit down within that shadow and read a book? This is especially important if you are working from a photo! Shadows in photos always show up darker!

In indoor light, (ideally from the north which is the coolest), cast shadows will tend toward warmer hues due to the reflections of the various surfaces found indoors. Different from the outdoor situation where the usual effect is warm lights and cool shadows. Look for it when you set up your next still life. This can be manipulated of course if you wish a different effect.

Painting a scene in Twilight is another matter entirely. The periods during which this cool subdued light exists affords us the opportunity for dramatic effects by using little surprises like warm light in the windows of a building or perhaps a campfire outdoors. (these may be the only warm tones in your painting) A good way to achieve this is to add a small amount of blue to each of your colors before intermixing them! Try it... it's fun!

Moonlit nights are also a fun challenge. This of course combines the principles of both Twilight and Sunlight. The blue effect of moonlight will be like that of twilight; however the shadows and highlights will have very definite placement and orientation. Often the shadows will be diffused since the available light is diffused, and the horizontal surfaces and those perpendicular or nearly so to the light, will capture it and add to the form and dimension of the landscape.

To reiterate what has been discussed many times in our critiques, CONSIDER THE LIGHT SOURCE BEFORE YOU LAY BRUSH TO CANVAS! Keep it consistent throughout. Indeed, make it an important unifying factory in your work. Make careful observations (always, always, ALWAYS!) of how the light source in any given situation affects the color of the object or shadow as it turns toward and away from it. Pretty basic, right? Pretty important? Yes, YES!

Now break into song...."I'm Beginning To See The Light!" (applause, applause!)

A long time PAG member, Bets contributed much to the success of the guild. Her talents extended to putting out the PAG newsletter for years, which was a chore she enjoyed doing. The last few years were very painful for Bets prior to and following a hip replacement. She kept working on the newsletter and she sold a lovely painting at the 2015 Westgate Gallery PAG art show. Her last painting was of a pair of Indian baby moccasins that were given to her as a gift.

Bets was much loved by dear friends who will miss her enthusiasm and sweet personality


TONI HUNGERFORD
