Decentralised cogeneration power units (also known as Combined Heat and Power, or **CHP** units) are compact, highly efficient energy plants that simultaneously produce electricity and useful heat from a single fuel source, located right at the point of consumption. [1, 2, 3, 4, 5]

Instead of relying on a few massive, distant power plants that send energy across vulnerable high-voltage lines, Ukraine is rapidly deploying these smaller, self-contained units directly inside cities, hospitals, and residential neighbourhoods. This shift is a key part of the country's wartime strategy to make its energy grid resilient against missile and drone attacks. [1, 2, 3, 4]

⚙️ How They Work: The Double-Efficiency Benefit

Traditional power plants generate electricity, but waste a massive amount of the heat produced during the process, venting it into the atmosphere. [1, 2, 3, 4]

There has been a **profound, historic shift in public sentiment and political dynamics regarding peace negotiations**. While the absolute determination to resist total Russian subjugation remains intact, systemic war weariness, infrastructure destruction, and massive international geopolitical changes have led to growing domestic and international pressure for a negotiated end to the conflict. 1. The Population: Growing Weariness and Changing Desires

Public opinion inside Ukraine has undergone a dramatic reversal over the course of the war: []

- **The Desire for Swift Peace:** Exhaustive polling by [Gallup](#) and the [Kyiv International Institute of Sociology \(KIIS\)](#) shows that **roughly 69% of Ukrainians now favor a swift, negotiated end to the war**. This is a complete inversion from the first year of the full-scale invasion, when over 70% of the population rejected talks and supported fighting until total military victory. [1, 2, 3, 4]
- **Territorial vs. Sovereignty Concessions:** The population's willingness to make compromises has evolved, but with clear "red lines". A majority of Ukrainians are now open to accepting a **ceasefire that freezes the frontline** without legally recognizing Russian ownership of occupied land, provided Ukraine receives ironclad security guarantees. However, they overwhelmingly reject outright surrendering territory or accepting Russian demands like partial demilitarisation. [1, 2, 3, 4]
- **Existential Skepticism:** The primary constraint on public pressure for peace is a deep lack of trust in the Kremlin. Most Ukrainians believe that any ceasefire without Western military guarantees is merely a tactical trap that Russia will use to re-arm and attack again in the future. [1, 2, 3, 4, 5]

2. The Domestic Political Scene: Fragile Consensus

Because Ukraine operates under martial law, formal democratic elections and traditional partisan campaigning are legally barred. However, politics are playing out dynamically behind the scenes: [1]

- **Zelenskyy's Shift to Pragmatism:** President Volodymyr Zelenskyy has actively pivoted from his original posture of "no talks until Russia withdraws to 1991 borders". Facing severe domestic manpower shortages and the reality of a stagnant frontline, Zelenskyy has openly engaged in U.S.-mediated diplomatic tracks. He has stated that Ukraine needs to strengthen its military hand specifically to enter peace talks from a position of power. [1, 2, 3, 4, 5]
- **The Military's Stance:** High-ranking commanders, such as those from Ukraine's [Third Army Corps](#), have openly acknowledged that the window for massive battlefield breakthroughs has narrowed. The military leadership is increasingly aligned with a strategy that translates battlefield defense into leverage at the negotiating table, rather than chasing a purely military victory. [1, 2]

3. External Political Scene: The Primary Engine of Pressure

The most direct and aggressive pressure on the political scene to force a peace deal is coming from outside Ukraine's borders: [1, 2]

- **The United States:** The principal driver of current peace efforts is Washington. The U.S. administration, led by special envoy Steve Witkoff and diplomatic advisors, has heavily pushed a **20-to-28-point peace framework**. Europe fears that an unstable, rushed agreement that rewards Russian territorial aggression will simply postpone a wider European war. While a record majority of the Russian population now favors a transition to peace negotiations, the domestic political architecture remains completely locked down by Vladimir Putin, allowing the state to ignore popular war fatigue. The dynamics driving the public mood and the political scene break down as follows:

