Shenani

I forget sometimes (more than I like to admit) that residents don't necessarily know me or my history in Barefoot Bay. I've been here since 2004, when I purchased my first home on Vireo Drive in June—two months before Hurricanes Frances and Jeanne destroyed Barefoot Bay. The devastation and aftermath of those two storms, and the fact that both of my brothers, my mother and my grandparents had homes here at the time, inspired me to run for the Board of Trustees (BOT) in 2006. To this day, I am still the youngest Trustee ever elected to the BOT at 44.

To say things were different back then is an understatement. I was one of nine Trustees on the BOT, compared to the five we have today. That first year, the BOT spent an inordinate amount of time searching for a new Community Manager (CM). Our manager had taken a similar position with the City of Palm Bay after only a year in Barefoot Bay. The Board's efforts in finding qualified candidates were severely lacking, and as we advertised and promoted the available position, the process dragged on for months. We weren't attracting the best applicants. It also didn't help that the Trustees themselves were lot owners and not necessarily educated or aware of many of our obligations as a government entity—including myself.

Back then, Sunshine Laws were too often viewed as an inconvenience rather than a law that could result in fines or jail time. The shenanigans by those with personal or political ambitions were sometimes laughably obvious. Some of you remember me from the BOT, but unfortunately, like today, many in our community have no interest in what comes before the BOT every two weeks. The meetings are boring and pedestrian compared to my time on the BOT. It takes a major event to get more than ten people to attend a board meeting. The most recent was a couple of years ago when members of the management staff, in apparent association with some Trustees, tried to force out our current CM, Kent Cichon. Underhanded, embarrassing, and ultimately a failed effort—shenanigans that were discovered and refuted by the community.

In 2006, I was the young, brash, outspoken (imagine that) Trustee—much to the consternation of the Chairman of the Board (COB), a few Trustees, and more than a few residents. I didn't always agree with the other Trustees and was not afraid to voice my opposition. To be transparent, I believe I'm the only Trustee to ever be censured as a result of that consternation and my butting heads with the CM. Consider the following recollections when deciding if it was deserved or not.

The COB and CM were close—too close. Early in my tenure, our attorney tendered his resignation. I got wind of an effort to replace our attorney with a firm from Orlando from a former Trustee who supported my efforts on the Board. I was told that the firm was "chosen." Huh? This was approximately a week before the Board meeting, where candidates would be interviewed and a decision made. Regardless of the other candidates, this firm had already been "selected."

I can't officially confirm any shenanigans between this attorney, the COB, the CM, and/or any of the other Trustees at the time, but I was annoyed. This seemed all shades of shady. Without authorization from the BOT—something that might get me censured—I picked up my phone and started calling local law firms to find additional candidates. I made multiple phone calls, and none voiced any interest in working with Barefoot Bay or making a presentation on such short notice, except for one attorney in Melbourne. Attorney Cliff Repperger appeared before the BOT as a candidate the following week. Though the COB may have thought there was support for his preferred choice, Cliff Repperger was hired at that meeting and went on to represent the Barefoot Bay Recreation District for 14 years.

The COB and CM were not happy with me. This was a tumultuous time. The finances of the District were a wreck after the hurricanes in 2004 when we billed 4,900 lot owners monthly(!) and processed checks, dealt with collections, late payments, etc. We were getting reports about checks being left in drawers and never cashed, vendors going unpaid, and purchases exceeding the \$25,000 limit. The CM had hired a classmate from their accounting class as Head of Finance and subsequently replaced decades of experienced, long-term employees and brought in personal connections. This was no secret, and it insulated the CM from criticism—something the COB didn't mind since he strongly supported the CM.

I've been referring to the Community Manager. Excuse me, this was the interim Community Manager, who had previously been our Finance Manager, and the COB was adamant that the CM was the right person for the job. The COB had our new attorney prepare a contract for the CM, which the BOT would discuss and vote on. At that Board meeting, the COB handed out copies of the contract for the Trustees to review. At the bottom of my copy were the signatures of both the CM and the COB. Oh boy.

The discussion went off the rails. Our new attorney told the BOT that the contract should not have been signed prior to approval, but discussion and a vote could continue. The COB stammered an excuse that went nowhere. The CM's "signed" contract was not approved. But the shenanigans didn't stop there.

