Warm and Cool Colors: We know what they are, so how can we use this in our art?

I hope we all have a basic understanding about warm and cool colors. Red is generally a warm color, but not all reds are warm. Blues are generally thought of as being cool, but not all blues are cool, Yellows also can be warm or cool.... Depending upon the source of the light and what that color is next to. A very important phrase is appropriate for discussing warm and cool is: WARMER THAN, AND COOLER THAN EXPLAINS W/C BETTER. Every hue has warm and cool versions of it. Alizarin Crimson is cooler than Cadmium Red Light: Lemon Yellow is cooler than Indian Yellow: Cerulean Blue is cooler than Ultramarine Blue. There are a lot of "little rules" about how warm and cool colors act. Warm colors advance, cool colors recede. If your light is warm, the shadows are cool and adversely, if the lights are warm, the shadows are cool. If you add white to a color, it will cool it and if you add darks (not necessarily black), the darkened color will appear warmer than the original color.

All of us girls were taught that we should not wear red and pink together. However, in nature we see the combination all the time: in flowers and sunsets, the results can be marvelous.... It can be very exciting to see a warm yellow smacked right up next to a cool yellow. We see the same results with warm and cool blues or purples next to each other.

Take this one step further; place a warm yellow next to a cool purple (complimentary).... And see real excitement! Usually warm complimentary colors next to each other are not exciting, but using warm of one and cool of the other can be quite exciting.

So now you have a whole new batch of color issues to deal with. Take time to enjoy what you are learning. Use those scraps of paper to practice and play with color. Look for color combinations that you see around you. Paint what you see, not just what you think things are!
