## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE AUGUST 2020

"Years ago, anthropologist Margaret Mead was asked by a student what she considered to be the first sign of civilization in a culture. The student expected Mead to talk about fishhooks or clay pots or grinding stones. But no. Mead said that the first sign of civilization in an ancient culture was a femur (thighbone) that had been broken and then healed. Mead explained that in the animal kingdom, if you break your leg, you die. You cannot run from danger, get to the river for a drink or hunt for food. You are meat for prowling beasts. No animal survives a broken leg long enough for the bone to heal.

'A broken femur that has healed is evidence that someone has taken time to stay with the one who fell, has bound up the wound, has carried the person to safety and has tended the person through recovery. Helping someone else through difficulty is where civilization starts,' Meade said.

#### Improve your paintings with **BROKEN COLOR!**

What is BROKEN COLOR? How can we use this to make our paintings more exciting?

Example: So here is one of my favorite examples for study. We are going to paint a red barn.

We all know that the side of the barn in the sun will be lighter and brighter than the side in the shade, but if you look carefully at your resource (it doesn't matter if it is a photo or if you are standing out in the barnyard looking at the real thing), you will notice that the side of the barn does not always appear the same color and value of red. Several reasons for this. The barn boards are different and pick up the light differently AND our eyes do NOT see the bright red as one color and value only. If we use only one color of tube red to paint that side of the barn... Even though the color is "right"...it can be a little boring. However...if we use different reds of the same value NEXT to each other, the barn in the sun will be much more exciting. It will also be exciting if you use warm and cool reds next to each other, but do not mix them together. It is important to keep the values the same... You can even throw a little bit of sunny bright sky color.

Having said that...Now, let's think about the shadow side of the barn. This will probably be a warmer, richer red and again, if you use broken colors next to each other, your barn shadows will be rich, exciting and inviting. Please do not use black with the sunny bright red of the bright wall) to put the wall in shadow. Again, use broken color. Almost any dark <u>transparent</u> color (or colors) will work, but don't lose the original red color. Keep the values appropriate for the shadows and...please don't put any white in your shadow mixtures. I have seen artists use "mud"... for their shadows. Mud is almost always opaque and will not portray a lovely transparent shadow. Don't forget to think about warm and cool colors in your sunny or dark areas.

This technique can be used for painting almost ANYTHING! So...

Don't settle for boring colors...Let your light and shadow colors sing.

She moved to the US in 2005 to pursue higher studies and received her Master's and PhD in Materials Science and Engineering from Ohio State University, Columbus, OH. After a short stint in the semiconductor technology industry with Intel Corp., and Lam Research Corp., in Portland, Oregon, she returned to art to pursue her passion full time. She is currently being represented by Fountainhead Gallery in Seattle, WA. Ashwini writes on her Web site:

"Her aim is to create contemplative art that stimulates the viewer's senses and kindles nostalgia. Inspired by eclectic subjects and scenes from her travels, she expresses herself with bold colors and evocative textures. Her forte is her eye for detail and the ability to use natural light to set the mood of the scene. She hopes that each of her paintings invites the viewers into the scene and makes them reminisce about experiences from their own lives and travels."

After several months of transitional activity, the Alliance board met July 1st to report a number of administrative changes and directional avenues for the organization, and its visions and relationships with its member art groups. A major change occurred in vote to elect 2 new board members: David Bradley assuming the presidency from Mike Brady, and Tess Scherer the position of secretary from Nancy Troupe. Both new members reported years of involvements in the arts in the Phoenix area and participation in local and broader-based programs including connections with educational faculties and local art galleries. Further nominations of replacement board members are planned.

General goals of the Alliance include expanded outreach programs, continuing development of the highly successful Veterans programs, technological bases to educate and share art locally and globally, and development and execution of art showcasing ideas (e.g., drive-by art shows, virtual art shows) for member organizations. Other benefits to member leagues to individual artists and the community as a whole have been looked at mandating engaging direct communication with current leagues.

General areas involving website and social media showcasing league member activities and contributions to the community are planned. Newsletters ended except for an occasional special announcement as needed. At this writing, there is no activity for possible Holland Gallery Art Alliance hosted Fall 2020 show.

#### CHUCK'S COMPUTER CORNER "TIPS":

Tip of the Month: Watch out for fake malicious "News Sites".

When we see or hear about a salacious/exciting news story or event, it's easy and enticing to jump onto your search engine to find out more. Blindly trusting the results that come up in your query isn't as safe as it USED TO BE, because there are so many cybercriminals trying to gum up your system, your files, and your pocketbook!

Too quickly, they create websites that appear to be legitimate news sources, but instead are websites rigged to see if you are missing any updates or have holes in your security system, of which they can take advantage. While the legitimate search engines do their best to guickly identify these rogue websites in their results, even your system being vulnerable for an hour or so prior, can wreak serious havoc. So the bad guys keep doing it!

Our tip for the day: Change this behavior, if it is common for you. Instead of "going for" the given search, keep your trusted news sources as bookmarks in your browser, or use their associated smart phone app., and pull THEM in, to do your research. Apps. like News360 or azcentral.com aggregate a large number of news sources given a story, so it is a great way to find the "breaking news" in a much safer way.