Ad Hoc Committee Moves to Ease Single-Wide Restrictions in Barefoot Bay

The Ad Hoc Committee, formed to address the ongoing debate over single-wide homes in Barefoot Bay, has tentatively approved language that would eliminate the current requirement for homes to be at least 20 feet by 34 feet. Instead, the proposal would align our DOR with Brevard County's TRC-1, as Barefoot Bay is currently zoned, allowing homes with a minimum size of 600 square feet.

The exact wording of the proposed amendment will be finalized and presented to the Board of Trustees (BOT), likely at their first meeting in April. The BOT has the authority to approve, modify, or reject the committee's recommendations. If approved, the measure would then be placed on a mailed ballot to all lot owners for a vote. Lot owners will receive one vote, and owners of more than one lot will receive one vote per property.

Advocates stress the importance of resident attendance at the BOT meeting on April 10 (1 pm, Building D&E) to ensure the proposal moves forward. They feel while securing a vote is one hurdle, gaining community support for the amendment

Supporters believe this change is essential for Barefoot Bay's future, particularly as home sales decline amid a growing insurance crisis while annual hurricane and tornado threats exist. They point to the growing number of residents who can not insure their properties because of the age of their homes, are underinsured due to depreciation, or have dropped their windstorm insurance because of the increase in premiums as the most likely to benefit from options other than replacing their home with a \$250,000 double-wide in the event of a disaster.

Supporters see this amendment as a safeguard against financial loss, emphasizing that it costs nothing but a vote to provide homeowners with more options. They emphasize that there are well over 200 single-wides in Barefoot Bay today and that few residents would tear down a perfectly good double-wide to put in a smaller home. Even with approval, very few single-wides will ever be installed without a natural disaster. However, opposition voices have already begun raising concerns about decreases in property values and changes to the community's character, with little evidence proving their assumptions.

If the BOT approves the ballot, the vote is likely to take place this summer. As discussions continue, the focus now shifts to informing lot owners about the ballot amendment, how the change will affect them individually, the homeless Barefoot Bay residents that would immediately benefit from approval, and overall ensuring a

The kids' "event badge" was discussed and decided to be a future agenda item. 

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Water and Sewer Rates Continue to Rise

Residents of Barefoot Bay and the surrounding area will see another 13% increase on their Barefoot Bay Water and Sewer District bills this year as part of an ongoing rate hike plan approved by Brevard County Commissioners in 2022. The rate increase is part of an accelerated payment schedule to pay off a bond, with annual hikes expected until 2029.

The base rate, which rose by 13% last year, is projected to continue increasing each year. According to estimates, residents can expect their bills to reflect the following base rates:



2029: Bond Paid Off

Though the bond will pay off our current 50-year-old facility by 2029, relief for residents may be short-lived. Discussions are already underway regarding a new \$51 million water treatment facility, which could lead to additional costs.

Brevard County officials will hold several meetings in the coming years to determine how the new facility will be funded and how costs will be distributed among residents. Until then, local residents should prepare for steadily rising water and sewer bills for the foreseeable future.



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

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

The CM and COB were livid. The interim CM was still employed, but not for long, as a resignation letter was written and copies distributed to all the Trustees' boxes (printed copies back then). Shortly afterward, the CM had a change of heart and tried to retrieve the letters. A little late—I had already picked mine up. I also called TCPalm, the Indian River newspaper, and sent the reporter covering Barefoot Bay a copy of the resignation letter. It made the newspaper the next day. I'm apparently not above pulling some shenanigans myself.

I remember the next Board meeting as a fitting conclusion to a crazy year on the BOT. The CM and COB were adamant that the resignation had been rescinded and wanted to move forward with discussions on a new, unsigned contract. Did I mention that Joe Klosky was on the same BOT? He was having none of it. He quickly made a motion to accept the CM's resignation letter, and without pause, I seconded his motion. The vote was to accept—and with that, the CM was done, gathered their belongings, and left.

The meeting wasn't over yet. Within minutes, the COB and one other Trustee resigned and walked out. The remaining Trustees chose a new COB, and with that, one of the craziest times in our District came to an end.

I could easily end this recap right here. But as I mentioned, shenanigans have always been a feature in Barefoot Bay.

With the recent talk about single-wide manufactured homes in our community, one resident at the AdHoc committee a few weeks ago insisted that the 1999 ballot amendment requiring double-wides was not handled properly. She recalled heated discussions with Trustees about the change and said her memory—though not perfect 26 years later—is cemented by the fact that she and several other single-wide homeowners were called "trailer trash" by a Trustee.

