


Fukushima? Chemtrails? Are We and Our Plants Being Poisoned?

Here in the middle of Germany we have had some wonderful spring weather this year. Yet the whole period has been haunted for me by what happened in Fukushima. I went out with my dog taking my camera and waited to




see what would result from that terrible and still ongoing meltdown. What I have noticed happening since April is a lot of sickness in my village. Especially among those living along the main road, where very many got sick around the same time in April. Three people have died and a number were hospitalized with symptoms like difficulty getting air, inner bleeding, heart problems, diarrhea and strange mixes of complaints the doctors didn't know what to make of. They came back with iron tablets for anemia and tablets for thyroid problems and so on... I suspected Fukushima. According to the media all was OK in Germany. Still what I had found out was rather different and I became more suspicious the more the media

hid what was happening. Just before the first real large cloud from Fukushima would arrive over Europe they closed down the records claiming there was so little radiation it was unnecessary for

them to continue – hmm just when it seemed more than ever was arriving. Then the EHEC bacteria with bloody diarrhea and inner bleeding came and I thought that fitted perfectly and wrote an article: **“EHEC Symptoms Vs Radiation Poisoning”**.

What also disturbed me, enough that I built myself a greenhouse and started planting my own veggies, is what is happening to the plants. I think this is important to share, because if I am right and the plants are absorbing poisons, for whatever reason, when people eat those plants this summer many of them may become sick.



The first time I noticed something was wrong I had gone out to pick a bunch of flowers and found the bluebells and bleeding hearts strangely collapsed and pale.

More striking still was a sudden blackening in the new shoots from the ash tree in the garden.



I asked the neighbor about the temperatures after someone claimed it was caused by frost. But then I saw other ash trees that had the same symptoms weeks later where there had definitely been no frost!

One huge ash tree threw all its blackened

leaves all over the road and they crunched beneath my feet as I walked by as if on an Autumn day.

Yet other trees seemed unaffected and the ash trees recovered and were green again. So I decided to wait and see how things developed.

Another thing I noticed was that some of the box tree bushes in my, and in other people's gardens, were strangely browned at the top where the rain would fall on them. I asked people what they thought was the reason. They said the bushes were too dry. I thought IN APRIL???

Then it was the holly that concerned me. It had been green all winter but in April and May suddenly had more and more yellow leaves. That had never happened before. It had been looking so dark and healthy and had really shot up. Certainly the earth beneath it was not too dry.



Some of the leaves on some other plants seemed to be hanging strangely or curled up in an unusual way.

Like this nettle!



Some of the flowers seemed to have gone brown very quickly. The daisies acted at first like the nettles and were curled up on themselves on a sunny day in early

April. Was it a protective stance – against what? Later there were patches of them that looked like someone had poured weed-killer on them!



Some plants like my alder trees were weighed by a never before seen plague of black “sap suckers”. Here they are on what I ‘spose is a dock plant. Why is half the leaf as if someone had poured weed-killer on it, where definitely no one had!?

The neighbour’s potato crop was also affected. They always take great care and water their plants well and yet a large section was suffering from brown leaves.



Along the main road the plant life seemed to have been hit hard – again it looked like weed-killer had been used, though it isn’t and I must remind the reader that this is a country road and not a big city.

This hedge by the main road... has certainly deteriorated in the last couple of months.



Another evergreen tree by one of our neighbours is turning increasingly brown (left below), while the privet hedge beneath it is unaffected. I can't imagine that the roots do not have enough moisture.



Above right is another dying tree with healthy plant growth beneath it. I asked the owner, who was over 80, what had happened to this tree as I had noticed a quick deterioration and she said *Oh its getting old*. A lot of trees seem to be getting old in a very short period of time!



On the left a plum tree – a number of them look like they have some kind of infection. I don't think I'll be eating plums this year.

What about acorns?

This oak was standing in a marshy area in June where it has sufficient shade. Neither too dry nor too cold and yet it looks like the ash trees did a bit earlier this year, like it had been burned... by Radiation?

Again below is another garden tree that stands on the main road just opposite the sign above. This was where today a funeral was held for one of the village people who died this spring. I feel saddened by his death as we had sat together on the bench before his stable full of animals and talked of many things.



Most disturbing of all, and the main reason I am posting this now is the following Tree of Life, a Thuja tree by another neighbour's house has suddenly sickened. How symbolic – A Tree of Life! It is obviously dying. I asked my neighbor how long it had been sick he said *two weeks!* Its true the tree was green earlier this spring and it is very many years of age and now look at it – it is almost dead. It cannot be caused by lack of water or too much heat or dryness, the tree stands to the north of the house and gets enough shadow.



So what is causing this? As I finished photographing the sun went down and I looked at the beautiful sky with trepidation, it had been raining again today.



What poisons are they pouring down on us? Is this Chemtrails, Fukushima or something else? Something is going on, maybe it will be affecting other places in the northern hemisphere too, and certainly if it does we will soon be starving to death.

A number of Native American prophecies have I believe said that the end of the world would be near when the trees start dying. Well they certainly seem to be. Of course its early days and not many people would notice what I am noticing. However the Blind Prophetess Baba Vanga predicted for 2011 that radioactive rain would fall on the northern hemisphere in 2011 and that chemical warfare would follow.
