HB 949 Raises Age to Drive Golf Carts

Florida HB 949 is now law and directly affects anyone driving a golf cart in Florida. The law, effective October 1, 2023, changes the legal age to drive a golf cart from 14 to 16 years of age and requires anyone younger than 18 years of age to have a valid driver's license or learner's permit. Anyone 18 and over will be required to carry a valid government picture ID, though a valid driver's license is not required. A photo ID was considered necessary for everyone operating a golf cart to allow enforcement of the age requirement.

The Florida House acted after several serious accidents involving teen drivers made news the past year. Most are aware that young golf cart drivers are not the only golf cart drivers that either are unaware of, or completely ignore, the rules of the road. The law may not cut down on the number of serious accidents in golf carts, but will protect younger people from those risks. Unlike Viera, which has a significant number of students who use golf carts to go to high school every day, Barefoot Bay is not likely to experience the same disruption that other communities may face with the change in the law.

Barefoot Bay is one of a few select communities in Brevard County where golf carts are allowed to drive on county roads. HB 949 specifically applies to golf carts that do not exceed 25mph, since faster electric vehicles are already required to be registered and insured, and the driver must have a valid driver's license when operating the vehicle on Brevard County roads.

HB 949 may not be popular among young teens in Barefoot Bay, since most couldn't wait until they turned 14 and could finally drive, even if less than 25mph. This well-intentioned law will protect them. The rest of us, who would watch with consternation whenever we saw young people driving carelessly, can breathe a little sigh of relief. This is a good law that made sense in a bad situation.

(Editor's note: No one is required to show an ID while driving a golf cart unless there has been a traffic infraction or an accident where law enforcement is involved. We may assume that a person looks too young to drive, and that may be true, but calling the sheriff about a "young" driver is a waste of time. The only time that HB 949 (effective October 1, 2023) can be enforced is if a deputy or officer, actually witnesses a traffic infraction and pulls the driver over. No one, including an underage driver, is required to produce ID unless they have actually broken the law. That's true of any encounter with law enforcement.)

88 Ways to Connect in Barefoot Bay!

If those activities don't interest you, you might like to take a few minutes and check out the list of **88 clubs** registered with the Barefoot Bay Recreation District that are listed in the center spread of The Tattler this issue.

Many of the clubs in Barefoot Bay are seasonal and coincide their activities and meetings with the coming and going of the snowbirds. Others meet every month or more frequently. Please take the time to view the listing of clubs and contact the club(s) directly if you'd like to join them. Please note that you don't have to be Polish to join the Polish club or know anything about computers to join the Computer Club. Barefoot Bay is blessed with wonderful people who start, organize, and run these clubs so you can enjoy socializing with your friends and neighbors in Barefoot Bay. You might even learn a little Polish or how to clean up that desktop computer. With 88 clubs, your options are pretty much unlimited.

What?!? You can't find a club with your interests? You should consider starting your own club. A club packet is available from the District with all the rules and policies that must be enforced while using District resources. Lori Kenney, BBRD Calendar/RV Coordinator, handles club requests (LKenney@bbrd.org). If you're interested in starting your own club, you'll need to schedule an appointment and see what rooms/facilities and dates are available for your club to meet. You will have options, though they may be limited by other clubs and the

dates they have their activities. Once the fine details have been worked out, you will be provided a packet to fill out for approval by the Community Manager. Once approved, your new club will be added to the District calendar depending on how often you meet. Clubs that meet more than once or twice a month are on the front of the Calendar and those that meet weekly are on the back.

The club packet provides the information required to start a club as well as the Policy Manual for use of the facilities. It's up to you to decide how much space you will need, whether you want to charge dues, fees, or request donations for your meetings/activities, etc. You should assign officers and a treasurer, if you intend on collecting money. You can invite people to join your club from outside Barefoot Bay, but you are asked to collect fees owed to the District for their participation. It's quite a commitment to start and maintain a club but expect others to have your same interest, appreciate your efforts and want to participate in your activities. Whether starting or joining a club, the meetings should be about getting people together with shared interests for entertainment, possibly learning something new, and of course, to socialize with others.

Whether you join a club or are thinking about starting one, Barefoot Bay provides a wealth of opportunities and information on just about any interest.





June is Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month

It is estimated that over five million people have been diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease in the United States. Understanding the specifics of the disease and being able to spot the signs and symptoms of Alzheimer's can help a person prepare for the effects of this brain disease. Below, we answer some of your questions.

Q: My father was diagnosed with Alzheimer's. I know it's a "brain disease," but I don't really understand what exactly it is. Can you please explain?

A: Alzheimer's disease is a progressive and degenerative disorder that attacks the cells and nerves in the brain. The breakdown of these cells destroys certain mental functions such as memory, language, and behavioral skills.

Although the actual causes of Alzheimer's are still unknown, when examined, a person diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease will usually have two types of abnormalities on their brain. The first abnormality is plaque, which is a clump of protein called beta-amyloid that damages the brain. The buildup of plaque surrounds the outside of the brain cells causing interference with cell-to-cell communication. The second abnormality is tangles. Since brain cells need a transport system to carry nutrients, the threads that transport these nutrients twist into tangles causing a failure of transport. The breakdown in transportation is believed to be a contributing factor in the decline of brain cells.

Q: My husband was recently diagnosed with "Stage One" Alzheimer's. What does this mean and how many stages are there?

A: Typically, there are three stages of Alzheimer's: early, middle and late. Early symptoms often include changes in both memory and reasoning skills. During the middle stages of Alzheimer's, damage to the brain can make it difficult to express thoughts and perform routine tasks. You may notice the person with Alzheimer's jumbling words, having trouble dressing, getting frustrated or angry, or acting in unexpected ways, such as refusing to bathe.

