First Things First

We talk a lot about our rights in America, like the Second Amendment. But let's talk about the First Amendment. Not in some law school abstract way, but as something that affects how we live, speak, and engage in our own community, especially when it comes to holding our government accountable.

Most folks know the First Amendment gives you the right to speak your mind (with very few exceptions). It's one of the cornerstone rights that keeps America free. What's often overlooked is that this protection also covers the right to publish, record, photograph, and report on matters of public interest. That includes me—whether I'm standing at a podium in Palm Bay or quietly filming Music Bingo in Building A

The Music Bingo Question

A few weeks ago, as part of a new video series showcasing life in our community, I attended one of Barefoot Bay's most popular weekly events: Music Bingo. I had my camera in hand, capturing some wide shots—community moments, nothing intrusive. I sat in the back of the room, planning to record the first round before heading out.

That's when a neighbor approached me. She said some people were uncomfortable being filmed and thought I should have asked for permission. I explained, politely, that I'm with The Tattler and BarefootBay.com—the press. Covering public events is part of my job because these are matters of public interest.

I also reminded her of three important points:

- 1. Music Bingo is a public event, organized by BBRD (a government entity) and held in Building A (a government building).
- 2. All common areas in Barefoot Bay—including the Lounge and the 19th Hole—are considered public.
- 3. There is no expectation of privacy in a public setting. This is the key point: If you're in a public space, anyone can legally take your photo or video and share it—in print, on social media, or on YouTube. That's the First Amendment at work.

Anyone Can Be the Press

That's one of the great things about America. The First Amendment doesn't just protect journalists at major networks—it protects all of us. You don't need a license or a press pass to publish. You have the right to share information on social media, your website, or in a community newspaper.

You also have the right to speak your mind, even if your opinion is unpopular or flat-out wrong. That's both the beauty and the burden of the First Amendment. Unless it's a direct threat, slander, libel, or an immediate danger like yelling "fire" in a crowded theater, it's protected speech.

That means we take the good with the bad. Flat-Earthers, conspiracy theorists, and keyboard warriors all enjoy the same protections. The moment we start deciding who gets to speak based on content, the First Amendment—and every freedom tied to it—starts to

On the Job, as the Press

I'm in the community with my camera a lot. I ask questions. I take pictures. I write stories That's my role as a reporter and publisher. My goal is never to make anyone uncomfortable— I aim to be respectful and reasonable. But I also take that responsibility seriously because an informed community is a stronger community.

A few weeks ago, I filmed the aftermath of the fire on Amaryllis Drive. As I approached, a deputy stopped me and asked if I lived there. I said no, but identified myself as press. He acknowledged my rights and let me through. That's how it should work.

Was that video essential? Maybe not to everyone. But it showed something real—something that mattered to us as a community. And the right to record it, respectfully and unobtrusively, was protected.

Speaking at City Hall

Recently, I spoke during public comments at two Palm Bay City Council meetings—both as a citizen and as the publisher of The Tattler. That's another First Amendment right: the right to petition your government.

Just before the public comment period began, Mayor Medina announced that this portion would not be livestreamed. Technically, that's not a direct violation—they didn't stop me from speaking. But they did stop others from hearing what I, and others, had to say. That didn't

Why should the public be kept from hearing their neighbors? What law supersedes freedom of speech and public expression? Thankfully, Brevard News recorded the full comments and posted them on Facebook. They exercised the same rights I'm talking about—and kept the public informed when the City wouldn't.

At the July 17 meeting, Mayor Medina and two Council members agreed to revisit the rule that blocks livestreaming of public comments. Two voted against it. That rule needs to go. Transparency matters, and it starts with a free press and a well-informed public.

The First Amendment in Action

There may come a time when the best way to be heard is to show up at council meetings, planning board hearings, or even in peaceful protest. That's also a constitutional right. If you do it, do it legally and respectfully: Stand on a public sidewalk, wear matching shirts, hold signs if you like—but don't trespass or block traffic.

Let me be clear: no one is calling for civil disobedience. Right now, we're asking questions. We're participating in democracy. That's exactly what the First Amendment was written for.

