# Creative

#### We All Want to be Better Painters By Elaine Waters

When I visit art galleries or art exhibits.... I like to go alone and take my time. I study poor paintings almost as much as the really good paintings. I guess that is the art instructor in me. So, what do I ask myself.... Why is this painting a really good painting? Or, what is the weakness of this painting? What would make this a much better painting? There are so many possible answers to these questions.... value contrasts, poor or very fine color choices, composition, subject matter and placement on the canvas.... perspective issues, drawing good or bad.... While these are ALL possibilities... I am going to concentrate on composition.

If your resource is a photo, many "artists" will simply copy the photo and call it good. This is usually a bad and lazy idea. If you are really an "artist", you should want to make your painting better and be more creative. So many newer artists will struggle to get the composition drawing exactly like the photo and to match the exact color of some part of the painting just like the resource. If there are several parts to the composition.... The artist may struggle to make each item perfect so it could be the center of interest, or the focal point. The problem with this is that there should be ONLY ONE focal point in a good painting.... If your composition is complex and has more than one focal point you may end up with a disjointed painting. If you decide early on in your approach, and PLAN.... do several loose thumbnail sketches.... Think about your objects working together to make a good composition with a good center of interest.

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If you did some thumbnails.... You will be quite familiar with the objects in your composition. Now is the time to fine tune the composition, make changes, let the objects be part of a pleasant grouping... not isolated things.... use DESIGN LINES to help the viewer get INTO the composition.... Avoid doing tight detailed sketches of your subject. Your design lines need not be "lines" but can be changes in value or subtle changes in color for the area in question.... They can be shadows, or lit areas, perhaps foliage, anything to help the viewer move around the painting. Please don't just scatter a bunch of bushes all over your canvas ... Adding objects in this manner does NOT help your painting... they just make a viewer want to move on to look at someone else's art. Using design lines and value changes for your own paintings can really help viewers who want to look at your paintings and come back and look again.

Jerry Salinas graduated from the American Academy of Art in Chicago with a degree in Illustration and Fine Arts where he studied with Bill Parks. He has been working as an illustrator since the mid-1990's for many ad agencies.

## Top 9 items food banks need MOST:



- **1. Peanut Butter.** Liked by both kids and adults, and high in protein, peanut butter is the most requested item by food banks. <u>Consider donating peanut butter alternatives</u> too!
- **2. Canned Proteins.** Canned chicken is a great way to provide versatile, high-protein items to those in need. Items like canned tuna and salmon also contain vitamins, omega-3 fatty acids, and protein which make a quick and easy meal.
- **3. Canned Beans.** Canned beans like black beans, garbanzo beans, black-eyed peas, green beans, and pinto beans are high in protein and fiber and provide a nutritious way to fill a hungry tummy.
- **4. Pasta & Pasta Sauce.** Super easy to make and exceptionally filling, pasta and pasta sauce are great items to include in your donation box. Opt for whole grain pasta since it offers more fiber and nutrition than white pasta.
- **5. Pantry Staples.** Can you imagine having to cook in a kitchen without any flour or sugar? Unfortunately, this is a reality for many food insecure households. Donating items like flour, sugar, or condiments will greatly benefit those in need.
- **6. Canned Vegetables.** Veggies are always high in demand, and for good reasons. Nutrient-rich, and fiber dense, they tend to last the longest in pantries and are the perfect, easy way to provide healthy options.
- **7. Cooking Essentials**, like olive oil and spices. In many food insecure households, access to cooking basics isn't available often. Stick to the basics, like garlic powder, minced onion, oregano, basil, salt, pepper, and cinnamon.
- **8. Formula.** In food insecure communities, many parents are unable to breastfeed but struggle to buy formula due to the high costs. While there are programs available that provide formula to low income families, it never hurts to have more than enough.
- **9. Baby Food.** For the same reason, you should donate formula.

#### **Computer Corner**



You might have received an email for an Apple iCloud Calendar invitation. The invitation is sent from a genuine Apple email address and appears to be related to a purchase invoice. When you look at the invitations' notes, you see an alarming message about a large charge to your PayPal account. The message includes a phone number and directs you to call to speak to a support team.

However, this is a clear phishing scam. Cybercriminals created a real calendar invitation, but put a phony purchase message in the notes, hoping to scare you. The phone number in the message doesn't connect to a real support team but instead goes directly to a scammer. If you call the number, the scammer will try to trick you into giving them full control of your computer so they can steal your money and personal information.

Follow these tips to avoid falling victim to this scam:

- 1. Be suspicious of any calendar invitation you weren't expecting, especially of it contains an urgent message about a purchase.
- 2. Never call a phone number listed in an unexpected email. If you're concerned about a purchase, log in to your account directly on the official website or app to check your transaction history,
- 3. Don't accept or decline suspicious calendar invitations, as this can confirm to the scammers that your email address is active. Instead, simply delete the email.
