Greens... Understanding and using Greens

Green is secondary color on the color wheel. All greens are made from a Yellow (primary) and a Blue (primary). Cool greens are made from cool blues and yellows. And warm greens are made from warm blues and yellows.

Some cool greens available in tubes are: Viridian, Thalo Green and Permanent Green. Any cool addition to these greens will change these greens but they will still be cool. Cool white, Cool blue, Cool yellow and even some Cool reds will keep cool the green cool. Cool yellows to use to make cool greens: Lemon yellow, Cadmium yellow light, Zinc yellow and perhaps Auerolin yellow.

Any Warm yellow added will make the green warmer: Yellow Ochre, Raw Sienna, Indian Yellow, Cadmium Yellow medium or dark. Cool blues to use to make cool greens: Cerulean Blue, Thalo Blue, Cobalt Blue (but be careful). Ultramarine Blue, which is warm added to a green will make the green warmer. If, you use an Ultramarine Blue (warm) mixed with a warm yellow such as Yellow Ochre, it will make an icky weak green, but it will be a usable color for many things. Cool reds to use sparingly_are_Alizerine Crimson, Permanent Rose or Thalo Red Rose. Any Warm red will warm up the green too much and the resulting color will push to brown.

Sap Green

Sap green is a color almost always found on a palette. It is made from a blue and yellow, of course, but it also has a little bit of red in it. Because of the red, it is a warm color and it is almost impossible to cool. It can also be very muddy because it uses ALL THREE OF THE PRIMARIES! It is nice to use in foliage, but only if it is used next to cool greens. It should not be used straight out of the tube. Sap green mixed with a dark purple, such as Dioxazine makes a great very dark warm green for landscapes. However, if you add Any white to lighten it, it will become a sad muddy color. The reason is, there are too many colors and variations of those colors in the mixture.

Using Greens in a Landscape

Foreground greens will have more intense colors (Warm And Cool), and more value contrasts. The farther back in the scene the greens are, the weaker and cooler they become. If white and more cool blue is used there, the greens will be cooler and lighter.

As you can see, WARM and COOL...are the keys to using greens and other secondary colors such as purple and orange. Take the time to play with some of these combinations and you will learn a great deal. When you can tell the difference between WARMER THAN and COOLER THAN...you will be well on the road to being a better artist.
