

Fees Go Up Across The Board

The new budget for Barefoot Bay Recreation District (BBRD) has been approved for 2023-24. The budget included an increase in the fees that cover incidental costs charged to visitors, renters, and those interested in renting BBRD facilities. These fees will increase as of July 1, 2023. Our annual assessment will be due October 1, 2023.

It's been over a decade since the BBRD has adjusted these "small" fees and some of the increases are significant. These incidental fees include the cost to replace a pier/beach key, a lost member's badge, pool passes, storage lot rentals, etc. Long term renters saw their annual cost for an annual badge rise from \$100 to \$467.03 annually, which is in line with what homeowners pay for the same access with our annual assessments. This may come as a shock for renters and homeowners that covered the membership cost for long term renters as part of their lease. Many homeowners had argued those fees were too low considering they provided the same access to our facilities for 20% of the annual assessment the rest of us pay. Whether they're too high now, considering the homeowner still pays their assessment on that rented property every year, is up for debate, but will need to wait until next year.

The Board of Trustees, in coordination with BBRD, hosted several workshops and meetings regarding the current budget over the past several months. These fees, along with our annual assessment, were discussed during those meetings and are a large part of the overall

revenue that is collected yearly and offsets the costs of maintaining Barefoot Bay. The fee increases were approved unanimously by the Trustees at the board meeting in early June where they were discussed and made available to the public.

The increases in some of these small fees has riled some in the community, which is unfortunate, since very few residents attended those publicly accessible budget workshops or participated in the process of developing our budget for the coming year. Most of these fees will rarely affect homeowners, who already have badges, keys, etc., but the resident guest pass fee was also raised from \$5/week to \$25/week. A significant increase, but again only affects short term visitors and \$25 seems reasonable for a week using Barefoot Bay's amenities. The grandchild's pool pass, \$20 for a three month photo badge, is still a very good value.

Our annual assessment also increased for the coming year (\$934.05) in line with Commissioner John Tobia's requirement that the District raise the annual assessment no more than the adjustment to the country's Consumer Price Index (CPI). This requirement allows for smaller increases and compels the BOT to make those adjustments every year, since they can no longer play "catch-up" in future years. These large "catch-up" increases of our annual assessments, often the result of political pledges to not raise taxes and/or inaction by previous BOTs, were necessary when revenue no longer met budget requirements. The smaller annual CPI increases make sense when you look at the large increases in the small fees this year.


The Board of Trustees should consider increases in the incidental fees each year, as needed. Those who are frustrated with the current increases are welcome to contact BBRD and the Trustees but, though any fee can be reduced, a loss of revenue must be balanced by cuts to our budget.

(Note: In addition to the inflationary increase in general costs and materials, the mandate to increase the minimum wage in Florida (passed in 2020) has severely harmed the BBRD labor budget which has a large number of part-time minimum wage employees. Their wages will increase every year until 2026 when the minimum wage will be \$15/hr. Full-time employees, who previously made more than the minimum wage, will expect a similar increase in pay. The annual assessment can only be raised by the CPI, regardless of the minimum wage mandate. The small fees and other increases in prices help to offset these labor costs. There are no easy answers, but any loss of employees or degradation of services is to the detriment of Barefoot Bay.)

Junior Golf Program Returns

That can't be said in July as the 2023 Summer Golf Camp program kicks off another year hosted by Ernie Cruz, a certified PGA Professional, Bill Balish, also a PGA pro, and a bevy of volunteers from the Barefoot Bay golf community. This free program consists of several weeks of instruction and lots of time on the golf course practicing the skills, rules and etiquette of the game learned during the week. Children do not need to own their own golf clubs or golf shoes (tennis shoes work). Clubs will be provided for those who do not have them. In most instances, these are donated clubs, custom cut and regripped for each child by the staff at the Barefoot Bay Golf Course. The camp will be three days a week (Mon, Wed, Fri) between 10 a.m. and 12 p.m., from July 10 to July 27. Your Guide To Healthy Summer Living

"Summer Means Happy Times and Good Sunshine" -Brian Wilson (The Beach Boys)

Summer has a way of bringing out the child in all of us. Even if you don't have two months off to swim and surf, there's just something special in the air. But summer can also be challenging for some, including the elderly or people with chronic health conditions, because the soaring temperatures can exacerbate symptoms. But whether you're 17 or 70, below are answers to your questions on how best to make your summer a healthy – and happy – one.

Q: We like to have parties outside in the summer, but how long is it safe to keep perishable food outdoors?

A: Don't leave perishable food out in the sun or in the heat for more than two hours. Another tip: be sure to pack your food in an insulated cooler with ice packs.

Q: I always hear that the best in-season fruit is available in the summer. Do you know what types of fruit this is referring to?

A: It's true, the summer is full of in-season delectable, juicy fruit! What's more, summer fruits (and vegetables) are not only delicious, but they're also full of vitamins, minerals, and antioxidants that your body needs and that are critical for maintaining good health. They also provide energy and help you stay hydrated.

Here's a list of some of the top in-season summer fruit contenders: watermelon, berries, cantaloupe, honeydew melon, pears, peaches, mangoes, plums, nectarines, grapes, bananas, apricots, lemons, limes, yellow squash, zucchini, tomatoes and avocados (yes, technically yellow squash, zucchini, tomatoes and avocados are fruits).

And some great summer vegetables include corn, cucumbers, eggplant, beets, bell peppers, carrots, celery, okra and green beans.