In late-stage Alzheimer's disease, balance and coordination in addition to autonomic functions, including heart rate, breathing, and digestion are significantly negatively impacted. In the final stages of this phase, neurological damage and muscular degeneration cause people with the disease to be unable to perform even basic movements, including walking and maintaining control of their bladder and bowels. They may not even be able to swallow without assistance. The leading cause of death in Alzheimer's patients is a secondary infection, commonly a bacterial infection that their immune-compromised body is too weak to fight, like pneumonia.

Q: A friend was just diagnosed with early-stage Alzheimer's. I know it's a disease that gets progressively worse; is there anything he can do to slow down the rate of progression?

A: Yes. There are medications available to help slow down the progression of the symptoms and help improve quality of life. Medication and treatment options may vary per person, so having an open dialogue with your physician about medications and the effects it has on your loved one is very important. In addition, practicing a healthy lifestyle may help slow the progression of the disease. This would include getting ample sleep, exercise, and eating healthy. A Mediterranean diet is recommended with plenty of fruits and vegetables. In addition, it's recommended that people with Alzheimer's practice "brain exercises," which they can do by playing bridge, reading, and other activities that utilize a lot of brain power.

Q: I'm 65 and I was recently diagnosed with Alzheimer's; will I die from it?

A: While there is no cure for Alzheimer's currently, and the majority of people diagnosed with it live approximately four to eight years after diagnosis, many still live as long as 20 years or more after being diagnosed. A lot depends on how well a person takes care of their health. That's why it's important to talk to your physician about the best medication options for you and to also maintain a healthy lifestyle.

Q: What are the warning signs of someone with Alzheimer's disease?

A: If you are caring for someone and you think that they might be suffering from Alzheimer's, here are some warning signs to help you asses if you should take further action:

Memory loss that disrupts daily life—In the early stages of Alzheimer's disease, forgetting recent information is common. Missing appointments, forgetting important dates, needing to ask for the same information repeatedly, or relying on others to handle things that used to be handled independently are all warning signs if occurring frequently.

Difficulty with familiar tasks—Alzheimer's patients can have problems accomplishing daily and familiar tasks like keeping track of bills and taking longer time to do things they did before.

Confusion with time and place—Losing track of times, places, seasons, and passage of time are all warning signs. If you notice that a person forgets where they are or how they got there, you should take action.

Trouble understanding visual images—A sign of Alzheimer's is having difficulty with perceptions. For example, if a person with Alzheimer's passes his or her reflection in a mirror, he or she might think that there is another person in the room.

Changes in mood and personality—If you have noticed that your loved one's mood and personality has changed, such as becoming easily upset, confused, depressed, anxious, or fearful, you might want to follow up with your doctor.

The facts I have researched for this article should prompt seniors to question why more of our elected officials are not involved in the battle for affordable housing. This question might also be directed to county staff who work in areas affecting seniors and those who need affordable housing.

First, we need a way to pay for affordable housing. No private investor will build and operate housing at a loss. Elected officials need to work out a solution and, like it or not, this means government involvement and a

tax. Passing a tax is one thing, keeping it on its directed path quite another, but it can be done if private citizens are involved.

Second is the problem of taxes. The County has a 1 cent sales tax that generated about \$161 million from 2020-2022 for Brevard Public Schools, in addition to the normal taxes we pay annually. Then we have the lagoon tax, which brought in a like amount. Our elected officials are to be commended for their interest in schools and the lagoon. I wish they would show as much concern for seniors who have outlived their retirement savings. Who could have predicted how long we now live or the high cost of food we see today?

We cannot keep burying our heads in the sand like the proverbial ostrich. To build or acquire more affordable housing will cost money. The can being kicked down the road has turned into a very large can, moving faster, and it needs to be stopped. Solving the problem will require convincing our elected officials that our current modus operandi must change.

Hurricane Season is Back

As summer approaches, residents of Barefoot Bay should begin preparing themselves for the 2023 hurricane season, with the season starting on June 1st. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) predicts that the 2023 hurricane season will be slightly below average with a total of 11 to 15 named storms, with six to eight reaching hurricane strength. Of these, one to three are predicted to be major hur-

NOAA emphasizes that despite this forecast, it only takes one storm to cause significant damage and urges residents to take precautions and stay informed. Barefoot Bay has a history of being hit by hurricanes, with the most recent being Hurricane Nicole in 2022. The hurricane caused power outages and damage to homes in the community. In 2004, the combined damage of Hurricane's

Jeanne and Frances resulted in nearly 1.000 homes being destroyed in Barefoot Bay.

Even with the approaching El Nino and its dampening effects on Atlantic hurricanes, residents should not take any chances and prepare themselves for the potential impact of a storm. Residents are encouraged to create an emergency supply kit to support your family for a minimum of three days, including items such as non-perishable food, water, important medicines, and batteries. An evacuation plan should include when you would leave, what you will need and where you will go. Residents are also advised to secure their homes with shutters, trim trees, and clear any debris around their property. Business owners are advised to have an emergency plan in place that includes securing their premises and backing up important data.

Local authorities are also taking proactive measures. Brevard County Emergency Management has been working closely with local fire departments, police departments, and other agencies to develop strategies for disaster response and recently visited Barefoot Bay. The county has also created a hurricane plan that outlines evacuation procedures and shelter locations. Barefoot Bay's shelter is in Micco at the South Mainland Community Center at 3700 Allen Avenue. They will accept pets at the shelter.

With the NOAA forecasting a slightly below average season this year, it is still vital that all residents take precautions and stay informed. Working together with local authorities, Barefoot Bay can minimize the impact of any storm that may come our way.
