Meals on Wheels Keeps Rolling With Volunteers

Ron and Carol have been delivering Meals on Wheels (MOW) on their route in Barefoot Bay for years and were worried about their "clients" when they needed to go north for a couple of months. They knew that their one-day-a-week volunteer shift would be covered, but they cared about each of the 13 people they delivered to each week. Some of their clients have special needs and all welcome the friendly faces that stop by each day, Monday through Friday, to deliver their prepackaged, hot meals. Many of the clients would love for the MOW volunteers to linger just a little while, since they are often the only face they see each day. Ron and Carol love seeing those faces and chatting whenever possible.

The clients who take advantage of the MOW program are often the oldest and most frail among our community. Many have physical problems that preclude them getting out of a wheelchair, or even bed, let alone grocery shopping. Some no longer drive, due to their advanced age, and the fairly common loss of eyesight can make it dually difficult for getting around town and also safely navigating the kitchen to prepare a meal. As with many on fixed incomes, the choice between paying the electric bill or buying food can be difficult. The MOW program does not use income as a qualifier and inability to pay will not preclude anyone from applying for the program.

The MOW volunteers love their work and their clients and that love and appreciation is returned by those who receive their daily meals. "The volunteers are fantastic! I have even had them offer to help me. Different little things. I've even had them bring their husbands over to help me," said one 87-year-old woman. She is legally blind and depends on the MOW program for a cooked meal and appreciates the volunteers visiting. "I have no children, no family here and my 90-year-old brother lives up north and can't see either. I still feel very, very fortunate that I'm still healthy."

The prepackaged meals are made in Cocoa and sent by van to volunteer stations across the county. At each of those sites there is a volunteer coordinator who hands out route instructions. They provide notes for each client, informing the volunteers when someone has been added or removed from their route, as well as any special needs or delivery instructions. The meals are transferred off the van and each volunteer carries their hot food and cold items to their car where they will make the rounds on their route. Volunteers traditionally drive one route, once per week. Barefoot Bay requires 30 volunteers a week, plus backup volunteers, to handle approximately 60-70 clients on six routes, Monday through Friday. The MOW program is always looking for volunteers and when the local routes are covered there are other volunteers needed in surrounding communities.

The meals themselves are prepared daily from a menu created by a chef and a nutrition specialist. Each meal is different, every day, and covers the basics for protein, carbs, and fat. The meals allow for limited salt, due to dietary guidelines, which can lead to food that is "bland" in comparison to the higher salt alternatives we've eaten for years. A small carton of milk and traditional fruit cup accompanies each meal. "The meals are bland, purposely," said Sharon Doyle, Barefoot Bay's MOW volunteer coordinator. "Each meal is considered well-rounded. Served hot, with meat, starch, vegetable, biscuit, milk, and a dessert. The clients receive a new menu every month so they can cancel meals in advance that they know they won't eat because they don't eat pork, etc." Sharon has been working with MOW for years, having taken over the volunteer coordinator position from her mother, who volunteered for the MOW program for nearly 30 years.

Jeanne, 96, a vibrant woman with a wonderful smile, is watched and protected by her neighbors and the MOW volunteers who see her daily. "The volunteers are wonderful, they're friendly, and they're nice to talk to." She is occasionally disappointed in the MOW food. "The vegetables are overcooked, a little soft. But to me, the meals are a godsend. I eat what I like. I'm not a fussy eater. I eat everything," she said with a laugh. When asked what she would do without the program she mentioned, "I'd be eating a lot of peanut butter sandwiches. When you get older and you're alone, you occasionally cook for yourself, but mostly you're busy doing other things and you can forget to cook. But my tummy reminds me."

The MOW program is run locally by Brevard Aging Matters. In addition to the MOW program they also build ramps and provide medical transportation for those in need. The MOW program is funded by grant money, payments from clients and donations. In addition to the residents that receive the MOW program in their homes, the program also provides meals to Joe's Place and the Seniors at Lunch program here in southern Brevard. For residents interested in receiving MOW benefits there is a waiting list. The program will send a volunteer to assess the resident's needs, including a home visit and interview. There is a similar interview and application process for anyone interested in volunteering for this life-saving program.

