

At Palm Bay's Mercy

A fire on Amaryllis Drive reminds us how fast things can change. One faulty battery, one old charger, and within minutes, someone's home is gone. We're lucky it wasn't worse. But it's a reminder that the biggest problems often start small and quietly — until they're suddenly at your door.

That's exactly what's happening just west of Barefoot Bay.

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Palm Bay is expanding fast. Several major developments are in motion that will transform the land around us, the roads we drive on, and the services we rely on. And while we'll bear the consequences, we're not being included in the conversation.

The largest of these is Ashton Park — a 1,568-acre master-planned community that could bring more than 5,813 homes and thousands of new residents to our border. The project includes apartments, townhomes, single-family homes, a commercial downtown district, and public trails. It also extends the St Johns Heritage Parkway (SJHP), which is slated to end at Micco Rd, less than 2,000 feet west of where Barefoot Bay begins at Dottie Dr.

There's no mystery about what that means. Thousands of east-bound cars will pour directly onto Micco Rd every single day towards Barefoot Bay. Traffic engineers have already said the road will need to be widened to four lanes. That's not speculation — it's a requirement in the developer's transportation impact study.

We know what that looks like. Some of us live just feet from Micco Rd. Others cross it every day in golf carts. We've seen cars lose control. We've seen homes hit. A neighbor's friend was struck by a commercial van earlier this month while crossing with his cart. He's lucky to be alive.

To the north of Micco Rd, and south of the I-95 interchange, the Lotis Palm Bay development is also underway — another planned community with more than 1,372 homes, commercial space, and road connections that will eventually tie into Ashton Park and, through SJHP, to Micco Rd.

But Ashton Park and Lotis Palm Bay are not the only projects coming. SunTerra Lakes, a 1,000-acre community, is supposed to break ground this year. This new development abuts Deer Run to the south, cornering on Micco Rd and Babcock Rd. Just another 2,700-home community to our west. Holiday Builders has a small 270-home development in the early stages just across from the Lakes at St Sebastian, another Holiday Builders community. That project is even closer to Barefoot Bay — and could start construction as soon as 2027.

These four projects together, with more to come, form a continuous corridor of growth, and the eastern terminus of that corridor is the final two-mile stretch of Micco Road that divides our community. The next nearest east-west corridors are Grant Rd (3 miles north) and Valkaria Rd (6 miles north).

Holiday Builders has been told up to 200 homes could tie into our aging water treatment plant until Palm Bay and Brevard County complete the new regional plant planned west of Dottie Dr. The pressure to fast-track that plant is now growing — and it's part of the reason we've been forced to accelerate payments to retire the Barefoot Bay water treatment plant. Barefoot Bay residents pay the highest water bills in Brevard County, with annual 13% increases through 2029. Who will be paying for the new \$52 million facility needed by Palm Bay? I've been told that newly built homes will pay to hook up to the system and that the new treatment facility cost will be shared by the entire county. We will see our water bills reduced, eventually.

At the recent Space Coast TPO Open House, I spoke publicly to those attending and then had a chance meeting with Palm Bay City Planner Debbie Flynn after the presentations. She was professional and sincerely concerned. She admitted she didn't know much about Barefoot Bay — how Micco Rd splits our community, how close some homes sit to the street, how much we rely on golf carts to get around.

We viewed a map of Barefoot Bay on her phone. I suggested, instead of curling north and burying Micco Rd (and possibly some of our residents), take SJHP south of Barefoot Bay, south of the solar farm, straight to US-1. I could sense the quandary. Going straight to US-1 would make sense from a traffic perspective — and the human one — but there's a lot of land there that's not in Palm Bay. Is the County to pay for it? The developer? The SCTPO's list of federally funded projects scheduled over the next 25 years did not include any projects in our area. The closest project was the widening of Babcock from Malabar Rd south to SJHP. That project is currently projected, but unfunded. This list of projects constantly changes, but Brevard County apparently has no other road projects scheduled for southern Brevard

City Planner Flynn suggested a public meeting with the developer in Barefoot Bay. She said she'd reached out, but nothing's scheduled as yet. It's important to point out that there have been meetings already. Lots of them — Palm Bay and Brevard County, Palm Bay and the developers. There's an inter-local agreement between Palm Bay and Brevard County for the new water treatment facility. Lots of meetings, but for some of you, this may be the first you've heard about any of these projects.