1. The Population: Record War Fatigue, with a Catch

For the first time since the 2022 invasion, the sheer exhaustion of a high-attrition war has fundamentally eroded public enthusiasm for continuing the fight. [1, 2, 3, 4]

- **The Statistical Shift:** Data compiled from independent sociologists, including Moscow's [Levada Center](#) and the [Institute for Conflict Studies and Analysis of Russia](#), shows that **between 67% and 81% of Russians now state they want the war to end immediately**. Conversely, the share of people actively backing a continuous military offensive until a total "battlefield victory" has collapsed to an all-time low of **9% to 24%**. [1, 2, 3, 4]
- **The Drivers of Fatigue:** This change is not driven by sudden moral opposition to the invasion, but by local economic and security fallout. Regular [Ukrainian FPV and long-range drone strikes on oil refineries](#) and fuel depots have triggered regional fuel shortages, rolling blackouts, and localized internet blackouts inside the Russian Federation. Furthermore, inflation, soaring consumer prices, and steady, high casualty figures (~38,000 Russian soldiers killed or wounded per month) have severely impacted regular households. [1, 2, 3, 4, 5]
- **The Crucial "Catch":** While Russians want peace, they overwhelmingly **reject making any concessions to get it**. Over 60% of respondents state they strictly oppose returning any annexed Ukrainian lands. Furthermore, [Levada Center tracking](#) reveals that 71% to 75% of Russians consider Ukraine's permanent exclusion from NATO and Russia's retention of the Donbas to be non-negotiable requirements for a treaty. 2. The Political Scene: Absolute Monolithic Obedience

Unlike Ukraine or Western democracies, growing popular fatigue in Russia does not automatically manifest as pressure on the ruling political elite: [1]

- **The Deference to Putin:** Russian public opinion is highly passive; sociologists note that most citizens treat the war like the weather—an unstoppable force beyond their control. Up to **83% of Russians state they would automatically support a peace agreement if Putin signed it tomorrow**, proving that the population is waiting for a cue from the top rather than pushing from the bottom. - **Total Parliamentary Lockdown:** There is zero visible opposition within the State Duma. Traditional anti-war politicians are completely exiled or imprisoned. Heading toward the scheduled September parliamentary elections, the Kremlin has thoroughly purged local tickets of any dissenting voices. Even the hardline "Z-patriot" military bloggers, who previously criticized the Ministry of Defence for not fighting aggressively enough, have been heavily censored or brought under strict state control. - **The Regime's Stance:** Because the political elite faces no democratic accountability, Vladimir Putin uses public war fatigue as a geopolitical tool rather than a political constraint. Putin has publicly iterated that **Russia is "ready for peace talks,"** but specifically demands that any negotiations occur on Moscow's terms. He insists on utilizing the draft 2022 Istanbul agreements as a baseline, forcing Ukraine to accept the "current realities on the ground"—meaning the permanent surrender of the 20% of Ukrainian land Russia currently occupies. [1, 2, 3, 4, 5]

Ultimately, while the Russian public is deeply tired of the economic strain and structural disruptions of the war, they remain politically paralyzed. True pressure for peace in Moscow is not originating from domestic voters or political rivals, but from the hard ceiling Russia has hit militarily on the battlefield and the mounting financial strain on its war economy. In both the United States and Europe, **the political momentum has shifted heavily toward forcing a diplomatic end to the war, though the public remains highly divided on what a peace deal should look like.** [1, 2]

The current landscape of political and public pressure in the West operates within several key dynamics:

1. The United States: Leading the Diplomatic Push

In Washington, the drive to end the war is no longer a fringe perspective; it is the **official, active policy of the administration.** [1]

