# New Micco Bridge on Schedule



The Micco Road Bridge replacement project is tracking within 8 - 10 days of the original schedule. The Brevard County contractor in charge of the project has opportunities to accelerate the work and have the road open for use at the end of September/first week of October. This would come as a welcome relief to those who have been cut off from traveling east and

Please note that construction schedules are dependent on a wide variety of factors weather being one example—and are subject to change. Tropical storms have been affected by the heavier-than-average Saharan Dust Layer blowing across the Atlantic this summer, reducing the moisture and heat necessary to energize the tropics and hopefully giving the bridge contractor plenty of time to get ahead of schedule. Having Micco Road available during hurricane evacuations is imperative.

The next steps of construction include:

- Forming, pouring, and curing the concrete bridge deck.
- Forming, pouring, and curing the concrete approach slabs.
- · Construction of the roadside railing across the bridge.
- · Constructing the permanent roadway east and west of the bridge.

# Homeowner's Badge Confusion Reigns

There was a Board of Trustee Town Hall Meeting on July 25 at 9 am. The Town Hall style meetings are held quarterly and are one of the few opportunities for residents to have extended, back-and-forth conversations with our Trustees. A concerted effort should be made to schedule these meetings when the largest number of residents can attend. I would agree with many that this type of meeting be held in the early evening, not the early morning, as I was also unable to attend the meeting.

Prior to the meeting, there was significant online chatter regarding exceptions to the ules on badges/passes. This is not the first time that this has come up for discussion. Homeowners are allowed two adult badges, regardless of how many properties they own. The rules require you to be on the deed or have your badge assigned by the owner of the home. Your children under 18 are also entitled to badges. Badges are not transferable, but living arrangements change all the time with deaths, divorce, marriages, etc. A single homeowner can assign their second badge to anyone and revoke those privileges if necessary. Homeowners can not assign/transfer their own badges to someone else.

The exceptions being considered are specific to caregivers. This exception would relate to those living with and/or caring for an individual Barefoot Bay homeowner, whether a family member not on the deed or a professional caretaker. The current rules probably make specific changes for caregivers unnecessary for single homeowners who could assign their spare badge to a caretaker. Still, I'm in favor of allowing caregivers free access to the facilities, specifically when servicing their clients. That's common sense.

What is not being considered is allowing renters to have homeowner's badges for a unit owned by someone else. This rule will not change. The confusion regarding homeowners badges revolves around the false premise that you are "paying" for your badges with your annual assessment. This is a misconception. You receive your passes solely for being an

owner of property in Barefoot Bay. The passes are your access to Barefoot Bay events and activities that require them. You can lose your badge for a variety of reasons (i.e., not paying your taxes, breaking established rules, criminal activity on Barefoot Bay property, etc.) Barring any of the above, your passes are yours for as long as you own the property.

You do not have to live in Barefoot Bay to use those badges as long as you own Barefoot Bay property. More than one individual has purchased an empty lot just so they could have a homeowner's badge. The same goes for the homeowner who rents their property and doesn't live here. You can still use your badges since you pay the same taxes and assessment on an empty lot and are entitled to the badges associated with that property as "homeowners."





The CVO will have a meet-n-greet for our new Trustees sometime in September, so please watch for the dates to be announced in the September Tattler and in Peek at the Week.







#### **BOT Happenings:**

06/25/24

The Assessment Fee Public Hearing was held, and resolution 2024-07 was adopted.

The Budget for FY2025, resolution 2024-06 was adopted.

The Resolution 2024-08 for a caregiver badge for totally dependent persons was agreed to be discussed at the upcoming Policy Manual Workshop on August 15th. This will be in line with all the changes being accepted by one resolution.

The ARCC committee renewed two members

The Living Out Loud Club's (LOL) proposal for BBRD to construct a Rainbow Bridge on District property through funds donated by the LOL to BBRD was accepted unanimously by the board. The concept of the Rainbow Bridge originates from a poem about the loss of one's pet. Although this structure is to be constructed primarily to provide a place for residents to visit and reflect on the pet they have lost, the use of the bridge is available for all.

Our attorney, Garrett Olsen, drafted a letter to the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners Regarding Water Use. An excerpt from the proposed correspondence follows: Trustees, District staff, and members of the public have identified several issues with the BBWSD, including customer service issues, high base rates, and high consumption rates.

