Barefoot Bay Loses Two Icons

Jean White **Passes Away** at 104

Last October we introduced many of you to Jean White and Jeanne Osbourne, collectively 200 years of life lived. Unfortunately, we have to revisit that story less than a year later. Both women were longtime residents of Barefoot Bay and loved our community as we loved them for their time among us. Jean White, 104, passed away this month. She was not one to suggest there be a memorial in her honor. To the contrary. But we know she'll be both remembered and missed by family and friends. At 104 years of age she was the oldest resident of Barefoot Bay. Someone else, unknown, now holds that distinction. We honor Jean White and those in Barefoot Bay that have called our community home for years and leave us with memories of their lives, well lived.



Jeanne **Osbourne Moves Away**

Jeanne Osbourne, has also left us, but only as far as The Fountains in Melbourne. Jeanne lived alone and could no longer drive at 97 years of age, which made participation in Barefoot Bay activities difficult. She doesn't require assistance at her new home and activities and friendships are within walking distance. Jeanne Osbourne was a past BBRD Trustee, an active volunteer, and she belonged to numerous clubs over the years and was someone I have had a wonderful friendship with for almost 20 years. Her near constant presence around Barefoot Bay will be missed by many and near impossible to fill by a single retiree. There are few people who have made as big an impact on our community as Jeanne Osbourne in the past 30 years. (We have reprinted their story from October in this issue of the Tattler).

Palm Bay Annexes Property **Directly West of Barefoot Bay**

Palm Bay has approved a land use change for the property they have annexed off Micco Road that now abuts Barefoot Bay (the green area on the top map is now Palm Bay). This property was approved for a mixed-use designation and is currently under contract by an Orlando developer that intends a \$2.5B project, adding close to 5,000 homes and 1,000 apartment/townhomes. In addition to the new homes, the developer also intends on developing 5.4M sf of commercial/retail space for their downtown area in their golf cart friendly community, Ashton Park. Traffic surveys, permitting, and zoning do not have any projected dates for completion/approval. The Tattler will follow this story as it develops and give residents ample notice to participate in those public hearings/events considering the potential impact on our community, especially the increased traffic that will come with such a large development on a single lane road. There are no guarantees this project will commence any time soon, if ever, But with, or without, our voices, the area west of Barefoot Bay is ripe for future development and the good, the bad and the ugly that comes with it.





No organized sports, no phones—just bare feet and bathing suits! It was heaven!

Somewhere in there my Aunt Agnes Walston visited and bought a house on the corner of Egret and Brown. And since our young family spent so much time down in Barefoot Bay, it was inevitable that my mom and stepdad, Doris and Pete Conroy, bought here on Bougainvillea.

Every summer, during the most intense heat of the year, the summer months, we came and lived the lives of Floridians! I'm sure when we arrived at the pool, the hosts

cringed. LOL! I have to say that the kids were welcomed with open arms, but they knew the rules, and still had a great time. At that time, music was being played poolside, and the kids remember their grandparents dancing and laughing while in the pool!

The memories made in the pools, fishing in the lakes, fishing off the pier, the inlet, island hopping in the intracoastal, the Barefoot Bay Beach—each have provided endless stories and memories of people and times gone by. This is what the Bay is to us.

Now our kids are grown, we are retired, along with our siblings and our cousins. We all live here because of those shared adventures. And our kids bring their munchkins! What a gift John and Sylvia VanBerschot gave us when they made that big move from the south side of Chicago to Barefoot Bay!

Happenings at the BOT Meetings

June 27th meeting—The budget was approved today before the July 1 deadline, as mandated by the Charter and State Statues. The Board approved the proposed budget for FY24 by a vote of 4 to 1. A Public Hearing was held and the FY24 yearly Assessment Rate of \$934.04 was approved. Resolution 2023-09 adopting the FY24 Assessment of \$934.05 was passed. All fee increases were postponed until October 1st and will be reviewed at the August 3rd Fees Workshop.

July 13th meeting—The board passed Resolution 2023-10. It provides for the appointment and duties of the Records Management Liaison; records retention policy; (no added personnel) and determining the electronic record to be the official record. The most notable action that the Board of Trustees will take through the approval of this resolution is found within Section 4. In accordance with Florida Statutes, the District will be able to reduce the use and storage of great amounts of paper through electronic scanning of records and retention of those records in an electronic format. In addition, this should allow for greater efficiency in record searches. Richard Edwards was selected to fill the vacant AARC alternate

August 10th Board of Trustee meeting-it was decided to cancel this meeting because of vacations. There would not have been a quorum.

Other Items-

The August 3rd Fee Workshop will be held in Building D&E at 6 p.m.

