Creative Corner

Comparing Parts to Parts by Julie Frye

Every other month it is my turn to write the Creative corner article for the newsletter. Elaine and I have written countless articles on a Myriad of subjects. It is impossible to remember if we have addressed the current "issue" as we write new one each time. Therefore, I will apologize at the outset if you have "heard this one before". Read the title above before you begin, because even if explained before, a reminder cannot hurt but only help.

When an artist paints a portrait, the eyes must make sense within the context of the whole head. BUT they must also relate properly to the nose, mouth, ears and chin. This same theory applies to seeing color. Actually, color relationships. Which one is lighter or darker? (Value) Which one is warmer or cooler? (temperature) Which is more vivid or duller? (chroma)

Some relationships will be easier to see. The obvious differences between two colors that contrast each other, such as violet and orange, then a subtle difference between two similar hues, like violet and blue. Once you have observed, evaluated and mixed the color you see in your reference, now's the time to compare it to what you see with your EYES, be it a photo, set up or plein aire subject.

COMPARING PARTS TO THE WHOLE

Suppose you are painting a landscape with a bush in sunlight and a fence in shadow. To see the color note for the bush, scan the scene, noticing how the bush "note" relates to the whole scene. I sometimes use the "questions" to guide my vision. Is the bush the brightest spot in my view? The deepest? The warmest? I think you will find that most of the color notes in a painting will fall somewhere in the middle of these ranges. (Google paintings by Matt Smith who has mastered this! I am so jealous!) As you work, after you scan the scene or reference photo you are working on, look at your painting. You may notice that the actual bush seems to stand out with its warmth and brightness, whereas the fence in shadow creates a cooler and darker contrast for that sunlit edge – This contrast is ideal to create a focal point so be sure it is in the right place (The golden mean) used for countless generations of famous painters in many media. As the painting progresses, continually check the chroma, value and temperature one against the other. (Also -brow-beat#1 in this article,) a value sketch (or 6) before you ever touch a brush, or pastel stick would avoid later problems as your painting progresses. You won't regret the time spent doing so.

One final comment – On the website under "Newsletters" are PDFs of past Creative Corner articles written by Elaine and me dating back to 2018. A Free library of helpful hints. If you would spend an hour each week re-reading them – time well spent. If a particular article doesn't address your problem, click on the next issue – can't hurt!

March is springtime! Create art that celebrates spring. Use the following compositional structure:









Circle: Similar to the steelyard, the circle or O composition. It should be roughly indicated, not obvious; as such, it can be a rough circle, also taking on the appearance of a rectangular or irregular opening.

April- it's time for new beginnings. Try new techniques or mediums and have fun by taking part in this challenge. Use the following compositional structure:







Three Spot: Two masses don't create unity as well as three do. <u>Three</u> is only the minimum, you can add more spots to aid in balance and unification.

Computer Corner



WATCH OUT FOR .us Domains

The Interisle Consulting Group has published a report that cybercriminals have been using offer 20,000, .us top-level domains in phishing attacks. A top-level domain is the final section of a domain name, such as ".com" in a URL.

Although .us is the country code for the United States, cybercriminals have been using this domain to attack organizations worldwide such as Apple, Great Britain's Royal Mail and Denmark Tax Authority. Cybercriminals may use these domains to trick you into thinking you're visiting an official US website instead of a malicious one. Clicking a malicious .us link from cybercriminals could lead to malware or trick you into revealing sensitive information.

Follow these tips to spot similar scams:

- Never click a link in an email that you weren't expecting.
- Think before you click. Cyberattacks are designed to catch you off guard and prompt you to engage impulsively.
- When you receive an email, stop and look for red flags.