That's disappointing, and part of the larger problem, no one has talked to Barefoot Bay residents regarding these projects, though they will seriously affect our safety and lifestyle. Unfortunately, they don't have to talk to us, and though these meetings are public, we don't receive mandatory notices unless we're within 500 feet of any construction. A few Barefoot Bay homes backing Dottie Dr received mandatory notices in March for the Holiday Builders community just across the canal. Only one side of the street was within the 500 ft limit.

The County is ambivalent at best to the needs of Barefoot Bay. Our Commissioner has her priorities, and I've been assured she'll be an ally. It's always easier (and cheaper) to widen Micco Road, but that seems short-sighted considering the amount of flow-through traffic from SJHP, the interchange, and more than 10,000 new homes currently planned. Though our Special District and BOT, concerned as any homeowner about traffic congestion and safety, will stand with us, they aren't truly empowered to fight these battles.

So here we are — watching the storm build, with no formal seat at the table. But that doesn't mean we're powerless. There are hundreds of Barefoot Bay retirees, veterans, and grandmas in golf carts, with plenty of time, ready and willing to write letters, postcards, and emails. We can make phone calls and show up to Planning, Zoning, City Council, and Commissioner meetings. Most of us are used to turning the sound up at our age. This is one

We need a meeting here in Barefoot Bay. We need to see how they intend to route traffic. A new road between Micco Rd and Grant Rd west of Barefoot Bay would feed traffic north, away from Barefoot Bay. Feeder roads connecting SJHP to Valkaria Rd, Grant Rd, and/or Berry St would provide alternatives to Micco Rd when travelling east towards US-1.

We have a direct decision to be made regarding our DOR ballot. Most of the ballot just corrects the wording of the DOR, fine-tuning, if you will. The underlined wording replaces the crossed-out verbiage, generally trying to make the wording more precise. But because of something, even just "wording", we, the owners, must approve that change, as small as it is. The big change is Question #1. The effect of a yes vote for Question #1 is that we use the wording for the minimum size of homes allowed in Barefoot Bay. Previously, the DOR required a minimum width of 20 feet and a minimum length of 34 feet. This ballot is changing that requirement to the Brevard County limitations of no less than 600 square feet. So the question is left to be answered by all the owners, not the BOT. You have a part to play in the governing of our place we call home. Please take the time to think it through and hear all sides of the issue, and then VOTE! We are Barefoot Bay Strong... let's hear your voices.

In closing, let me remind you that the CVO office will be closed for the summer, effective July 3rd until September 3rd. Enjoy your summer and your friends and family!

5/27/2025 Meeting Highlights:

Ms. Van Berschot was appointed to the RFP committee for the Lounge Cooler Replacement project.

Proposed Public Club Events consent items were approved.

Tracy Overton was appointed to the Violations Committee as an alternate member.

Implementing a Convenience Fee for the use of Credit/Debit Cards at District Facilities, and a minimum charge of \$10.00, was approved. This will help reimburse the over \$59,000 charged to the District by the Credit Card clearing house each year when customers use credit cards at the point of sale.

This will go into effect on August 1st. As of this writing, a "debit card" can only be used as a "credit card". Staff is looking into ways a "debit card" can be accepted as a "debit card" in the future.

Tom O'Donnell was reappointed to the ARCC as an alternate member.

The Toro National Support Network (NSN) Service Agreement was renewed for 3 years for the golf course irrigation controller.

The BOT approved the Proposed Budget Mailout and announced June 24, 2025, at 1 pm in Building D/E, as the date, time, and location of the public hearing for the adoption of the annual assessment in addition to the adoption of the FY26 Budget.

Help heal our Lagoon in 2025 - Why care about our Lagoon? Because it's our paradise and a major part of our economy. Our piece of paradise offers us beauty, diversity, and recreational opportunities. A visit to the Lagoon often offers postcard scenes of the sun over the water, boating, fishing, and a diverse environment with animals, fish, birds, and plants. We are blessed with this natural wonder and want to heal it both for today and for our children tomorrow.