Pool 1 renovations are progressing. Tile replacement and resurfacing are underway. The trench between the pool and outside the fence is filled in.

The RFP Committee for the Golf Carts will have their final meeting on July 17 and the recommendations will be presented to the Trustees during the August 22nd BOT

The new Hunter Green awning has been installed at the 19th Hole porch.



Watch the Peek of the Week for movies and times. All Veterans and their families are welcome.

Start A New Career Journey with VR&E—Starting your career journey with a service-connected disability can be overwhelming. However, with the Veteran Readiness and Employment (VR&E) support-and-services tracks Veterans can explore employment opportunities and address education or training needs.

Disability Benefits for Vietnam Veterans—Vietnam Veterans may be eligible for expanded VA disability compensation under the PACT Act, a Biden law passed in 2022 that increases access to VA benefits and health care for Veterans exposed to toxic substances during their military service. If you are a Vietnam Veteran, find out if you're eligible for disability compensation due to certain medical conditions. Barefoot Bay Service Office has forms and anything necessary to apply.

Disability Benefits for Eligible Dependents—If you have a 30% or higher disability rating from VA, you can add dependents to increase your compensation benefits.

WARNING Predatory Law Firms Scam your Benefits—Have you recently been aggressively contacted by a company or law firm regarding legal representation to file your PACT Act or Camp Lejeune presumptive VA claim or an e-mail? Dishonest attorneys are messaging Veterans with offers of assistance, but charging inflated fees. The VA will help gather the necessary evidence to support it. There are no costs or hidden fees to apply. Apply directly to VA securely online or in person at any regional office. Or at the Veterans Service Office.

Free Reading Program Unites Military, Veteran Families Through Shared Experiences—United Through Reading keeps military families reading-ready, no matter the distance, providing the opportunity for service members and Veterans to video record story time for a child they love. You can download their FREE app from your favorite app store and send your story today.

VA Has Emergency Buttons to Call 911. You will have to see your doctor at Palm Bay or Viera Clinic or Orlando, but it is free to any veteran that might need one. The button is good anyplace in the United States of America for 911 call.

Come into the Service Office for Information on the Buddy Check Program—The Service Office and the Service writers have all the information and sign up forms. Get a call to see how you are and if you need help. You can also call 772-663-0645 and leave a message for a call back to sign you up.

New Law Helps Survivors Get VA Benefits—A new law, Pact Act, makes it easier for survivors of Veterans exposed to toxic material, including burn pits, to receive Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC), which are tax-free benefit payments available for certain surviving spouses, children, or parents. Finally, after 50 years, we are getting help.



August is National Immunization Awareness Month

Growing up, most of us receive many vaccines. Indeed, it's often required if you want to attend school. But as adults, we think that we no longer need them. That's not true! As we get older, our immune systems tend to weaken over time, putting us at higher risk for certain diseases, according to the CDC. What's more, it's not just about us. Meaning, when we get vaccinated, we also protect others because we'll be significantly less likely to spread certain diseases. There's even a term for this, community immunity.

Below we answer some of your questions about vaccines for adults.

Q: My friend is 55 and has shingles. She's in such terrible pain, and I'm afraid that I'll get it from her; is it contagious? If not, I'm 48—should I get a shingles vaccine?

A: According to the CDC, if you've had chickenpox before, then your friend's shingles virus is not contagious. However, for people who have never had chickenpox or didn't get the chickenpox vaccine, they can get infected with shingles (aka varicellazoster virus, the same virus that causes chickenpox) from someone who has shingles through (1) direct contact with the fluid from their shingles blisters or (2) breathing in virus particles from their blisters. However, if they do contract it, they will actually develop chickenpox, not shingles, although they could then develop shingles later in life.

Regarding your second question, assuming you did have chickenpox as a child and therefore could not contract shingles from your friend, the CDC recommends that people 50 and older should get a shingles vaccine (zoster).

Q: My husband is 65 and has diabetes. Is it safe for him to get a vaccine for pneumonia?

A: Yes. According to the CDC, all people 65 and older, whether or not they're immunocompromised by a disease such as diabetes, are advised to get a pneumococcal (for pneumonia) vaccine. There are two kinds of pneumococcal vaccines available in the United States: Pneumococcal conjugate vaccines (PCV13, PCV15, and PCV20) Pneumococcal polysaccharide vaccine (PPSV23). Ask your physician which is best for you.

Q: I'm 70. It seems like the COVID-19 epidemic is over, but a friend advised me to get a COVID booster. Is this really necessary?

