Creative Corner



Walk Into Commission Paintings with Eyes Wide Open and Brain Turned On! By Elaine Waters

Recently, I had the opportunity of doing a commission painting for a customer who had already purchased two paintings from me. I was glad for the opportunity and welcomed it. The customer asked me if could paint cows.... Of course, I said yes. It was supposed to be a simple barn and pasture, but as I soon discovered, it was not to be as simple as all that. I had 7 resource photos and soon learned that there would have to be the barn, flowering fruit trees, two roads, two different gates to the pasture, three fences with fence supports, one large sign with lettering and special features, three cows, one family dog, and the family cat. The chosen photos were great, however, the perspective issues were different in each photo and the time of day, light, shadow and season were different in each one.

I did three reference drawings of the barn to get the details right.... two each of the cows, dog and cat. Now the problem of fitting them all together properly in a composition. I started with (of course) the horizon line, the barn and distant features. Then I placed my animal subjects in the foreground and had to think about how best to make the pasture recede into the distance. Actually, I moved the animals three times to have them the right size for the distant barn. The sign was moved twice and then made larger because of its placement in the foreground. All these things were done before I touched the canvas with paint.

Next, I decided on the season of the year for the painting, the light source, and my palette colors. After a day of painting, I showed the painting to my customer... she liked the start, but.... the barn had to be more red and the pasture road had to come straight forward. So, I made the changes and continued to work on the painting for a couple of weeks, evaluating my progress along the way. Even after I thought things were right.. I saw things that I needed to change. The cows (I knew these cows by then) had to be moved back, the dog back behind the fence and the cat forward under the sign. I also had to gray the too blue sky with the other colors in my painting.

So, today the painting has the complete approval of my customer, is varnished and waiting to be delivered to my excited customer. Was it easy to paint... absolutely NOT... But worth every minute of thought, planning and painting effort.

So, don't be afraid to take on commission work... but be ready to accept the challenge of satisfying both yourself AND your customer.

COMPUTER CORNER:

A branch of computer science that deals with the theory and techniques of computer image synthesis. Computers produce images by analyzing a collection of dots, or pixels (picture elements). Computer graphics is a mature discipline with a growing range of applications. It is used to enhance the transfer and understanding of information in science, engineering, medicine, education, and business by facilitating the generation, production, and display of synthetic images of natural objects with authentic realism almost indistinguishable from photographs. Computer graphics facilitates the production of images that range in complexity from simple line drawings to three-dimensional reconstructions of data obtained from computerized axial tomography (CAT) scans in medical applications. Images of three-dimensional anatomical surfaces can be constructed from the two-dimensional slices generated by computerized tomography or magnetic resonance imaging. These images help physicians to understand the complex anatomy present in the slices, and to evaluate and plan the treatment and even surgery of complex anatomical abnormalities (Fig. 1).