Ron and Carol, like many of the volunteers for the MOW program, are occasionally reminded that their clients are mortal when they arrive with their meal in hand and there isn't an answer at the door. Occasionally, the client has simply taken a vacation to see family or been moved to a long-term care facility without informing the volunteers, but many times the client has simply passed away since their last visit. They are humbled by the news, but are grateful the MOW program provides them the opportunity to provide a warm meal, a little time, and conversation at the end of someone's life. Ron concluded, "Many times I've heard Barefoot Bay described as 'heaven's waiting room'. Why not be servants while we are here?"

April is designated as Defeat Diabetes Month by the Defeat Diabetes Foundation (DDF). It's a time when DDF shines the spotlight on Type 2 diabetes and the many lifestyle changes that people can make to minimize their chances of contracting the disease. Below, we're answering some of your important questions about both Type 1 and Type 2 diabetes.

Q: My husband was just diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes. His doctor said he needs to "eat better," but didn't really explain what he meant by this. Any suggestions?

A: The American Diabetes Association (ADA) has something called the Diabetes Plate Method geared toward people with both Type 1 & Type 2 diabetes. It's simple, delicious recipes can help manage blood sugar. Below, we'll share some highlights from the plan:

1) Have reasonable portions. In the U.S., we tend to have overly large portions. Try to keep this in check.

2) Fill half your plate with non-starchy vegetables.

- *3)* Fill one quarter of your plate with lean protein foods. Examples include fish, chicken, lean beef and eggs. There are also plant-based options such as beans, lentils and hummus.
- *4)* Set aside one quarter of your plate with healthy carbohydrates. Examples include brown rice, quinoa, acorn squash and popcorn.
- *5)* Enjoy a low-calorie beverage. Water is the best choice because it doesn't have any calories or carbohydrates and doesn't impact blood sugar in any way.

Q: How do you know if you're diabetic?

- A: Get a blood test, it's the only way to measure your blood glucose (sugar) levels. And be sure to get what's called a fasting blood sugar test where you don't eat anything for several hours before the test. Typically, mornings are the best time for the test.
- **Q:** My granddaughter was just diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes and my wife was diagnosed with Type 2 what is the difference?

A: Type 1 diabetes is when the pancreas does not make any insulin or very little (insulin is a hormone that regulates the movement of sugar into your cells). Type 1 diabetes usually first appears in children and is not preventable. There is also currently no cure for Type 1 diabetes, and a person with Type 1 diabetes will need insulin shots (or a pump) every day for the rest of their life. With Type 2 diabetes, the pancreas does not make enough insulin, and cells respond poorly to insulin, which is called insulin resistance. There is also no cure, however, for most people, Type 2 diabetes is preventable by living a healthy lifestyle that includes plenty of exercise and a healthy diet. But once a person has Type 2 diabetes, they can also manage it well through a healthy lifestyle and diet.

Q: My son was just diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes—and he loves his sweets. Will he be able to enjoy them at all anymore?

A: Yes. A great place to find yummy, diabetes-friendly dessert suggestions (with recipes) for both Type 1 and Type 2 diabetics is by visiting the American Diabetes Association (ADA) website: http://diabetes.org. 




They're Not Cute, They're Wild!

Feeding wild animals (except birds) is strictly prohibited in the state of Florida. This includes turtles, racoons, alligators, and so on, and the state of Florida takes the matter seriously. The fine for a first offense is \$100, a 2nd offense is \$500 and could result in 60 days in jail. A third offense (specific to feeding bears or alligators) could result in a \$1,000 fine and one year in jail. The first three offenses are all misdemeanors but, a fourth offense of feeding bears or alligators could come with a felony conviction, a \$5,000 fine and five years in prison. That is serious jail time for tossing scraps of food into the water.