A: While life has returned to normal, per se, people can still contract COVID-19. According to the CDC, they recommend that people aged 65 years and older get a second dose of updated Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine.

In addition, the CDC states that people who are moderately or severely immuno-compromised may get additional doses of updated Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine.

Q: My mother is a healthy 80-year-old woman, but I read somewhere that given her age, she should get a tetanus shot even if she had one as a child, which she did. Is this true?

A: According to the CDC, adults should get a TD or Tdaph shot every ten years.

We understand how it can get a little confusing regarding what vaccines to get as adults. To make things a bit easier, below is a list from the CDC website of vaccines they advise adults to be up to date on, broken down by age groups. For more detailed information, please visit the CDC website: www.cdc.gov.

Adults 19 to 26 years should make sure they're up to date on these vaccines: · Chickenpox vaccine (varicella) · COVID-19 vaccine · Flu vaccine (influenza) · Hepatitis B vaccine · HPV vaccine (human papillomavirus) · MMR vaccine (measles, mumps, and rubella) · Tdap vaccine (Tetanus, diphtheria, and whooping cough) or Td (tetanus, diphtheria)

Adults ages 27 to 49 years should make sure they're up to date on these vaccines: COVID-19 vaccine · Flu vaccine (influenza) · Hepatitis B vaccine · MMR vaccine (measles, mumps, and rubella) · Tdap vaccine (Tetanus, diphtheria, and whooping cough) or Td (tetanus, diphtheria).

Adults ages 50 to 64 years should make sure they're up to date on these vaccines: COVID-19 vaccine · Flu vaccine (influenza) · Shingles vaccine (zoster) · Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, and whooping cough) or Td (tetanus and diphtheria)

Adults ages 65 and older should make sure they're up to date on these vaccines: COVID-19 vaccine · Flu vaccine (influenza) · Pneumococcal vaccine · Shingles vaccine (zoster) · Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, and whooping cough) or Td (tetanus and diphtheria)

Please note, it's still important to consult with your doctor regarding what vaccines to get, particularly because you may need additional vaccines based on your age or other factors. These may include:

Hepatitis B vaccine – recommended for all adults up through 59 years of age

MMR vaccine (measles, mumps, and rubella)—if born 1957 or later

Chickenpox vaccine (varicella) – if born 1980 or later

HPV vaccine (human papillomavirus)

Funding for Seniors

Brevard County funding for nonprofits has declined from \$1 million dollars to zero dollars. Yes, you read that correctly—no money for seniors who still pay into a county budget of \$1.83 billion. Zero funding for nonprofits that assist seniors in a state with the highest percentage of seniors in the country. Our task now is to develop a campaign to restore this funding.


There are government funds to help low-income seniors facing homelessness and other issues, but these are almost always restricted funds. Many of these funds are given on a reimbursement basis, meaning that the nonprofit must have enough cash to fund the service up front, submit an invoice, then wait an undetermined time to be reimbursed. Most nonprofits operate on a limited budget, making this difficult to do.

That is why county funding is so critical for vital nonprofits like the Sharing Center, Senior Resource Center, and St. Vincent De Paul food pantries that do a superhuman job of helping people in need fulfill basic necessities such as shelter, food, electricity, and gas when there is truly no public resource that will do it.

We have an aging population. We need affordable housing. We need a way to help those who live paycheck to paycheck, especially when a paycheck is missed, or a job lost. Many churches have programs to assist those in need. Why don't our elected officials have the same concerns?

Brevard County should restore funding of \$1,000,000 for nonprofits that serve elders and people in need. It is past time for those we elect to do something about assisting those nonprofits that work to mitigate the homeless and other needs of seniors, seniors that pay their share of taxes but are shortchanged in the county provision of services to seniors.

200 Years Between Them (Reprinted from October 2022 Issue)

Allow me to introduce you to "Plain Jean" and "Fancy Jeanne," self-nicknamed for the respective spellings of their shared name. Their name is not all they have in common though. Jeanne Osborne is 96 years old, and Jean White is going to be 104 years old this coming March! Between the two of them are nearly two centuries of wit, wisdom, love, laughter, and lives well-lived. Jeanne was born in 1926 and is very proud to see her dear friend, Jean, born in 1919, still thriving. In fact, these good friends both live on their own, with regular help from friends and family to get around to appointments, enjoy an occasional event out, and play their weekly bridge game with "The Girls."

Bridge has been a lifelong passion for Jean, who, at 103 years old, is still quick to offer a little bridge wisdom during the group's weekly games. "I love the game so much, that I want everyone else to be good at it!" she said with a twinkle in her eye. She went on to say how much she looks forward to her bridge game with Jeanne, and rounding out the quartet, Jan McGannon and Marilyn O'Keefe. "They are very good to me! They give me hints if I can't see if my card is a spade or a club," she chuckles to Jeanne, who is smiling from ear to ear. In the winter months, the Bridge Club has about four tables, and in the summer even more.