Your Rights, Your Voice

In closing, I ask one thing: Respect my role as press—to photograph, report, and share information that matters to our community, just as I respect and will defend your right to do the same. We won't always agree, but these rights belong to all of us, and they're worth protecting together.

The First Amendment is absolute, but it only works if we use it. Write letters. Send emails. Speak at meetings—or simply show up. Even a short message like "DO NOT WIDEN MICCO RD" carries weight when a hundred voices send it.

You've heard the phrase: If you don't exercise your rights, you risk losing them.

So, are you ready to use yours? Join me at the next Palm Bay City Council or Planning meeting. You don't even have to speak, your presence matters.

Fact-Finding on Ashton Park

Following last month's front-page story on the Ashton Park development, the civil engineer representing the project reached out to me to arrange a preliminary conversation. I have accepted the invitation and recommended a date and time, but as of this writing, the meeting has not been confirmed.

This is not a public meeting and will not be livestreamed. It's a private fact-finding session to gather details and better understand what is being proposed.

I want to be clear: I do not represent Barefoot Bay in any official capacity. I was invited as a journalist and community publisher. To ensure transparency, I invited a small group of community observers to join us, and the session will be recorded for dissemination. Their presence helps guarantee that a variety of resident concerns are noted for future discussion.

This session does not replace an official Barefoot Bay meeting, which must happen here in the community with residents present before any decisions are made that affect us all.

A full summary—and video—will appear in an upcoming issue of The Tattler and on BarefootBay.com. Transparency is the goal, and this is just the first step.

A Word From the

CVO

Did you know that the month of August originally had only 30 days? So when July was named after Julius Caesar, it had 31 days. Jealousy entered the picture, and August suddenly needed to have 31 days also! Family rivalry! The things you learn on the internet!!! I was browsing quotes for the month of August, and that historical piece of knowledge popped up. But I think the quote that I love the most is, "August is the Sunday of Summer". Doesn't that just say it all?

August represents hot, sizzling days for us here in Barefoot Bay, along with preparation for school days to begin. Those last few days, when families begin to panic that the freedom of summer is slipping away, and final vacations are crammed into those days. Plus, parents begin to organize their family's calendar around school events and sports that will be dominating their time for the next nine months. Since I no longer have to worry about those cares, I can look back longingly and smile about those memories that caused me such panic long ago! So Barefoot Bay cut those kids some slack as they splash and play in these final days of summer vacation. And on that subject, a quick update that Kid's Swim on Saturday evenings has now been changed to 4 p.m. until 8 p.m. at Pool 2. Enjoy kids!

Recently, Barefoot Bay scheduled a Town Hall meeting on Saturday, July 12th from 10 a.m. - 1 p.m. Town Hall meetings are held quarterly, with some in the evening, some in the middle of the day, some in the summer, fall, winter, or spring. Not all dates are going to appeal or work for everyone, but an effort is made to accommodate. They ARE all recorded and can be found on bbrd.org. The most recent meeting was very interesting as the concern for Barefoot Bay's future, security, and utilities came from the residents who attended. Concern for the future of Barefoot Bay regarding the construction of several new home developments, which claim that the St. John's Parkway will dump traffic onto Micco Road. Along with this concern comes the worry that Micco Road will need to be widened. This would affect Barefoot Bay directly, also.

About a month or two ago, I attended the Space Coast Transportation Organization's meeting. The SCTPO was created under Florida law to oversee transportation planning in Brevard County and to manage the allocation of federal and state transportation funds. It works within federal and state quidelines, but it is not a federal agency. This organization reported at this meeting that there is no 2025 project funding for St. John's Heritage Parkway to extend to Micco Road. They also included a list of long-range transportation planning projects over the next 6-10 years, and another for 11-25 years of planning. St. John's Heritage Parkway is not in those plans to extend to Micco Road. This organization helps to guide our Brevard County Commissioners. So the question left for us here in Barefoot Bay is why the developer, Dix Development, shows that road meandering through its development and then dumps out on Micco Road. We need to determine who provided Dix Development with this plan. Has this plan been approved by someone at the city level of Palm Bay, or the County level with our Brevard County Commissioners? I would urge ALL RESIDENTS to contact our Commissioner, Kim Adkinson, by email at KimAdkinson@Brevardfl.gov and ask for her assistance in providing correct information to the citizens of Barefoot Bay. Questions that include: What are the real plans for St. John's Heritage Parkway and the Dix Development? Is the widening of Micco Road in the planning? Will Barefoot Bay be part of the future planning as we stand to be harmed or changed in many ways, including traffic, irrigation, and even sound safety?

