Creative

Painting Autumn

You have probably noticed by now in your own experience that nature gives us a predominance of blue in the skies and green in the foliage and neutral in the ground and bark of trees etc. Of course, we strive to bring interest and excitement to our work so that our viewers will look carefully at our paintings for longer than a split second. Our problem is the search for opportunities to incorporate the warm bright colors in our painting in some logical way. Painting the season changes and noting the brilliant colors of autumn (I know, we don't get much of that here in Phoenix but expand your horizons a bit and venture a few hours north!) is one of the ways we can do that.

As an artist, your job is not the copying of nature but the EXPRESSION of nature. This leaves you free to apply your imagination and creativity so that you can create an interesting piece of our beautiful world on canvas or paper.

Autumn is the chance for flamboyant color. You will note many warm colors and the deciduous leaves change from green to an infinite variety of yellow, orange, red...OOOPS – if you're not careful, your bright colors will clash rather than harmonize! (Think of bright color like loudness in an orchestra. If every instrument plays loudly all the time, the melody and harmony will not be heard. Let some parts of your painting retain the brilliance that you want, but gray down some of the others so that it will stand out. Years ago, I took a scrap of canvas and placed two squares of Cadmium red light about 3" apart. I then surrounded the first square with Cadmium orange, the second square was then surrounded by a gray-green. When viewed side by side, the Cadmium orange surrounded by the gray green appeared MUCH more intense than the one surrounded by bright orange! INTERESTING!

We must rely heavily on atmospheric effects when painting autumn, to tone down and harmonize the brilliant colors. We can use aerial perspective to good use here, both to harmonize our colors and to achieve the effects of distance. (You all know what happens when you add blue to orange...voila! Toned down color!) As you compose your painting, place the brightest autumn colors in your focal point area and mute surrounding colors to make them appear even more intense.

Making a color chart of autumn tones is an excellent way to ease you into the subject. Be sure to note which colors were used in each "swatch" then add a bit of white to the corner of each mixed color. If you attended the August meeting, you saw the color charts that Mark had made in this format and as he said it is time well spent as you can refer to it every time you paint. (By the way, our August demonstrator Mark Christoper is holding a workshop on painting Autumn scenes. It should be informative and fun – I plan to take it! Always room in my brain to learn something from an expert!)

Following the ideas shared in this article I hope many of you will put them to use and create a painting in whatever media you choose, of a depiction of Autumn colors. I promise you won't regret any time spent on this exercise.

Artist Statement for John Erwin. Taking risks can lead to new avenues in watercolor painting. My paintings show the many roads I've taken on this adventure. Pouring and shaking watercolors over a canvass creates exciting textures and shapes. Laying one shape over another leads to new patterns and visual excitement. The use of dramatic light and dark values guides the viewer through the painting. Bright vibrant paints that are in harmony create an illuminated painting. Designing loose abstract underpaintings entertains the eye with complex images. I hope you enjoy my adventure in watercolors.

John Erwin has been painting in Arizona for over twenty years. He enjoys painting the wonderful scenery that Arizona has to offer. John's paintings capture the vivid colors and shapes found in our state. John taught in the Paradise Valley School District for forty years and is now teaching art classes at the Shemer Art Center. He has a B.S. in Liberal Arts, a B. A. in Education and an M.A. in Education, all from Arizona State University. John has studied with many local artists, including Dick Phillips and Diane Maxey. He has also studied with Robert E. Wood in California and Milford Zornes in Ireland. He is a juried member of the Arizona Artist's Guild, and the Arizona Watercolor Association. He is a signature member of the Contemporary Watercolorist's of Arizona and a member of the 22x30 and Pinnacle Peak Painters critique group.