The draft correspondence distributed prior to the meeting aims to address these issues by requesting that the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners (as the board of the BBWSD) take appropriate action to remedy the issues raised and provide additional information to the BOT and residents where appropriate. The correspondence was reviewed and discussed, then was accepted and authorized to be sent as soon as possible.

# **Robo and Spam Calls - What** can we do?

The number one question that comes up in any gathering where the focus is on criminal activity is the huge number of scams and robocalls that are received by residents in this area. When the phone rings, we have an incredible 'need' to rush to answer the call. Why do we do that?

We have many forms of communication- the US mail, cell phones, landlines, the internet, and person-to-person. Do you feel the need to rush to the mailbox to pick up your mail as soon as it is delivered, or is it okay to leave it there to get it when it is convenient for you? Do you check your internet messages and Facebook pages the moment you hear that notification ping, or do you wait until it is convenient and safer for you to check those messages? The same is true when the phone rings; you can answer it when it is convenient for you and safe for you to answer. This is why we have Caller ID and message recordings. It is how you get phone calls when you are not home- your phone is just a communication tool.

Robocalls are generated by a person who registers a fake ID- name and phone number- it could be pretending to be the IRS, Sheriff's office or even your neighbor's name and number. The fake person's computer can cause thousands of calls to be made automatically by requesting calls for a range of numbers- like 772-663-0001 through 772-664-9999. When you answer, it sets up a connection- you and the scammer's recording are now joined. You are now his target. The recording may ask you to press #1 to talk to a person or #6 to opt-out. No matter what you do, you have indicated that you are a real person with a real phone number. He may also increase his profits by selling this "live" number to other scammers so they can call you too- after all, you did answer his call and will be more likely to answer another scammer's call! The sale of your number has real value on the dark web of crooks and thieves. Statistics show that one out of every six people gets scammed. Scammers are a 10 billion dollar per year business. The fines that result from the work of the Federal Trade Commission are in the thousands of dollars and are considered "just the cost of doing business" to the scammers- not much of a deterrent.

What can you do, and what should you

- 1. Let the phone ring at least four times before answering. Most robo and spam calls will stop at the 3rd or 4th ring before your voice recorder takes over. When you don't answer right away, the scammer loses money - he is looking for his next live target. If the phone continues to ring, it could be a real call, at that point, your phone Caller ID has also been activated, showing who is calling, and your voice-activated ID may also announce who is calling if the number and name are in your contacts list- those people you would like to talk to. If you were not home, the call would go to the voice recording- what would be wrong with letting that happen when you are home? Any reputable business, doctor, neighbor, family member, or friend will leave a message with the information you are looking for or will call back. Having the recorded message will also give you time to get the information requested or listen to the message several times until you are certain that you understand the call and are ready to return the call. Even during that message recording, you can pick up the call and talk to the person. Take advantage of those electronic devices that are designed to help you, let them do their work!
- 2. Register your cell phone and landline with the "Do Not Call" listing. This will only work for some spam calls. Robo and scam calls are not likely to come from people who wish to follow the rules! Go to the National Do Not Call Registry website and enter your phone numbers, including your cell phones.
- 3. Report the caller and phone number to the Federal Trade Commission at FTC. gov. This is especially important if the scammer is pressuring you, threatening you or you have given information that could be used by the scammer to take your money. You may also wish to inform the Sheriff if you feel threatened or have shared too much information.
- Google or use the free Robocall Reverse Search app to enter the number that calls you to see who the caller is and what company is represented. Type the phone number in the search bar to see what is known about that number.
- 5. Do Not Answer! Do Not Answer unless you know who is calling. You are not required to answer your phone. If you do answer the call - Do not give any information such as banking, social security number, medical information, or personal information that provides the scammer with an opportunity to use your good name and credit to take your funds. For those who think it is fun to "play" with the scammer a little- keeping them on the line, asking them a lot of questions- Don't do it!!! With advances in artificial intelligence, it takes 3.7 seconds for your voice to be able to fully duplicate not only your sound but also the unique way you talk. Your copied voice would be easily recognized if a spam call was placed to a friend or family member saying you were in trouble and needed money in a foreign country needing help or involved in this great "deal" that you would want to invest in as well. How would they know who to call- who to target next? All of that information can be found just by searching your name in public records and even more easily by looking at your online profile. Your profile will often show where you went to school and work, friends, photos of family members, and family events with the dates included. If you really want to reduce the number of robo and spam calls -Just don't answer. This is the best advice to deal with phone calls from phone numbers you and your electronic devices don't recognize.