Though I was not living here at the time, many residents complained about the heavy influence of the golfers on the BOT. Many would argue that the golf course was their "baby," and it got preferential treatment in the budget every year. Some still feel that way today, but the reality is that the golf course is Barefoot Bay's "baby," and its funding is important to the overall value of our properties—not just the few residents who use it. The fight between the haves and have-nots back in 1999 culminated in a resolution being filed with the state, claiming a ballot amendment vote was completed, and the amendment eliminating single-wides became part of the DOR. But it doesn't appear to have been a fair fight.

How do I know any of this? I reviewed all the BOT minutes from 1999. These are very detailed minutes of each Board meeting and Workshop, and in total, there are three random references to the DOR ballot in all of 1999. There are no minutes referencing the questions on the ballot or discussions related to those changes. There was no mention of the BOT voting and approving the changes to the DOR. The cost of the ballot printing and mailing was never discussed or approved. Maybe the most controversial ommission, there is absolutely no mention of the final results of the ballot or the recommendation the Attorney send the Resolution to the state formalizing the changes. Any other evidence of the ballot and results have subsequently been purged from District records.

The question of removing single-wides from Barefoot Bay—hardly an insignificant change to our DOR—is not mentioned a single time in the minutes from 1999. How is that possible under the state's Sunshine Law requirements? We may never know for sure, since those Trustees involved are long gone, but the legacy of that vote remains today.

Sadly, it sounds like shenanigans to me.

<Some names were redacted since they made no difference to the story. Besides, they're in the minutes from 2007.>

looking to put a home on? It certainly sounds like you may have a horse in the race?

< I've lived here for 21 years and owned my first home on Vireo Drive for almost 15 years. I later purchased the home next to my late mother's home and now own her home as well, side by side. I also own The Tattler. You asked me if I have horse in the race? I guess I would use "skin in the game". I've watched our community and understand the dynamics. When people get into our community they find a LOT of veterans and women. Many do not participate in a lot of activities but they're everywhere. They love their homes in Barefoot Bay and many of them would never leave, but many won't rebuild after a storm. For the oldest and weakest, they'll move on, back to family and the wrecked home will be the problem of the family, who knows how many miles away.

There's this huge fear that we'll go from 300 single wides today, to 3000 tomorrow, if folks approved single-wides. That's so ridiculous. Very few people will put in a small 600sq ft single wide home, some may put in a longer one to maximize their lot dimensions, but I would be shocked if we saw more than 10 in the next decade without a natural disaster. And after a disaster, the only thing we will care about is getting people to build on these lots because no one cares about a lien against a home they've abandoned.

It took more than ten years to replace the 900 homes we lost and that's when the District could fine people and placed liens all over the place. The people that got their homes delivered and installed, but couldn't afford the carport? Daily fines, just like an HOA. And it still took a very, very long time to get people in compliance, especially after the District stopped fines permanently in 2007. And remember, most people had some kind of insurance and homes were less expensive. Not any more. Weirdly, my brother's lot is still empty from 2004 when he lost his single-wide home and couldn't rebuild.

If the only option is a \$250k+ home with a \$6000 annual insurance premium, those lots are going to sit FOREVER. The District will lose tax revenue and our facilities will have suffered so we'll lose a ton of revenue from activities. We will be desperate for people to rebuild. Only then will we see an uptick in single-wides and ANYTHING will be better than the 40 year old demolished, rat infested (no joke!), home next door. I saw homes like this for years after the hurricanes.

I have spoke to landlords that live here now and have several properties. One told me he can't wait for the next hurricane because he'll scoop up as many of these lots as possible. He ain't buying them to flip them. Those homes will be rentals. We need homeowners! People need options and homeowners, even new homeowners, will care more about Barefoot Bay then that landlord.

You don't have to own a big house to be a good neighbor. This is about our long term survival as a community and our caring for those that have lived here and called it home. I love Barefoot Bay and I'm invested in many ways. Yes, I care a lot. Thanks for asking.>

FB: Question, do the tiny houses, Amazon houses and any other box drop homes qualify or just a single wide mobile or manufactured home? You may want to clarify what 'type' of single wide home. Amazon sells a 4 room modular home for around 10k. You may want to look up all the box homes and clarify. Some are low as 3 grand.

< We will still have an ARCC committee that will require singlewides match Barefoot Bay's overall look. You will not see, tiny homes, build it yourself kits, container homes, Boxabls or anything from Temu or AliBaba passing that review.>

FB: We are transplants from PA. If we had to replace our home with a 200 thousand dollar home we would most likely move back to PA. We are retired. Love living here. Don't participate in lots of activities, but are very active. We are on a limited income that we hope won't decrease with the new administration so it's not likely we could afford a new double wide modular. Single wide, probably.

