Soft Edges are Your Friend By Elaine Waters

We all know some facts about light source in paintings. Today we will talk about some things I think that many of us miss. I always ask (If I think the artist has missed something important about the light). Where is your light source...is it warm or cool. Is it from above, from above left or above right, or is the subject 'backlit'? It involves the lighting on ANY CYLINDRICAL
OFJECT such as tree trunks, pipes, vases, things that are round, and have a curve to their shape. It is important to remember that you are NOT painting 'thing'...you are painting light on a thing...and the light will tell the story of the object.

There are usually 5 areas of light on any cylindrical shape for instance. 1. Direct light from the light source. 2. The lesser light as the object moves away from the light source. 3. The approximate mid value light which we would say portrays the 'color and value' of the object. 4. The reflected light from secondary sources. This could be backlighting. 5. And of course...shadow. For those of you who use hard edges and big value changes in your work, the problem can be very difficult to manage. It can get complicated and confusing so...

If you really understand your subject... Paint what you see...not what you know the actual shape of the to be. This can become very complicated but the shortcut using **SOFT EDGES** to show the turning of the shape and the changes in the light is your easiest solution. The turn of a cheek, the profile of a horse's head, any animal, hot air balloons, fence posts, or trees. Whatever the object is, if it is round or cylindrical, use **SOFT EDGES** to the form and get the light right to show the right shape of the object. Because acrylic and watercolor paint change when they dry and dry so fast. Pencil artist and oil painters can do this much more easily than acrylic and watercolor artists.

Be more concerned about the love in your painting than all the tedious details of what you are attempting to duplicate in paint.

Identity Theft

Identity theft is the crime that occurs when someone steals your personal information. This often includes your name, bank account number, social security number and credit card information. After gaining this information the individual can "assume" the identity of the victim, and will then be able to access bank accounts, as well as open credit cards in the victim's name, all the while causing financial havoc to the victim.

Committing identity theft in Arizona is very serious. Arizona law classifies identity theft as a class 4 felony, punishable by up to two and a half years in prison.

Mortgage Fraud

Today's mortgage scams are aimed towards troubled homeowners. Mortgage fraud is typically carried out by real estate and mortgage specialists who use their skills deceive homeowners into improperly obtaining loan modifications, equity skimming and foreclosure rescue. In these scams, homeowners put their trust in individuals who they believe to be properly licensed and acting in their favor, but instead are taken advantage of.

Credit/Debit Card Fraud

Credit/debit card fraud is the improper use or possession of a card by someone other than the owner of the card. If you use a stolen credit card or are on the receiving end of anything that was illegally purchased, you may be charged with fraud. The charges for credit/debit card fraud range from a misdemeanor to a felony, based on how the card was used.