Unfortunately, those scraps cause wildlife to lose their "wild" side, no longer fear humans, and worse, associate people as an easy source of food. We can become complacent knowing current laws and some may be unaware they're not allowed to feed wild animals, but those who do put everyone in Barefoot Bay at risk, especially around lakes and canals where alligators are common in Florida. Feeding a turtle may seem innocuous, but not if a gator is close to shore.

An 85-year-old woman was recently killed by an alligator in Ft. Pierce. The woman took her small dog for a walk along the water's edge in her community. An alligator came quickly towards the shore after the dog. The woman attempted to get away and save her pet, but lost her balance, fell, and was dragged into the water by the alligator. The dog survived but the alligator was later found and killed. Once an alligator has been fed by humans, it is treated no differently than an alligator that has attacked someone. The alligator is captured and euthanized and not relocated. Though the alligator is not at fault, it's better to end the alligator's life before we have a similar tragedy in Barefoot Bay.

You wouldn't think we need a sign, but maybe we do.

CVO Provides Free House Numbers in Barefoot Bay

The CVO (Civic Volunteer Organization) is offering FREE HOUSE NUMBERS to those who need the new 3 ½-inch reflective numbers that are now available. Many homes are not easily located due to missing, obscured, or faded numbers, or the numbers are not in a central location on the home. This causes concern for Police, Fire/Rescue, and also those delivery people trying to find a house in an unfamiliar neighborhood. When it comes to your safety, every split second counts when you need a speedy response from the Police or Fire/Rescue.

Emergency Services ask that the house numbers be placed on the center of the carport so all houses are uniform and they can easily speed down the road and find your house. Even in the dark they can pinpoint you quickly with these reflective numbers. (If you request help from the CVO putting up your new numbers, the Volunteers cannot remove the old numbers, but will put the numbers up next to what is there.)


Also, having house numbers is a requirement of the DOR Article II, Section 3, #16. "The address number of all Residences shall be affixed to the front of the carport or garage in such a manner as to be clearly visible and legible from the public or private way on which the home fronts. The numerals of the address number shall not be less than three (3) inches in height and one half (1/2) inches in width."

Just email BFBHouseNumbers@gmail.com with your request and contact info, or stop by the CVO Office to sign up with your contact info to receive the numbers. The CVO Volunteers will also offer to put up the numbers for those who are unable to do this themselves. Please supply your name, street address, phone number and email address so we can let you know when the volunteers will be out. You do not need to be home to have this done, please just make sure there is not a vehicle blocking the front of the car port so they can get the ladder there.



Medicare Updates for 2023

Part A Updates:

Every year Part A will have three updates—premium, inpatient hospitalization deductible, and skilled nursing facility copays. Most Medicare beneficiaries don't pay a copay for Part A but if you have not worked 40 quarters you will be required to pay based on how many quarters you did pay taxes. If you did not work the minimum of 40 quarters then your premium cost has risen \$4 to \$7 monthly, depending on how many quarters you did work.

During 2023 the cost of skilled nursing has risen \$5.50 a day for days 21-100. The first 20 days continue to be a \$0 copay.

Part B Updates:

Most seniors are aware that the premium for Part B went down this year. Last year the premium was \$170.10, this year it is \$164.90. So, the premium decreased \$5.10 a month. The premium for the Part B deductible was \$233 during 2022, this year it is \$226; it decreased \$7.

Part D Updates:

Many plan deductibles have risen from \$480 to \$505 in 2023. Some deductibles may be lower and some plans do not include all tiers of drugs in the deductible group.

Inflation Reduction Act:

Beginning in 2023, under a provision of the Inflation Reduction Act, Part D beneficiaries will pay no more than \$35 a month for covered insulin products on ALL Part D Plans. Additionally, there will be \$0 cost-sharing for adult vaccines covered under