FB: Thanks Rob, for putting yourself out in the public eye to support BFB. We were homeowners from 1980-1988, still live in Micco and would move back into the community without a second thought. The spokesmen from those times are mostly gone. Folks with history and knowledge are essential to continuity of community. ex: Kathy Black, Robin Phillips, Kathy Fortier. And yes, investors swooped in after our tornado and hurricanes creating a much larger percentage of rentals. I realize people need a place to live however, the pride of homeownership is often lacking. Newcomers would be wise to listen.

FB: I hadn't really factored in that landlord's would take advantage of a disaster. Perhaps we need a clause in the DOR restricting the % of homes that can be rented out. Just a thought.

< Really difficult to enforce since homes can be purchased by trusts and corporations not directly associated with an individual.>

FB: Single wides for storm destroyed homes could be an option. But when that home is retired by another owner, back to a double wide. Help

FB: Rob Allan, I just need to ask? Do you have a lot here that you're for storm destroyed homes. No help for contractors to put in single wides for renters. Renters have no skin in the community.

> < Homes are not "retired" in Barefoot Bay. They're either sold or destroyed. Renters will not be voting on the ballot, but don't expect grandfather-type clauses limiting who can put in a single-wide. Very few will, pre-disaster. It's a non-issue.>

> FB: I'm new here to the community but thank you Rob. Looks like you've been here for a very long time and really care about the community and that's what community should be about, everyone working together for the care and betterment of one another.

> FB: I think you said it all. Now comes the question what can we, owners who live here, do to move us forward to a brighter future. From that history lesson it sounds as if it is possible.

> < Remain engaged. Listen to all sides of an argument and do what's in the best long term interest for the community. I was adamantly against going into debt to finance a new lounge. I think they were talking about borrowing \$10M? Short term gain for long term pain. We need to keep those types of loan opportunities for when we really need them. Like after a hurricane.>

> FB: Wondering if the vote would be for all owners/residents, or only those registered to vote in FL?

> <This is a vote by LOT OWNERS only. Renters will not vote. You do not have to be a Florida registered voter. Please note you get one vote per property. I own two homes. I get two votes.>

> FB: I am one who has been outspoken against allowing single wides in our community and have posted my reasons. However, early on, my response was to the posts where as one person posted, she didn't like living in a double wide, no other reason. Or others who said double wides are too expensive, and they can't afford to live here. But the last couple days, I'm seeing more posts where there are small lots sized for single wides only. Of course it makes sense, if that is indeed the case, to allow a replacement single wide. Like someone posted, better than a vacant lot. But I do strongly appose single wides going in wherever. I must say that anyone concerned about a community they live in, and even if that's half a year, want to see it grow with existing rules. That has nothing to do with not having apathy.

> Also, yes, I do go back north and brag about living here, as was recently posted as a negative in a prior post. But what I brag about is an amazing community, that's safe, clean and in some ways forward thinking. We snowbirds, for the most part, are successful and generally a great addition here and we are allowed to be proud of that.

> < The problem Barefoot Bay faces is an insurance crisis where people are dropping their insurance, including snowbirds, rather than pay thousands in premiums for houses that are paid off. When your community is not covered by insurance in the event of a disaster, the community will not survive. Ask your neighbors how many have windstorm coverage? If they do, ask them how much they expect to get in the event of a disaster? And then ask them how much longer they'll keep paying those premiums? What my neighbors told me is scarier than any pending storm.>

> FB: Are we going to get a paper vote by mail or voting in Bldg. A? Also, so that no owner is left out will we be notified when they are being mailed?

> <This is a paper ballot mailed to lot owners. We'll remind people that the ballot will be coming and to be sure their addresses are updated with the District.>

> FB: I think the residents that were told " you can't put in a single wide" will be the most affected. Oh sure, now, after we've spent and borrowed to put in a double wide, this happens! Like a slap in the face!

> <Very few new homes have moved into Barefoot Bay in the past ten years and new homes put in immediately after the hurricanes in 2004 have increased in value. They have not "lost" anything. They were told they couldn't put in a single-wide because that was the rule, at that time. We are changing with the times, with the increase in insurance premiums and the need to protect our community from a future disaster.>

> FB: In addition to the 600" Sq ft requirement, will the language also include that these single wides will be required to have a carport and shed?