# Women's Heart Health

What Women Need to Know about and blood pressure levels. Physical inactivity Heart Disease

Today, heart disease is still one of the leading causes of death in our nation and is the number one killer of women. Heart disease has become an epidemic in our country, and 64 percent of women who die suddenly from coronary problems had no previous symptoms. It is time for women to become educated about heart health and the risks it poses for them or their loved ones. Below, we answer your questions about this dangerous disease.

Q: My wife was just diagnosed with heart disease, but I'm not exactly sure what it is. Could you please explain?

A: Heart disease is a common term for several heart-related problems. When plaque builds up in the walls of the arteries, the arteries narrow, which causes difficulties with blood flow and increases the risk of heart attack or stroke. Other types of heart disease include heart failure, irregular heartbeat, and heart valve problems.

Q: I read that heart disease is common in women - is that really true?

A: Absolutely. But I understand if that's surprising; heart disease used to have the stigma of being an "older man's disease." However, heart disease kills one in three women each year. That staggering statistic is why it is so important for women to educate themselves and learn prevention methods. Since 1984, more women than men have died from heart disease; however, only one in five women believe that heart disease is their greatest risk.

**Q:** Both of my parents had heart disease, and that makes me nervous. Does heart disease run in families?

A: Yes, heart disease runs in the family and can play a role in some conditional risks of heart disease, such as high blood pressure, high cholesterol, and diabetes. Another factor to consider when heart disease is common among family members is lifestyle choices. Although it can be hereditary, heart disease also stems from poor health habits. Family members who live together can adopt each other's bad habits, such as smoking and poor diet. When looking at your family history, be sure to examine all the factors.

Knowing your risk for heart disease can help you lower the threat. In addition to heredity and conditional risks (like high cholesterol, high blood pressure, or diabetes), another factor that increases your chances of heart disease is certain behaviors. Behavioral risks are those people whose lifestyle decisions increase their chances of heart disease. Tobacco users, especially cigarette smoking, can increase blood clotting and raise blood pressure. Those who have a high sodium and saturated fat diet can raise cholesterol

and obesity promote excess fat and are often related to conditions that increase the risk of heart disease. Finally, excessive alcohol use increases blood pressure and plaque buildup in the arteries.

**Q:** What is the difference between a heart attack, stroke, and heart failure?

A: When it comes to your heart, you should know that various life-threatening events that can occur:

• Heart Attack—A heart attack occurs when the blood supply to the heart is diminished or even cut off. The lack of oxygen damages the heart, resulting in a heart attack. Blood supply is reduced when the arteries narrow or there is a blockage in the passage.

• Stroke—A stroke occurs when there is reduced blood flow to the brain. Much like the heart, the limited blood flow decreases the amount of oxygen going to the brain, depriving brain tissue of the nutrients it

• Heart Failure-Heart failure, or congestive heart failure (CHF), occurs when your heart is unable to pump enough blood to meet your body's needs. This is a condition where, over time, arteries will narrow, and the heart will be too weak to pump efficiently.

Q: My mother's primary care physician sent my mother to a heart doctor because he thinks she may have heart disease. What treatment options are available?

A: It depends on your mother's specific heart condition, which your doctor's heart specialist should be able to answer. But generally speaking, treatments for heart conditions may include medications, angioplasty, stenting, or coronary bypass surgery. But again, your mother would need to see her doctor to see whether or not any of these treatments might be right for her.

Q: Heart disease runs in my family. What are some preventative measures I can take to decrease my chances of getting it?

A: Making certain lifestyle changes, such as eating healthy and staying active, will help lower your cholesterol and help you lose excess weight. We live in a sedentary society, so here are a few easy suggestions to facilitate this: take the stairs instead of an elevator; get up out of your chair once an hour and do some jumping jacks (make sure your doctor approves before you do this); walk to work or to do errands: and march in place while watching television.

