Creative Corner

CREATIVE CORNER ARTICLE BY Elaine Waters

Using More than One Resource Photo

It is easy to get into the trap of pulling objects from several different photos and adding them to your painting. This can create many problems with light source and perspective. Making sure that you have a consistent light source with all objects is not too difficult to correct, <u>if</u> the artist is careful to make appropriate changes to objects that he pulls from different photos. The light and the shadows should be warm or cool and from the same direction for all objects. This problem also is common if the artist adds miscellaneous objects from his imagination. For instance, portraying the light and shadow, warm and cool of flower petals can be very tricky. So, be careful when deciding to suddenly add something to fill up a space on your canvas.

Now the problem with perspective is a little bit tricky and difficult. If you are painting a lovely landscape or seascape and decide to add another object (tree, building or boat) that is NOT in your original resource photo, you must make sure that the way you portray that object fits in with the already established **perspective** in your painting. The important thing is that the object to be added MUST relate to the HORIZON (EYE LEVEL) LINE of the painting and size wise fit into the proper distance from the viewer AND the horizon line. The problem is compounded greatly if you decide to add two buildings (from different photos) or two boats (also from different photos)! The easiest way is to avoid using more than one resource photo for your painting.

If you feel you must, PLEASE do some thumbnail sketches to avoid problems adding objects from extra photos. The more photos you use, the more problems you will have. Know where you are going with added objects and be aware of the issues involved.



Demonstrator for October – Trevor Swanson

Coming from a long line of talented family artists, his remarkable gifts and talents as a wildlife painter are recognized world-wide. He began painting at an early age and developed the techniques for the realism detail and value systems essential to painting wildlife. In his 20's, Trevor's paintings were hanging in some of the world's most prestigious art shows, museums, and private collections, and at 25 he won the coveted "Artist of the Year" award at the Foundation for North American Wild Sheep.

Trevor is an avid outdoorsman, and for him the creative process begins when he encounters wild animals in their natural habitat. For that, he has traveled the world extensively. As he says in the biography on his Web site, "Anyone who has encountered a wolf eye-to-eye in the wilderness can tell you it's exhilarating." And, "Nothing compares to the grandeur of an eagle perched high atop a snow-covered mountain, a sinewy leopard creeping like a shadow across a dry desert, or a magnificent bear effortlessly running across a muddy sandbar. These are the sights and sensations that inspire the most powerful images on canvas." Trevor's paintings portray different levels of intense realism. On one level, they celebrate the majesty of untamed wildlife and beauty of unspoiled environments. On another level, they depict a keen sense of the drama and emotion found only in the wilderness, and on a further level, they capture that briefest moment when nature reveals her spirit ~ the beauty of life is in the little things such as moss growing on a rock, which completes the story and picture.

Throughout his paintings and reflecting Trevor's own philosophy on mankind's place within nature, Trevor writes. "I see humans as the caretakers of our planet. It is our obligation to preserve the Earth's delicate balance for future generations. And the first step is opening our eyes to all its mystery and wonder. There is so much beauty in the world as it is, mine is the task of capturing that beauty to show others what we have to lose."