<That's already in the DOR. None of that changes.>

FB: So glad! Now steadily move forward so that all of us can have peace of mind should catastrophe hit us!

Respond to DOR Changes

FB: I will vote yes to replacing an existing single wide, with a single wide. That's it.

<No one will tell you how to vote, but very few people will replace their double-wide with a single-wide, unless there's a major disaster. There will never be thousands of single-wides in Barefoot Bay.>

FB: Question: can a property owner place 2 single wides that are welded together and then stack 2 more sets of welded single wides on top of the first set and have a patio/platform on top of the 3 sets below? Or...maybe have 6 single wides connected as a very large 1 story home? Asking for a friend.

<uh, No.>

FB: Let's change the restrictions about building Block Homes... then getting insurance will not be an issue. Or are we going to wait until all of the thousands of new homes are built on Micco Rd .. and sell out to a developer?

<Sellout to a developer? Barefoot Bay? You think a developer will negotiate 4900 individual lot sales? I own my lot. If someone wants to offer me a million dollars, I'll sell in a heartbeat. But even at market price average of \$200k it would cost a developer \$980,000,000. Wow! Never thought about it like that but our little community is worth over \$1B easy once you add in the amenities. But also why no developer will ever own Barefoot Bay.>

FB: There are plenty of other cheaper communities to move to. People have the chance in life to budget there money and make as much as they want. They could ask a family member to co-sign on a new mortgage and leave the home to them. Many people take the risk with no homeowner insurance and blow there money away. This is a resort type of community. There are places you can buy for 10 to 20k with lot rent around \$400 a month and live like a king or queen. Shit happens and sometimes you have to move on.

<A resort-type community? Sounds nice and these are your neighbors(!) today.</p>
They live here now and want to keep living here. But in your mind they got to take their cheap-ass to a crappy community?>

FB: It is now 2025. 1999 is just a memory. Rules need to be adjusted to accommodate the NOW, not the past. Most of the people if not all that voted that rule in are no longer with us or have moved away. Lets put being able to install NEW single wides in up for a vote and see what " THE PEOPLE" think!!

FB: I would rather live next door to a nice looking single wide than a run down double wide. I'm sure the newer single wide homes look nice. There are a lot of single sides in the Bay that are well taken care of and out lasted a lot of newer doubles in the past few big hurricanes we had.

FB: I was opposed to the idea of single wides.. but after a lot of thinking on it.. i say YES single wide replacements should be allowed!! Why??? because a brand new single is much better than a reconstructed 1975 hack job.. After a disaster Mrs Smith gets scammed and flim flammed.. ripped off blind by FlyByNite Construction.... with very little insurance compensation or no coverage at all Mrs Smith has limited options and she is forced to live in the 1975 reconstructed hack job... She entrusted FlyByNite Const Co who after completing the hack job and taking Mrs Smith's \$\$ moved on to "help" victim #2.. Mr & Mrs Jones!! Unfortunately they had to drain their retirement savings to rebuild their life and FlyByNite is on the move!! I witnessed all of this in 2004 after Frances and Jeanne hit..of course not all were single wides.. but so many people had to say goodbye to their home and life in Barefoot Bay due to no insurance, not enough coverage, or giving big deposits to scammers who preyed on desperate people. Due to # of homes damaged, homeowners were put on a contractors waiting list.. gave big \$\$ deposits.. then waited and waited.. most waited more than a year. Living in an unsafe, falling down tarped roof shack with no car port and boarded up windows.. and lucky if they had a working air unit..! Eventually they found out their deposit money was gone..stolen! When disaster hits the scammers befriend, then steal, and ruin lives.. somehow they disappear and homes will sit.. become an eyesore on every street, eventually torn down leaving vacant lots for the next 5yrs or longer.. New homes are a plus, whether single wide or double wide.

<Well said.>

FB: Why are people so opposed to double wides being replaced with a single wide? Have you ever been through a Category 5 hurricane? This community would be wiped out! We have gone through a Cat 5.... Hurricane Andrew on August 24, 1992. In fact, our home was a one story condo with cbs block (concrete block) construction with mansard roof, not even a manufactured home. A lot of people could not afford to put a brand new double wide home on their lot, so you're basically saying you don't care what happens to them?

FB: Yeah my whole stance has been if you own your house and land here. If it's blown down it can be replaced with a single. I just think of the older people and how upsetting it would be to be forced from a place when you did nothing wrong but grow too old to work and afford a new crazy mortgage. Check out these single-wides in Barefoot Bay. It's not the size of the home, but the care of the homeowner.
