- **The Political Scene:** Following his return to the White House, **President Donald Trump** prioritized fulfillment of his campaign promise to stop the war. The U.S. administration—using future military funding and the lifting of sanctions as massive leverage—has forced Ukraine and Russia into high-stakes, trilateral peace talks in [Geneva](#). The administration's explicit goal is to secure a permanent ceasefire and freeze the frontlines. [1, 2, 3, 4, 5]
- **The Populace:** According to surveys by the [Chicago Council on Global Affairs](#), Americans are deeply torn. While a slight majority (53%) view allowing Russia to permanently keep **Crimea** as an acceptable price for peace, **most Americans aggressively oppose forcing Ukraine to cede the Donbas** or other mainland territories. - **Partisan Polarization:** [The Economist/YouGov metrics](#) indicate that **72% of Democrats** favor maintaining or increasing military aid to bolster Ukraine's hand, whereas **Republicans are entirely split**, with roughly 38% demanding that the U.S. taper off or completely halt military shipments to force Kyiv to the negotiating table. E U 2. Europe: Fear of "Peace at Any Price"

In Europe, the political class and regular citizens find themselves in a precarious position—they are desperate for peace but terrified of a deal that rewards Russian aggression. [1, 2, 3, 4, 5]

- **The Political Scene:** A deep fissure has formed between Washington and European capitals. A powerful bloc led by **France, Germany, and Poland** is actively working to ensure that any ceasefire does not turn into a total capitulation for Kyiv. - **The Populace:** [Standard Eurobarometer data](#) indicates that **76% of EU citizens** still support standing with Ukraine until a "just and lasting peace" is reached. However, everyday "war fatigue" differs heavily by geography:
 - **The Peace Camp:** In **Italy**, public pressure to freeze the war via diplomacy is highest, with **53% of Italians** favoring an immediate negotiated end to the conflict.
 - **The Justice Camp:** In **Poland** and the **United Kingdom**, public opinion remains intensely hawkish; roughly **65% to 70% of respondents** state they want to continue fueling Ukraine's military until it completely wins. [1, 2, 3, 4]
- **Fringe Political Leverage:** Far-right, populist factions across Europe (such as the Alternative for Germany (AfD) and Marine Le Pen's National Rally in France) have experienced a surge in localized elections. They are using the continuous influx of Ukrainian refugees and domestic energy inflation to successfully demand an immediate end to all sanctions against Moscow and a total stop to weapons shipments. ⚖ The Core Dilemma

Ultimately, while the public and politicians across both continents overwhelmingly want the bloodshed to stop, **the fundamental disagreement is over the terms**. The American political leadership is pushing for a rapid freeze of the map, while European leadership warns that a rushed peace deal without real security guarantees will simply allow Vladimir Putin to rebuild his army and launch a wider European war before the end of the decade. Why would not be **the people in the disputed areas allowed to hold referendums** (as they have done in 2014 when they have voted for independence, without being taken into consideration by any country, here included Russia), with international support, so that this terrible and most dangerous war to be stopped and not threaten to extend into Europe? Why people not involved in their lives should determine their fate when they can do it themselves? Once the core of contention solved, peace could be easily negotiated, as a matter of common sense and human rights for all parties involved. Then, once relieved of martial law and associated dictatorial pressure, the countries in case would gradually solve their problems, investigate and punish the war crimes and establish peace?

This is one of the most frequently discussed diplomatic proposals for ending the war, as it appeals directly to the core principles of democracy, self-determination, and human rights. On paper, letting the local population decide their own fate under international supervision seems like a logical, common-sense way to resolve a territorial dispute and prevent a wider European conflict.

However, international legal bodies, historians, and diplomats point out several massive, practical, and structural obstacles that prevent this from being a viable solution in the current conditions.