Our Lagoon is a major driver of Brevard's economy. It helps bring us millions of visitors annually, supports more than 40,000 of our local jobs, and adds millions to our property values. Restoring and maintaining a healthy Lagoon is key to a strong economy for us all

Help Heal our Lagoon in 2025 - What you can do

- Everyone Recycle and keep the Lagoon free of trash
- Use reusable bags at the grocery store or paper ones
- Use as little plastic as possible
- Plant native plants that don't need water or fertilizer
- Minimize pesticide use and dispose of toxic chemicals correctly
- Stop septic leaks: Inspect your drain field as well as your septic tank
- Wash your car at a carwash keeps soap and chemicals out of the Lagoon
- ullet Follow the Brevard County Ordinance banning the application of fertilizer from June 11th to September 30th

After a very dry start to 2025, the summer season is just the opposite. According to St. John's Water Management, Brevard County receives 80 percent of its rainfall during the summer months. If you've been here for a while, you know this translates into torrents of water from the sky washing across our yards, sweeping everything loose into the streets, storm sewers, and out into the Lagoon and its tributaries. So, any fertilizer on the lawn doesn't have a chance to help the plants; instead, it is swept along by the rain right into the Lagoon. Thousands of pounds of pollutants enter the Lagoon watershed from excess fertilizer application, causing algal blooms that kill seagrasses and other marine life.

That's why Brevard County has an ordinance banning the application of fertilizer on residential properties from June 1st to September 30th.

For properties abutting our many surface water bodies, including the Lagoon, the fertilizer ordinance also prohibits application of fertilizer in a 10 ft. to 25 ft "fertilizer free" zone along the shoreline. The buffer differs based on your location in relation to the lagoon. This restriction applies year-round, not just in the summer.

If you fertilize your own yard, please follow these rules. If your yard is fertilized by a residential landscape company, make sure they are licensed in Brevard County, which requires them to be trained on chemical applications to lawns and landscapes.

Small actions at home make a big difference for our lagoon's health. Let's work together to keep the Indian River Lagoon clean, vibrant, and full of life.


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Hi teens! I hope you're having a fantastic summer!

Learning To Live Optimally With Alzheimer's

Nearly all of us have been touched by Alzheimer's in one way or another. Maybe it's a grandparent, a parent, or a spouse. Maybe it's a neighbor. Maybe it's you. Whomever it is, the reality of a brain in slow demise can be very scary. That's why educating yourself about the disease can be helpful, particularly since there are ways to potentially slow it

Q: My mom was recently diagnosed with Alzheimer's. I know it's about memory loss, but is there anything else to it?

A: Alzheimer's is an incurable brain disease that causes memory loss and a decline in thinking skills. It's a progressive, terminal neurogenerative disorder that destroys brain cells, actually shrinking the brain, and it slowly worsens over time, with some people's health deteriorating faster than others.

Q: My wife has Alzheimer's. I understand

A: It really depends on the individual. According to the Mayo Clinic, people with Alzheimer's live approximately between three and 11 years post-diagnosis, with some living 20 years or more. And Alzheimer's is the sixth leading cause of death in the U.S., according to the Alzheimer's Association.

Q: Are Alzheimer's and dementia the

A: Alzheimer's is often used interchangeably with dementia, but Alzheimer's is actually just one type of dementia. Dementia is a blanket term used to describe a number of different neurological conditions affecting the brain that worsen over time; Alzheimer's is the most common type of dementia.

Q: I've recently been diagnosed with Alzheimer's, but my doctor didn't give me much information; he just said I'm in my "early stages." How many "stages" are there? Can you tell me a little bit about each stage?

A: There are three main phases of Alzheimer's, according to the Alzheimer's Association. It begins with mild symptoms, typically memory problems (some experts divide this into two mild phases, with a total of four - and sometimes more - phases). In phase two, symptoms, such as memory problems, become more pronounced. A patient may also experience severely impaired reasoning and a loss of language. By phase three, the final stage of Alzheimer's, patients can no longer recognize loved ones and are unable to care for themselves. In layman's terms, the brain is no longer communicating to the body how to do even the most basic things like swallowing, which makes eating and drinking a never-ending challenge and can lead to dehydration and malnutrition. Difficulty swallowing can also cause accidental inhalation of food, liquids, or other particles into the lungs instead of the esophagus, which can cause aspiration pneumonia, the most common cause of death among Alzheimer's patients.

Q: Are there any warning signs that you might have Alzheimer's?

A: According to the Alzheimer's Association, there are ten warning signs for Alzheimer's. They are:

1) Memory loss that disrupts daily life. This isn't simply forgetting appointments once in a while, which might be typical of someone who is ageing; we're talking about forgetting recently learned information often. This is particularly characteristic of Alzheimer's in the early stages - and is the number one indicator of Alzheimer's or another form of dementia.