We had the pleasure of enjoying breakfast with these two sweethearts. As we were eating, a resident whispered, "How old is she?" and, upon hearing the answer, stopped by the table to shake Jean's hand. "You are the oldest person I have ever had the pleasure to meet, and I wanted to shake your hand!" It IS an honor to sit with nearly two hundred years of combined wisdom and grace. The eyes and ears may not work as well as they'd like, but Jean waved at him with perfectly polished, long red nails.

Jeanne Osborne hails from Elizabethtown, Pennsylvania, and has lived in Barefoot Bay for 34 years. Jean White hails from Springfield in Delaware County, Pennsylvania, and has lived in Barefoot Bay for 28 years. Both are wives of military husbands, Jeanne's in the Navy, and Jean's in the Army Air Corps. Her husband, Joe, was a Captain, a fighter pilot during WWII, who was a flight instructor and was later sent to Japan during the Korean War. Jeanne fondly recalls her many years in politics, serving on the Democratic State Committee, then later, as Barefoot Bay Recreation District's first chairwoman.

Jean worked many jobs over the years, in the office at a bakery and an oil company. She joked about smoking "filterless camels" at one point. "Back then, if you didn't smoke—it was like you didn't brush your teeth!" she laughed, "But it really wasn't for us and we soon quit." Her best accomplishment by far was being married to her high-school sweetheart for 72 years. Her husband, Joe, passed away at the age of "97 and four days," and she misses him still. Jeanne pipes in to express what a lovely man he was, "a real sweetheart."

Jean shared that at one point, she and her then-fiance had bought a car together before he went into the service. She used the car to visit her relatives in Beaumont, Texas. Her father teased her, saying that her husband married her "to get the car back!" That was in the summer of 1942.

Despite the stereotypical question, "What has stood out to you the most this last century?" Jean's answer was a poignant memory shared by many. As she told the story, a far-away look came into her eyes as she relived the moment. "I remember my husband and I took a day off and joined another couple, where we drove to Atlantic City and had a wonderful meal at a nice restaurant. The next day, my Joe was outside washing the car, and on the radio, came the announcement that President John F. Kennedy had been assasinated. It was such a terrible shock!" she recalls.

When asked if she had met any celebrities, Jean sat up a little straighter and proudly announced she had attended Nancy Lopez's wedding. Lopez was an American former professional golfer who became a member of the LPGA Tour in 1977 and won 48 LPGA Tour events, including three major championships.

Jean also spent years and years traveling the world. She spoke fondly of visiting Greece and Egypt ("you could walk right up the pyramids in those days!"), and went to the Holy Land in 1970. For their first trip to Europe, Jean and her husband went for three weeks, and with three meals a day included, their trip was \$1,000 each. Their next trip was to Spain, Portugal, and Morroco, and for two weeks, with two meals a day, they spent \$2,000 each. They traveled to England five or six times, as her brother-in-law was a native Brit, and they visited her sister who lived in Paris and was a secretary for General Gunther.

Jean used to teach exercise classes regularly at Pool 3. When we stated, "Well, you look healthy," she said, "I know!" and followed it up with the fact she has had NO major health scares in 100 years. She then wryly suggested that "everything ends after 100," though she proudly passed her driver's test at 100, but had to retire it soon after due to her eyesight. Here Jeanne jumps in with a comment, "She's done so good! We need to keep her that way!"

These days, though her eyesight limits her somewhat, Jean is subscribed to the National Archives where she receives specialized books on old blue tape cartridges almost the size of a VHS cassette. She was provided a "machine for talking books," a magnifier machine, and a special phone. "When I die, a lot of things have to go back," she jokes. Glancing at the old 80's style magnifier, the size of a black and white TV with yellowing plastic, she continues, "But I don't think they're waiting for it."

After breakfast (one pancake, eaten slowly with delight, and plenty of maple syrup), we visited with Jean in her tidy home, where she is taken care of by her son, who visits her weekly or more and brings meals enough to last a few days when he does. She spoke of her daughter flying in once a month to see her and displayed the roses from her last trip. She proudly showed me the stunning quilts her daughter makes, which are used throughout her home.

What did I learn? I learned that my life is far from over at 51. Jean White has lived twice as long as I, and she has lived a rich and wonderful happy life at that. It was such a pleasure to share a morning with our two "Jean(ne)s," and we already have our next breakfast date set for more great conversation!