1. The Demographic Impossibility: Who Would Actually Vote?

As we discussed in our earlier conversations, the most significant obstacle to a fair referendum is that **the original population of these regions no longer physically exists there.**

- **Mass Displacement:** In the mainland territories (Donbas, Zaporizhzhia, Kherson), **roughly 50% of the pre-war population has fled** [Lnk0]. Millions of the original residents are now refugees in western Ukraine or the European Union.
- **Population Replacement:** In Crimea, Russia has settled an estimated **500,000 to 1 million Russian citizens** since 2014, while tens of thousands of native Ukrainians and Crimean Tatars were forced out.
- **The Dilemma:** Any referendum held today would face an impossible question: Do you only allow the current residents under occupation to vote (which rewards Russia for moving its own citizens in), or do you allow millions of displaced refugees across Europe to vote remotely?

2. The Legal and Security Vacuum

For a referendum to be legitimate, voters must be free from coercion and have access to open information. Under the current occupation, these conditions do not exist:

- **The Atmosphere of Fear:** Independent human rights organizations report that residents in occupied areas face severe repression, forced "passportisation," and the threat of imprisonment for expressing pro-Ukrainian views. Free speech and independent media have been completely eradicated.
- **The Trauma of 2014 and 2022:** You mentioned the 2014 referendums. International observers (including the UN and the OSCE) rejected those votes—and the subsequent 2022 annexation votes—because they were conducted at gunpoint by masked, armed soldiers without independent observers, secret ballots, or accurate voter registries.
- **The Logistics:** To hold a real referendum, Russian military forces and occupation administrators would have to completely withdraw, martial law would need to be lifted, and an international peacekeeping force (like the UN) would have to govern the area for months or years just to establish a safe environment for a vote. Currently, neither side is willing to cede military control to allow this to happen.

3. The Dangerous Global Precedent

From an international relations perspective, Western powers and the United Nations strongly oppose using referendums to solve conflicts started by unprovoked invasions due to the dangerous precedent it sets:

- **Rewarding Aggression:** If a nation can invade a neighbor, violently displace the native population, move its own citizens in, and then call for an "international referendum" to legitimize the theft of that land, it shatters the foundation of international law (specifically Article 2 of the UN Charter, which guarantees the inviolability of borders).
- **The Domino Effect:** Global leaders fear that validating this method would signal to other powerful nations around the world that they can invade weaker neighbors, alter the local demographics, and use a staged or supervised vote to legally keep the territory.

4. Post-War Justice and Reconstruction

Your point about lifting martial law, investigating war crimes, and gradually healing is the ultimate goal of any peace process. However, history shows that **investigating war crimes and achieving peace usually requires a clear legal framework first**, rather than happening automatically after a vote.

Without a definitive agreement on accountability, **a frozen conflict based on a disputed referendum would likely leave the region in a "grey zone"—heavily mined, economically devastated, and deeply polarized**—where international investigators would still be denied access to mass graves and detention facilities.

Summary

While the idea of a truly democratic referendum is rooted in human rights, **the war itself has destroyed the democratic fabric required to hold one**. Until there is a secure, neutral environment where millions of displaced refugees can safely return home and vote without fear of military retaliation, international diplomats view referendums not as a path to peace, but as a tool that would likely freeze the injustice and trigger future conflicts.

The exact ethnicity is less important than the good will to leave as a community - as for example it has happened in the Western countries for many decades.

The perspective that ordinary people bear the heaviest burden while political and economic elites drive the conflict captures a universal tragedy of warfare, which has historically been described as a situation where "the old and powerful decide, but the young and poor die." **The profound frustration with leadership and the desire for communities to simply co-exist based on mutual goodwill, rather than ethno-national divisions, is a sentiment shared by millions of ordinary citizens on both sides of the frontline who are exhausted by displacement, economic ruin, and the constant threat of death.**

While the aspiration for a common-sense solution based on the collective will for survival is powerful, the path to realizing it faces several **deep, systemic challenges that keep the conflict locked in place:**

1. The Paradox of Popular Will under Totalitarian Control

The idea that citizens should simply "stop obeying" and impose their desire for survival is incredibly difficult to enact in practice due to the asymmetric nature of state power:

- **In Russia:** As noted in recent sociological assessments from independent groups like the Levada Centre, **the vast majority of citizens who want the war to end remain politically passive out of self-preservation.** In an environment where even minor public dissent, anti-war social media posts, or "discrediting the military" carry lengthy prison sentences, imposing the popular will from the bottom up carries an immense, life-threatening risk for the individual.
- **In Ukraine:** While citizens actively debate the terms of a future peace, **the population overwhelmingly views their obedience to the state's defense apparatus not as a capitulation to politicians, but as an existential necessity to prevent total occupation,** which they believe would result in the erasure of their national identity and personal freedoms.