One of our more immediate needs that Commissioner Adkinson also could assist in is the demand for flashing warning lights that could be placed on Micco Road at golf cart crossings. Barefoot Bay is a Special Recreational District, which lends itself to the title of a golf cart community. Since Barefoot Bay is sliced down the middle with Micco Road, we need some warning lights for transportation to slow down and yield to golf carts. Again, Commissioner Adkinson's office may direct you elsewhere, but we also need her to strongly back this move. So we need to ask her to move on this request as a priority. Again, her email address is KimAdkinson@Brevardfl.gov.

I was reminded recently, while attending the Florida Special District Association conference, that we need to remember that we here in Barefoot Bay are a Special Recreational District. With the added housing being built around us, Barefoot Bay needs to remember that we all moved here because Barefoot Bay was different than other manufactured developments or even other brick-built subdivisions. We enjoy so many activities on any given day of the week, month, or year that other communities cannot and don't provide. It will always be your choice as to whether to participate, but we can't complain that there is nothing to do! This has always been evident when we made the decision to move here....Barefoot Bay provides a lifestyle that, for most of us, is a permanent vacation! So the title of Special Recreation District is not just simple words, but it explains why we chose Barefoot Bay as our home. Let's continue to support her with not just your dollars, but your attendance at events, and by taking time to contact your Board of Trustees and also beyond to your local government and write your Commissioner to keep the Bay working at a level that we can compete with the new housing developments crowding around us. Barefoot Bay holds an enviable place in Brevard, and we need to help keep it "Special".

The FY26 Budget and Preliminary Assessment were adopted.

Three DOR violations were referred to our attorney for resolution.

7/10/2025 Meeting Highlights:

An Event that is approved by the administration to be held under the "Oaks" will be considered "Open to the Public" with no further action needed by the board.

Mr. Olsen, our attorney, updated us on current DOR violations that were referred to him. Please mail or drop off your DOR Ballots as soon as possible. The deadline for the Administration to receive the DOR ballots is August 4th. The ballot count will take place on Tuesday, August 5th, in Building D/E.

Make sure you sign the back of the envelope.

I am including the following from last month's message, because the election qualifying time is coming up.

There is a Board of Trustees election every November.

Starting with the 2025 November election, all newly elected terms will be for 3 years.

The duration of the term for this year's election is for calendar years 2026, 2027, and 2028.

One position will be available. Jeff Grunow holds that position now and is eligible to run. The next election will be in November 2026 for calendar years 2027, 2028, and 2029. Two Positions will be available. Bruce Amoss will be "termed out" and is ineligible to run. Elaine Van Berschot is eligible to run.

Next will be November 2027 for calendar years 2028, 2029, and 2030. Two Positions will be available. Joe Kloskey will be "termed out" and is ineligible to run. Ed Haslem is eligible to run.

Candidate qualifying for the 2025 election cycle will take place in the Viera and Titusville administrative offices between noon, August 25, 2025, and noon, August 29, 2025.

(Pre-qualifying papers will be accepted beginning August 11, 2025. F.S. 99.061(8) states that qualifying papers may be submitted to the qualifying officer beginning 14 days prior to the qualifying period.)

Remote Patient Monitoring (Telehealth)

Approximately 129 million Americans suffer from one or more chronic illnesses, such as congestive heart failure, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, hypertension, and diabetes, according to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC). Such conditions account for more than seventy-five percent of annual healthcare costs nationally. By using telehealth, healthcare providers can more effectively manage patient health, preventing complications that may lead to re-hospitalizations and emergency room visits.

