Creative Corner

"Setting the Mood with Color Key"

Invariably, a good painting exudes a mood or feeling, created not only by skill in rendering but also by color – bright or bold or soft and subtle; you get to pick! Decide on the mood you want to project to your viewer then use the tools of color key to carry it out.

Colors have a degree of inherent key and mood. – Yellow can be bright, sunny and cheerful – (or sick and jaundiced!) Red is exciting, passionate; Blue can be soothing, cool, calming. Orange, hot – tropical even. Purple is regal, rich.

It would be helpful to make a color key chart if you have the time to delve into such a thing. Using each of your favorite colors, make a bar of graduated color, with the lightest hue/value at one end, the darkest at the other. (If using oils, add white to create the lightest lights. This will be helpful in creating a mood using color key.)

In high key paintings, it is more than the sense of light that we try to capture. Color mood created with light values can suggest a day at the beach or sunlit snow. Here are a few tips:

Bright, pure, singing pastels create a sunny effect – and a happy mood. Delightful and uplifting. Innocence is typically high key – SO IF DOING A CHILD'S PORTRAIT, KEEP IT HIGH KEY!

Flowers, a sun- drenched day, the cold clear light around snow-capped mountains – each has a mood of its own – depicting it can be a matter of your choice of color and value – and "key".

Don't forget to make a value sketch so that you establish before you begin: 1. Where the light is coming from, 2. How much light/shadow to put in to create the mood you seek to capture; 3. Experiment with small value studies to change the mood of your subject by changing the key – i.e. High key = happy, upbeat, energy; Low key = calm, serenity, restful mood. Brilliant hues if you want excitement, soft, low intensity colors, not a lot of contrast in value or intensity, these can create a quiet or moody painting. Experiment with taking a good reference photo with lots of contrast and excitement and changing its mood with a different color and value key! I guarantee you will learn a lot from the experience.

Taking risks can lead to new avenues in watercolor painting. My paintings show the many roads I've taken on this adventure. Pouring and shaking watercolors over a canvass creates exciting textures and shapes. Laying one shape over another leads to new patterns and visual excitement. The use of dramatic light and dark values guides the viewer through the painting. Bright vibrant paints that are in harmony create an illuminated painting. Designing loose abstract underpaintings entertains the eye with complex images. I hope you enjoy my adventure in watercolors. John Erwin has been painting in Arizona for over twenty years.

He enjoys painting the wonderful scenery that Arizona has to offer. John's paintings capture the vivid colors and shapes found in our state. John taught in the Paradise Valley School District for forty years and is now teaching art classes at the Shemer Art Center. He has a B.S. in Liberal Arts, a B. A. in Education and an M.A. in Education, all from Arizona State University. John has studied with many local artists, including Dick Phillips and Diane Maxey. He has also studied with Robert E. Wood in California and Milford Zornes in Ireland. He is a juried member of the Arizona Artist's Guild, and the Arizona Watercolor Association. He is a signature member of the Contemporary Watercolorist's of Arizona and a member of the 22X30 and Pinnacle Peak Painters critique groups