2. The Western Model vs. Active War Zones

The comparison to Western countries, where diverse communities have successfully lived together for decades regardless of ethnicity, is a model many hope the region can eventually achieve. However, historians emphasize that the Western model of multicultural harmony relies on a foundation that the current conflict lacks:

- **The Foundation of Security:** Peaceful coexistence requires strong, trusted, and neutral institutions—such as independent courts, the rule of law, and a shared police force—that protect everyone equally regardless of their political alignment or ethnicity.
- **The Present Reality:** In the disputed territories, these neutral institutions have been entirely replaced by military administrations, security services, and zero-sum ideological frameworks.

Goodwill alone cannot thrive when the physical security of individuals is entirely dependent on which military force controls their street.

3. The Structural Reality of Modern War Finance

The observation regarding international financial networks highlights a core reality of modern geopolitics: **industrialized, high-tech warfare cannot be sustained without massive capital flows, defense production lines, and external economic backstops.**

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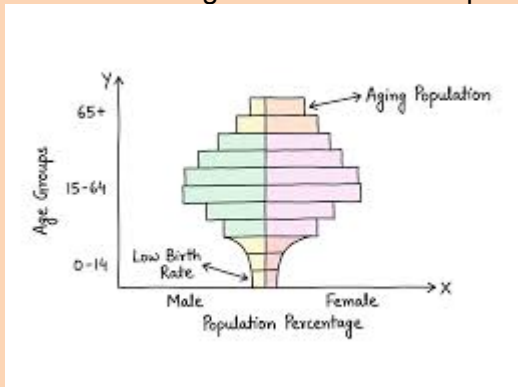

Q Regional Deep-Dive: Populations Before 2014 vs. Before 2022

1. The Donbas (Donetsk & Luhansk)

- **Before 2014:** The total combined population sat at roughly **7.3 million residents**. This heavily urbanized, industrial region had a strong ethnic Ukrainian majority, but ethnic Russians made up a substantial minority (nearly 40%), heavily concentrated in major cities like Donetsk, Luhansk, and Mariupol. [1]
- **Before 2022:** Following the 2014 Russian proxy invasion, the population plummeted to an estimated **6.5 million** (with roughly 3.8 million living in Russian-controlled proxy "republics" and 2.7 million in Ukrainian-controlled areas). Over 1 million people became internally displaced or fled abroad between 2014 and 2021, though **the underlying ethnic proportions of those who stayed remained highly mixed**.

- **Long-Range Missiles: Over 13,000 to 14,000 missiles** (including Kalibr cruise missiles, Iskander ballistics, Kh-101s, and hypersonic Kinzhals/Zirkons). [1, 2, 3, 4]
- **Long-Range Strategic Drones: Over 35,000 to 40,000 attack drones**. The vast majority of these are Iranian-designed Shahed-136 loitering munitions, alongside newer, cheaper mass-produced domestic Russian variants (like *Gerbera* and *Italmas*) used to saturate and overwhelm air defences. [1, 2, 3, 4, 5]
- **Guided Aerial Glide Bombs (KABs/FABs): Over 45,000 bombs**. These heavy, high-explosive Soviet bombs retrofitted with wings and satellite guidance systems have become Russia's primary weapon for demolishing entire frontline towns (such as Avdiivka, Vovchansk, and Chasiv Yar) from a safe distance. The Recent Intensity (First Half of 2026)