2) Challenges in planning or solving information. Someone with Alzheimer's or another form of dementia might start having problems making plans or working with numbers. They might find it difficult to follow a recipe or manage household bills.

3) Difficulty completing familiar tasks. 4) Confusion with time or place. People

with Alzheimer's might become confused about what day, month, or season it is. Sometimes they get confused about where they are.

5) Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships. Some people with Alzheimer's begin experiencing issues with their vision (not due to cataracts). This sometimes impacts their balance or ability to read. They may also have problems judging

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distances, which can negatively impact their ability to drive.

- 6) New problems speaking or writing certain words. People with Alzheimer's might have trouble following or joining a conversation. They might lose their train of thought, causing them to suddenly stop in the middle of a conversation. They might have trouble remembering the names of familiar objects such as "table" and "tree."
- 7) Misplace things and lose the ability to retrace steps.
- 8) Experience decreased or poor judgment. People with Alzheimer's may begin to show changes in decision-making. For example, they might make poor/odd decisions regarding money and might begin to neglect personal hygiene, unaware that they need to regularly bathe.
- 9) Withdraw from work or social activities. A person with Alzheimer's might find it challenging to follow conversations, and because of this, withdraw from social settings.
- 10) Experience changes in mood and personality. This can take many forms: the person might become more irritable, depressed, or easily anxious or fearful.

If you or a loved one is experiencing many of the above, it might be time to visit a doctor to get properly diagnosed. Doctors can use a variety of methods to see if a patient has Alzheimer's or another form of dementia (or something else entirely).

Q: Is there anything you can do if you're diagnosed with Alzheimer's?

A: Yes, and the earlier you get diagnosed, the better. There are medications you can take, and there are lifestyle changes you can make. Check with your doctor about which medications might be right for you. And in terms of lifestyle changes, below are some steps you can take starting right now that


may slow down symptoms and improve your quality of life:

- 1) Challenge your mind. Do crossword puzzles or learn a new skill. Think of it as a workout for your brain it may help slow the cognitive decline caused by Alzheimer's.
- 2) Challenge your body. Just as it's important to work out your brain, it's important to work out your body. Raising your heart rate and increasing blood flow to the body and brain may help improve cognitive functioning.
- *3) Quit smoking!* Giving up the butts may lower the risk of cognitive decline to levels to those who don't smoke.
- 4) Maintain healthy blood pressure. According to NYU Langone Health NewsHub, "high blood pressure damages blood vessels and causes blockages that reduce blood flow to the brain. It reduces the blood's ability to clear harmful waste products and breaks down connectivity between areas of the brain." Talk to your doctor about how you can lower your blood pressure.
- 5) Eat healthy. Some studies have shown that healthy eating habits may help reduce your risk of cognitive decline. A healthy diet includes lots of vegetables, leaner meats, and unprocessed foods. This is also known as a "Mediterranean diet," which is a diet high in anti-inflammatory foods, including healthy fats and antioxidants.
- 6) Manage your diabetes. While the exact connection between Alzheimer's and type 2 diabetes is still in debate, according to the NIH, studies do suggest that "poorly controlled blood sugar may increase the risk of developing Alzheimer's. This relationship is so strong that some have called Alzheimer's 'diabetes of the brain' or 'type 3 diabetes.'"
- 7) Maintain a healthy weight. According to many experts, including the Alzheimer's Society, "people who maintain

a healthy weight are more resilient to the changes in the brain that are caused by Alzheimer's disease."

8) Sleep Well: We all know how good we feel after a full night's sleep, but did you know it's the equivalent of 'food' for the brain? Your brain needs its rest and will only function optimally when it gets enough of it.

9) Manage your stress. Stress negatively impacts a person's overall health, and this is true for someone with Alzheimer's. Increased stress may exacerbate symptoms of Alzheimer's, so do whatever it is that helps you prevent stress or at least minimize it. For some, that's meditating, for others, that's going fishing, and many things in between.

Being diagnosed with Alzheimer's can be upsetting and overwhelming. Remember, you're not alone. There are plenty of resources available to help you navigate this disease - just make sure you find the right ones (there's a lot of not-so-accurate information on the internet). To help you on your jour-

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

We need to know how Brevard County will protect golf cart crossings and manage runoff and drainage, who will pay for noise and accident mitigation when Micco Rd is widened, and whether Barefoot Bay residents will be given any input before the bulldozers arrive.

