Creative

Let's Talk About Value By Elaine Waters

We can all understand "value" yet still NOT know why it is important. In our paintings, it is much more important than color.

In a landscape, the value of the sky is very important. In a photograph a clear sky is often represented as too dark and too blue. We see it as blue, but in painting, it is usually better if we make the sky a very light value of a color that is used somewhere else in the painting. If we are using a lot of browns and greens, make the sky a very light tan or gray green. Sometimes a very light compliment to the dominant color of the painting will work well. We can use "broken color" in the sky such as a VERY PALE value blue background....and push a little of the dominant color of the painting into the clouds. Please... avoid using pure white in your clouds. Always add some color to your clouds and remember to darken the value of that color on the shadow part of the clouds. The value AND color of cloud shadows are very important. If you look at really good artists' work on the internet, you will see many more non- blue than blue skies. Another case for value rather than color. If the painting is a still life, the value AND the color are both important in the background. Some artists will paint the background the complimentary color of the dominant color of the subject. This sometimes works, but again, the value of that background is very important. If the value is wrong (too dark or too light) the background will try to take over the painting.

It can work very well to use "broken color" in the background using some of the colors of the subject. A big red rose painted on a dark value green background (complimentary colors) seldom works well. I find it works well to use three or four DIFFERENT tube colors of red to help me get the right temperature and values of red for my flower. If, the still life has several objects in it, you must consider the values of the light and dark areas of the subject. I have heard it said by really good artists... "if you can paint a good still life, you can paint anything". Value and composition are very important in still life painting.

I don't usually do abstract paintings, but here again, value is so important. Color, color temperature, and composition are very important, but value contrasts are what move the viewer's eye around the painting. In a semi darkened room, the viewer may not see the colors, yet will see the composition if the values are well presented. So, don't paint boring paintings. Be aware of value contrasts, use them to make all your old weak paintings WOW paintings!!

A New Spin on Callback Phishing

Callback phishing is when a phishing email directs you to call a number instead of clicking on a link. Typically, if you call the number in a callback phishing email, the cybercriminal will try to trick you into providing sensitive information.

In this scam, cybercriminals send an email claiming that you have a pending charge on one of your accounts. If you call the number provided, the cybercriminal will guide you on how to connect with them through a legitimate system management tool. System management tools are often used by IT departments to remotely connect and control your device. Once the legitimate software has been installed, information can be stolen and used to extort you.


Stay safe from similar scams by following the tips below:

- -Be suspicious of emails that contain a sense of urgency.
- -Consider the context, timing, grammar, and other details of the email or call.
- -Avoid calling phone numbers provided in emails. Instead, navigate to an official website to find the best contact number.