Other actions you can take include tracking your blood pressure and blood sugar levels regularly to maintain a healthy level. If you are a smoker, you should guit immediately. Those who guit smoking decrease their chances of developing heart disease dramatically within just one year. If heart disease runs in your family, talk to your physician so he or she can assess your risk and treat you accordingly.



You do not receive two passes for each property you own, even if family members live on one of your properties. I own two homes in Barefoot Bay and have adult children living in one of the homes. They are not on the deed and not entitled to homeowners badges any more than if I had rented the property to someone else. They can purchase badges from the Admin building as required of every renter and guest. This rule will not change. I do not feel sorry for my adult children, and they don't feel sorry for themselves. If they want to attend an event, they can purchase a day pass, as they have in the past.

Again, the biggest misconception is that you're "paying" for your badges with your annual assessment. This is not true, no matter how many landlords/renters argue the opposite. Annual assessments are specifically for covering the costs of Barefoot Bay Recreation District (BBRD) and are divided equally among lot owners. You owe the assessment regardless of whether you have a badge/pass, use it or not, or have lost your badge privileges due to other circumstances. You're not paying for your badges every year; you're paying taxes due on your property/properties. The two are not related.

BBRD must obey the rules since exceptions lead to lawsuits. The BOT must make those rules clear and unambiguous to avoid these problems in the future.

And the greatest of these is...

One of the most famous chapters of the Bible is found in Hallmark shops on anniversary cards. It is routinely read at weddings. We find done nicely in calligraphy. But it has a context. Its context has to do with Corinth and Corinthians.

The town of Corinth is in a modest canal zone—think Suez or Panama. Of course, that means ships, merchants, sailors, bars, and bordellos. The Apostle Paul established a church there. I think of it as a cowlick church. You put Christian instruction on it, but the old way keeps popping up. The old patterns of thinking and behaving don't necessarily change overnight because of deciding for Jesus Christ. The Corinthian letter is Paul giving them a bunch of correctives and teaching.

The basic problem among the Corinthians is that they are competitive and selfish regarding what it means to be spiritual. We all can get confused here. "Being spiritual-Oh, it's praying a lot." "Oh, it's working at the church a lot." "Oh, it's being really smart about the Bible." All those things are good, but they do not define spirituality in themselves.

To all of this, Paul says the inner mechanism of spirituality is love. Do miracles, read the Bible, go to church a lot... empty, and not at all spiritual unless Jesus-like love is in it.



Convergent procedure to treat AFib offered at Cleveland Clinic Indian River Hospital



Well over 2.5 million adults in the United States have atrial fibrillation (AFib), according to the American Heart Association. Although it is the most common type of heart arrythmia (irregular heartbeat) disorder, it can be dangerous. Left untreated, AFib can cause blood clots and stroke.

AFib patients who have not had success with medication or previous ablation treatments may consider a new approach called the Convergent procedure, which is offered at Cleveland Clinic Indian River Hospital.

"The Convergent procedure is safe and effective," says Brett Faulknier, DO, an electrophysiologist at Cleveland Clinic Indian River Hospital in Vero Beach. "And patients have reported feeling better both physically and emotionally after the treatment."

Convergent is a minimally invasive two-step treatment process. First, the patient undergoes ablation to the outside of the heart through two small incisions in the chest area. Ablation uses heat or extreme cold to destroy small areas of the heart tissue and create scarring that helps get a patient's heart back into normal rhythm. Most patients will need to stay overnight in the hospital for one night following this procedure and will be back to normal activity in about a week.

Two to six weeks later, a second ablation is done to the inside of the heart utilizing a minimally invasive approach via a catheter inserted through the groin. This procedure is performed by an electrophysiologist (a cardiologist who specializes in the heart's electrical system). About 80 percent of patients will be able to go home the same day of this procedure. Some patients may be required to stay overnight depending on their general state of health or other factors.

"The CONVERGE clinical trial revealed the success of this therapy compared to ablation alone for patients with long-standing persistent atrial fibrillation," says Dr. Faulknier.

At 18 months post procedure, the Convergent treatment was shown to be two times more effective at stopping AFib versus endocardial (inside the heart) ablation alone. And patients were two times more likely to no longer need AFib medication after Convergent treatment versus endocardial ablation alone.

"Our team at Cleveland Clinic Indian River Hospital is excited to offer this new approach to atrial fibrillation management for a select group of our atrial fibrillation patients," says Dr. Faulknier.