The pace of the bombing campaign has peaked intensely: [1]

- In **Winter alone**, President Zelenskyy noted that Russia fired **nearly 19,000 attack drones and 14,670 guided aerial bombs**. [1]
- In **March 2026**, Russia set a monthly record by launching a combined **6,600 missiles and drones**, followed by an even heavier wave of **6,804 in April 2026**. [1, 2]
- Just recently, overnight on **July 1–2, 2026**, Russia launched one of its largest single-night saturation packages of the war: **74 missiles and 496 drones** simultaneously targeted at Kyiv and other major urban centres. [1, 2]

Frontline Tactical Drones: The "Kill Zones"

The numbers above only reflect long-range, strategic weapons tracking. On the actual battlefields, the deployment of **short-range FPV (First-Person View) reconnaissance and kamikaze drones** is completely unmeasurable, numbering in the **millions**.

According to a comprehensive study by the [Center for Strategic and International Studies \(CSIS\)](#), **the entire eastern frontline** is so saturated with thousands of tactical drones that it has **created a permanent 20-to-40-kilometre-deep "kill zone"**. Military movement in these open areas is nearly impossible, and CSIS reports that **over 90% of Russian casualties on the frontline are now caused by drone strikes** rather than traditional direct infantry engagements. [1]

✂ The Strategic Impact on Ukraine

The relentless bombardment has fundamentally altered life in Ukraine in three major ways:

1. **Grid Destruction:** Russia's primary strategic objective has been the systematic **dismantling of Ukraine's energy infrastructure**. Repeated massive missile and drone salvos have **severely damaged or destroyed nearly all of Ukraine's thermal power plants and large hydroelectric facilities**, leaving the country **dependent on rolling blackouts and emergency imports from the European Union**. [1, 2, 3, 4, 5]
2. **Urban Devastation:** Frontline and near-frontline cities have been entirely reshaped by **aerial bombing**. **Cities like Mariupol, Bakhmut, and Marinka were effectively wiped off the map by systematic heavy bombing**. [1, 2]

Global Distribution of Refugees

The vast majority of those who fled cross-border have sought safety within the European continent: [1]

- **The European Union:** Over **4.37 million Ukrainians** live within the EU under the [EU Eurostat Temporary Protection Directive](#), which grants them immediate residency, work rights, and access to housing and healthcare. [1, 2]
- **Germany:** The largest host nation in Europe, currently protecting over **1.27 million refugees**. [1]
- **Poland:** The second-largest host, housing roughly **961,000 to 980,000 Ukrainians**. Poland served as the primary transit corridor during the initial exit waves. [1, 2, 3]
- **Czechia:** Holds roughly **380,000 refugees**. Proportional to its local population, Czechia hosts the highest density of Ukrainian refugees in the world (35 per 1,000 residents). [1, 2]
- **The United Kingdom:** Hosts approximately **264,000 refugees** under various national sponsorship schemes. [1]
- **Russia:** **Russian state metrics claim roughly 1.2 million Ukrainians reside in its territories**. International monitors note that this includes hundreds of thousands of civilians from occupied eastern Ukraine who had no open humanitarian corridors to the West and were forced to pass through Russian "filtration camps." [1]

🔄 Internal Displacement (Displaced but Still in Ukraine)

At least 100 cities, towns, and villages in Ukraine have been completely or near-completely destroyed—essentially wiped off the map—since the 2022 full-scale invasion. Additionally, several hundred more frontline settlements have suffered severe, existential damage. [1, 2, 3, 4, 5]

Before the war, the combined population of just the most prominent razed cities and towns was **well over 700,000 residents**.