Q. I've heard a lot about "telehealth," but I don't really understand what it is. Could you please explain it?

A. Telehealth, AKA Remote Patient Monitoring, involves the use of a telephone line to securely transmit medical information from a patient's home to a telehealth nurse. A device called a telemonitor is used to collect and send this data. The telemonitor is a discreet inhome device that allows patients to monitor their own daily vital signs, such as blood pressure, pulse, oxygen, glucose, and weight, as specified by their physician. Patients also answer a series of evaluative questions based on their specific illnesses. The data is transmitted to a nurse for review, who may take appropriate actions based on the data. The data may also be shared with the patient's home health nurse and physician.

Q. I'm a home health nurse and a little concerned about telehealth; will it replace my job? A. No. Telehealth will not take your job; many patients still need in-home nursing visits. But telehealth will help decrease the frequency of unnecessary visits, while maximizing the effectiveness of time spent by a nurse or therapist in a patient's home.

Q. My dad is getting a telehealth machine. How exactly does it work?

A. A compact monitoring device is set up in the patient's home and connected using Wi-Fi or via a telephone line through a split jack, meaning normal telephone operation is not interrupted. Other devices, such as a blood pressure cuff or scale, are plugged into the monitor. Patients complete their daily exam, and the monitor automatically sends all recorded data to the patient's telehealth nurse. If any readings are outside of the range prescribed by the patient's physician, the telehealth nurse will intervene immediately.

Q. Is the telehealth monitor difficult to operate?

A. No. The telemonitoring device is very simple to use. In most cases, patients use the device for one health evaluation daily, and it typically takes less than ten minutes to complete. The monitor walks the patient through the process of the daily exam step-by-step. As soon as a device is turned on, it will begin asking health-related questions and guide the patient through the process of measuring their weight, taking their blood pressure, etc.

Q. My doctor suggested I get telehealth, but I'm on the fence. What are the benefits of it? A. In-home telemonitoring provides patients, caregivers, and physicians with these benefits:

- Ability for the patient to monitor their vital data daily without leaving the comfort of their
 - Empowers the patient by keeping them actively involved in their own health care
 - Improved self-management skills for patients living with chronic illnesses • Improved quality of life due to reduced hospital and emergency visits
 - Increased independence and self-esteem
 - Increased satisfaction and compliance with healthcare regimens
 - More efficient communication with physicians and nurses





I'm not saying to ban these people from having fun, but maybe the Bay can designate a safe area where everyone can bring their fireworks and shoot them off.

It would be like having a second show. I know people are just having fun, but the fear of losing a home because of this is quite concerning. If anyone has witnessed how fast these houses could burn, maybe they would be more careful. I know many complaints will follow what I have said, but this year, 5 different houses in my section were shooting them off. Losing a home due to somebody's lack of safety would be tragic. Designating a safe spot for families to shoot off their fireworks would calm the nerves of many people and dogs in the Bay. Thank you.

<Editor: With the recent house fire in our community, it's understandable that fireworks have become a heightened concern, especially those that can leave the ground or spark in unpredictable directions.

In 2020, Florida revised its fireworks statute to permit the use of consumer fireworks without a permit on just three designated holidays: New Year's Eve, New Year's Day, and Independence Day. On all other days of the year, fireworks such as Roman candles, bottle rockets, and aerial shells remain illegal for general use.

While we allow fireworks on these three holidays as part of longstanding national traditions, it's worth acknowledging that these celebrations come with risks, particularly in densely packed communities like Barefoot Bay, where many homes are older and more vulnerable to fire.

Being "allowed" to use fireworks does not remove our personal responsibility to use them safely, lawfully, and with consideration for our neighbors. And it certainly doesn't give anyone permission to light them off outside of those three days. Doing so isn't just inconsiderate—it's illegal.

For those worried about future fires, the solution starts with awareness, education, and, if necessary, reporting violations. We don't need to ban fireworks altogether—but we do need to use them wisely.>




Jean-Paul Pelletier, 83, passed peacefully surrounded by his family on the morning of June 17th at his home in Barefoot Bay, FL.