Q: I want to get in shape this summer and plan to jog around my neighborhood a lot. What else can I do to augment my goal to get in shape?

A: The number one thing you can do to compliment your exercise regime is to maintain a healthy diet. A great rule of thumb is to add plenty of in-season vegetables and keep your protein sources lean. If you eat meat, avoid fatty cuts, and avoid fried foods like fried chicken. Fruit is a healthy dessert, but just don't overdo it because all fruits have natural sugar, some more than others – so do your due diligence. And remember to carve out some down-time, because you're much more likely to adhere to your daily regime – exercise and food-wise – if you take time out to have some fun in the sun!

Another very important thing to keep in mind is to remember to stay hydrated, particularly since you'll be jogging outside. Because of increased sweating during hot summer days, it's easy to become dehydrated without even realizing it, which can be potentially dangerous. And please keep in mind that while extreme heat can be dangerous for everyone, it's particularly dangerous for the elderly and those with chronic medical conditions. If you fall into this category, you should consult your physician to create a safe exercise regime.

Q: My husband gardens a lot in the summer; between that and him going to the beach, I worry about skin cancer. How often does he need to reapply sun lotion and what SPF should it be?

A: According to the American Academy of Dermatology (AAD), a good rule of thumb is to reapply every two hours. But if he takes a dip in the water, he should reapply every time he gets out, even if it's been less than two hours. Regarding SPF, the AAD recommends 30 or higher. And be sure that it is water-resistant and offers broad-spectrum protection, in other words, protects against UVA and UVB rays (UVA rays can cause wrinkles and age spots and can pass through window glass, and UVB rays are the main cause of sunburn, but are blocked by window glass. They both can cause skin cancer.)

Q: My daughter wants to go to a tanning salon before going to the beach this summer so she "looks good." Before I okay it, I want to be sure it's safe. Is it?

A: No. The United States Department of Health and Human Services and the World Health Organization's International Agency of Research on Cancer have declared UV radiation from artificial sources, like tanning beds and sun lamps, may cause cancer. And bottom line, according to the AAD, there is no safe way to tan. In fact, every time you lie out in the sun, you're damaging your skin, and this damage speeds up the aging of your skin (yikes!) and increases your risk for all types of skin cancer. 'Enough said!



Homelessness and Affordable Housing

I have been writing about homelessness and affordable housing for several years, but it does not seem to matter to those in Brevard County powerful enough to make something positive happen.

It reminds me of the current Naval and Congressional leadership that is eroding our country's naval power. When I came into the Navy-some years ago-we had over 2,000 ships. Today we have 270 operational ships. This is second to China who has close to 300 ships and a building capacity that outperforms ours. We have let ourselves become weaker as a seafaring nation, just as England did, and look what happened to her vast Empire.

I have talked about a one percent sales tax to fund affordable housing. Just as we have let our sea power decline, we are falling behind in the fight against homelessness. Miami-Dade County has put in place a one percent food and nutrition tax to help reduce homelessness, the first such tax in our country according to my information.

We need two plans actually: one for homelessness and one for affordable housing. Homelessness is a complex problem. Affordable housing encompasses lower budget rentals as well as government subsidized housing, which is under the purview of the Brevard County Housing and Human Services department.

This failure to address a significant issue is magnified by a growing number of seniors who need subsidized housing, which has a wait list of up to three years, if it is available at all. Continued inattention to this matter will only make it more difficult to resolve. We must urge our elected officials to do a better job of planning for the future.

Please consider supporting "The Right to Clean and Healthy Waters" Constitutional Amendment to the Florida Constitution. Clean and healthy water is an issue where the needs of the environment and the economy coincide.

Florida tourism is worth \$122.9 Billion annually. Close to home, Indian River Lagoon covers 40% (156 miles) of Florida's East Coast. Due to local geology, the 300,000 permitted septic waste systems next to our Lagoon may not perform optimally. This adds to Nitrogen and bacterial pollution which periodically cause fish kills. Nutrient pollutants in wastewater and stormwater heighten algae blooms which block sunlight from seagrass: Up to 75% of our seagrass acreage has disappeared since 2011.

A total of 900,000 verified petitions statewide are required by November 30th, 2023, to gualify the proposed amendment for the 2024 ballot. In Brevard County, the target is 29,050 signed and verified petitions (www.FloridaRightToCleanWater.org). Simply stated this amendment creates a fundamental right to clean and healthy waters. It allows civil suits against State executive agencies for harm or threatened harm to Florida's waters due to agency actions or inactions.

• Some of the environmental impacts our state has suffered are:

• No state has more polluted lake water than does Florida or has lost more wetland acreage.

• 80% of Florida's 1,000 springs are impaired due to excessive Nitrogen, impacting our health.

• Nearly 1 million acres of coastal estuaries and 9,000 miles of rivers and streams have been impaired by fecal bacteria.

• Since 1994, red tide events have occurred in 58% of these months. Red tide and bluegreen algal blooms harm marine life, birds and turtles. Contaminated water/seafood may contain neurotoxins harmful to humans and pets. Local economies related to fishing, marine recreation and tourism suffer greatly during such outbreaks.

• 800 manatees starved to death in 2022 because pollution depleted their seagrass food source.

• Land-based pollution affects the survival of coral reefs and their dependent marine life in Southeast Florida.

Her work consisted of helping the elderly in Barefoot Bay. Loved by family and friends in Sebastian, Barefoot Bay, and Fort Lauderdale.