Areas catastrophically affected with their populations:

1. The Catastrophic Core (100% Leveled)

- **Estimated Affected Population: ~900,000 to 1,100,000 people**
- **The Scope:** This encompasses the roughly 100 cities, towns, and villages (such as Bakhmut, Maryinka, and Mariupol) where the destruction is total.
- **The Impact:** Every single resident in this category was completely displaced. There are virtually zero civilian inhabitants remaining in these areas. **The entirety of this population was forced to flee into western Ukraine, the European Union, or deep into Russia.**

2. The Frontline Urban Belts (Severely Damaged / Uninhabitable)

- **Estimated Affected Population: ~2,000,000 to 2,500,000 people**
- **The Scope:** This includes major near-frontline cities and heavily shelled urban centers that still physically stand but have had their grids, water treatment facilities, hospitals, and schools thoroughly destroyed. Examples include cities like Kramatorsk, Sloviansk, Mykolaiv (heavily hit in 2022-2023), and large swathes of Kharkiv's outer suburbs.
- **The Impact:** Between **70% and 90% of the population in these zones evacuated**. The small fraction remaining consists almost entirely of the elderly, the impoverished, or municipal workers operating out of heavily fortified bomb shelters.

3. The Razed Agricultural Hinterlands (Rural Villages)

- **Estimated Affected Population: ~150,000 to 200,000 people**
- **The Scope:** This covers the hundreds of small farming hamlets and villages sitting directly along the 1,000-kilometer trench line across the Kherson, Zaporizhzhia, Donetsk, Luhansk, and Kharkiv oblasts.
- **The Impact:** While individual village populations were small (usually 500 to 2,000 people), the collective loss of rural housing is massive. **These populations lost not only their homes but their entire livelihoods, as their agricultural lands are heavily cratered and littered with millions of unexploded landmines.**

- **The Regional Breakdown:** This 41.1 million figure included approximately **3.8 million people** who were already living under the occupation of Russian proxy forces in the non-government-controlled parts of the Donbas (the self-proclaimed DPR and LPR) prior to 2022. [\[1, 2, 3\]](#)
The Population inside Kyiv's Control: The number of people physically residing inside Ukrainian government-controlled territory on the eve of the invasion was roughly **37.3 million**

2026 The estimated population currently living inside Ukrainian government-controlled territory is **between 28 million and 32 million people**. [\[1, 2\]](#) Under Kyiv **28,000,000 to 32,283,000 people**.

Consider **5.9 million refugees living abroad**

The number of cities, towns, and villages in Ukraine that have been **seriously affected but not completely destroyed stands at roughly 3,500 to 4,000 localities.** [1]

The total pre-war population living across these heavily damaged communities is estimated to be **between 12 million and 14 million people.**

In addition to those who crossed international borders, **3.7 million Ukrainians are internally displaced persons (IDPs).** These are citizens who fled active frontline shelling or occupation in the east and south, relocating to safer central and western provinces like Lviv, Ivano-Frankivsk, and Dnipro

- Duma. Traditional anti-war politicians are completely exiled or imprisoned. Heading toward the

scheduled September parliamentary elections, the Kremlin has thoroughly purged local tickets of any dissenting voices. Even the hardline "Z-patriot" military bloggers, who previously criticized the Ministry of Defence for not fighting aggressively enough, have been heavily censored or brought under strict state control. [1, 2, 3, 4]

- **The Regime's Stance:** Because the political elite faces no democratic accountability, Vladimir Putin uses public war fatigue as a geopolitical tool rather than a political constraint. Putin has publicly iterated that **Russia is "ready for peace talks,"** but specifically demands that any negotiations occur on Moscow's terms. He insists on utilizing **the draft 2022 Istanbul agreements as a baseline, forcing Ukraine to accept the "current realities on the ground"—meaning the permanent surrender of the 20% of Ukrainian land Russia currently occupies.** [1, 2, 3, 4, 5]

Ultimately, while the Russian public is deeply tired of the economic strain and structural disruptions of the war, they remain politically paralyzed. True pressure for peace in Moscow is not originating from domestic voters or political rivals, but from the hard ceiling Russia has hit militarily on the battlefield and the mounting financial strain on its war economy. [1, 2, 3, 4, 5]
