

Creative

Painting Cast Shadows

A member asked me at the last meeting: "Can you teach me how to paint cast shadows? —I always have trouble with them." It seems each time I do a critique there is some discussion about a cast shadow in a particular painting. If you often paint from photos (we're talking landscapes here) chances are they appear darker in your photo than they actually are had you been painting plein aire. The temptation is to use very dark values to portray them and most often it doesn't produce a very real looking cast shadow. I've said this before: "You could sit down in the shadow of that tree and read a book!" Look at the cast shadow in your painting....is there enough light in it to read a book?

Just like other parts of your painting, the shadows need to have depth. Look at the shadows around you. Have they lost all detail and texture? Shadows are not a flat color, but they have darker and lighter values WITHIN the shadow. Of course, it will be darker closest to the object which casts it. Pay careful attention to the angle of the sun which is creating the shadow. (remember it is the INTERRUPTION OF LIGHT, not the obliteration of it!) But as it moves outward away from the object I think you will find both color and value changes in it. I literally see color in shadows perhaps because I was taught by a Master painter whose cast shadows danced with color! I am speaking of course of Claude Monet who painted plein aire daily and worked 30 minutes or less on a canvas before switching to another to capture yet another effect of the light at that very moment, quite different from the last. Check this out by looking at any of his "series" paintings: Rouen Cathedral, Haystacks, Poplar trees. You'll see what I mean.

I personally prefer to paint my shadows directly being careful to make them transparent-looking and colorful the way the impressionists did. However, they can be glazed if you are patient and not in a great hurry. A GLAZE is simply a thin, transparent layer of paint and you can reglaze more and more layers (allowing each to dry before continuing). Glazes like smooth surfaces and are most effective over lighter ground. The light penetrates through the transparent glaze and bounces back to your eye. The portrait painters of old achieved their glowing skin tones with this method.

Check out "Little Shop Window" – a small painting I did after my experience in France with Elaine and Monique.

CHUCK'S COMPUTER CORNER:

Beware scam popups:

You're cruising the Internet when suddenly a scary looking window pops up telling you that your computer has been infected. It may look a lot like a regular Windows screen, or the dreaded "blue screen", so as recommended by the message, you click on 'OK' clean up my computer button' and they've got you!

The scam popup will take over and keep you from doing anything, while offering to fix your problem if you will just enter your credit card number! They'll also disable any firewalls and virus protection programs.

These very ominous but convincing scams are tricking people all over the world, and increasing with malware attacks. They can use official sounding names like Windows Ultimate Booster or Windows Safety Master, and if you click on <u>anything</u>, even the cancel button, they'll do their damage.

If you see anything strange pop up on your screen, don't click on anything no matter how convincing it looks. Instead, use the "three-fingered-salute" (Ctrl-Alt-Del) to start your Task Manager which allows you to end the process altogether.

You can THEN select your virus/malware protection software, to clear out any "remnants".