City Planner Flynn mentioned a mixed-use path for pedestrians, bicycles, and possibly golf carts. That's promising — but we need assurances that Barefoot Bay will have access to this path via golf cart, and ideally, that it will stretch from Ashton Park to US-1. We don't want to be cut off from this new community, but we also don't need another amenity across the street if we can't cross that street without risking our lives.

At a minimum, we'll need new traffic signals on Midway St and likely on Fleming Grant Rd and East Dr as well. The intersection of Egret Cir, Sebastian Rd, and Fleming Grant Rd will need to be completely reconfigured. A traffic light holding east—west traffic on Micco Rd at Fleming Grant Rd would give carts and pedestrians safe access to the mixed-use path from Egret Cir and Sebastian Rd. When the mixed-use path goes in, we may need additional crossings at Midway St and/or Bird Dr.

We could settle, if necessary, for pedestrian-activated flashing crosswalk signals — similar to what you see along A1A and the one in front of the Yellow Dog restaurant on US-1. They're not as safe as a regular traffic light, which forces traffic, golf carts, and vehicles to come to a complete stop. With construction traffic bringing a significant volume of big, heavy equipment and more vehicles in general — and with accidents between vehicles and golf carts already a concern — proper traffic lighting should be fast-tracked for our current golf cart crossings, long before we worry about four lanes on Micco Rd.

As these projects proceed, we need heavy commercial construction trucks to use Micco Rd from the west, and avoid driving east on Micco Rd through Barefoot Bay. We want firm commitments that sound and accident mitigation walls will be installed where needed, and not at the expense of Barefoot Bay residents. We want a promise that those walls — and the mixed-use path — will be aesthetically pleasing and maintained in perpetuity, not left to decay once the ribbon is cut and the developers are gone.

Relief from traffic congestion and improved safety for Barefoot Bay residents are modest requests — possibly even legal obligations — considering the sweeping changes being imposed on our community. Developers and politicians continue to reshape the area while barely acknowledging our 54-year presence. We should be asking for far more. After all, we'll be regular customers in Palm Bay's Ashton Park — shopping in their stores, dining in their restaurants, supporting their businesses. At the very least, the developer should help resod the Barefoot Bay Golf Course — a District project that could use a sponsor. It's a reasonable ask, especially given that Ashton Park's golfers are certain to adopt and enjoy our course in the future.

We know growth is coming. We're not trying to stop it. But we have a right to insist that it doesn't steamroll us in the process. Because if no one else is going to protect Barefoot Bay, we'll have to do it ourselves.

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

COMPUTER CLUB

Another round of scam phone calls and messages, seeming to come from the Brevard County Sheriff's Department, is happening now. The caller may tell you that you have missed jury duty, have an arrest warrant, or have other county matters. Please read this response from the Brevard County Sheriff's Office.

Brevard County, Florida – If you receive a phone call from the Brevard County Sheriff's Office saying you missed jury duty and have an arrest warrant, it's a scam folks, because I can promise you with all my heart that if the Brevard County Sheriff's Office has a warrant for your arrest we don't give you a head's up by calling you on the phone so you can get a head start at running from us.

It just makes sense when you read the statement- why would they give you a warning that they are coming for you!! When the caller has you on the phone or asks you to respond to the message, he has your attention. It is harder to think these things through when you are frightened or in disbelief. First of all, look at the message. Do you know the caller? Secondly, often scam calls only ring 3 times, so let it ring a little longer, and the call will disconnect automatically. It is doubtful that the scam caller will leave a message. The caller ID on your phone will give you a chance to check the caller's number to see if it is someone you know. You can call back if you know and trust the person who is calling. If the matter is legitimate, the caller will generally leave a message telling you about the call and a number to call to discuss the message. This precaution

includes all of your phone calls- look at the number/name of the caller. If the message comes on and you are near the phone, you can still pick up the call and respond to the caller while he is leaving the message. The most important reminder for all phone calls is that it is your choice to answer a call that comes to your home phone, your cell phone, or your email. There are no requirements that you must answer all calls. If you are not at home, the call goes to voicemail. If you can't get to the phone in time to answer, the call goes to voicemail. If you don't want to talk to the person right now, the call goes to voicemail. You can also check the caller ID or recent calls on your cell phone. You are in control of which calls you answer. If you need help setting up voicemail or caller ID, please check with your service provider. To avoid phone or internet scams, please be careful to know who is calling before you



Several other artists will show their art along with the gallery owners who maintain permanent displays.

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

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
Free Grace, Freeing Grace



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
