New Law Helps Survivors Get VA Benefits—A new law makes it easier for survivors of Veterans exposed to toxic material, including burn pits, to receive Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC), tax-free benefit payments available for certain surviving spouses, children, or parents.

New Toxic Exposure Screening for Veterans—Veterans who enroll or are enrolled in VA health care, can now receive the toxic exposure screening at VA medical centers and clinics across the country. Happenings at the BOT meetings:

During the regular Thursday meeting held on 1/24/2023, Mr. John Soulis was named to be a voting member of the ARCC, and on 2/9 Deidre Sunter was appointed to an ARCC Alternate position.

An agenda item to modify the BBRD Investment Policy to better enable staff to maximize the return on BBRD funds was listed for the 1/24 meeting. This was voted on and passed. Staff was given the go ahead.

The board also instructed the Violations Committee to refer five violations to our attorney to resolve legally.

The Board then held a budget kick-off / Town Hall on Friday January 26th. The start 9 a.m. time was chosen because it was a work day and all the department heads were to attend. Resident attendance was small probably due to the early hour.

Also this month, the contract for the beach restrooms was signed. The contractor, Big 5 Construction, has applied for, and is now waiting, on county permits to start. The finish date is due in June. (Yes, this year!) When work begins some areas may be blocked off. Please give them room to work and don't complain about any inconveniences. We've waited too long for this project to begin.

The poolside Cabana Bar "Building Construction Permit" has been issued by the county. Our contractor, Barefoot Services, started work on Monday, 2/6, and is coming along nicely.

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Starship Set for Launch



SpaceX is set to launch its historic Starship prototype this March on an ambitious test mission to space. This will be the first ever attempt by SpaceX to launch a full-scale prototype of its Starship spacecraft and is seen as a major step towards the company's goal of establishing a permanent human presence on Mars.

The Starship prototype will be launched from the company's development facility located in Boca Chica, Texas and will be the world's tallest (394 feet) and most powerful (17 million pounds of thrust) rocket with the capability to carry 150 metric ton payloads in its reusable form. The mission will see the spacecraft ascend to a maximum altitude of 50,000 feet before the 33 Raptor engine-propelled booster will separate from Starship, performing a controlled re-entry and landing back at the facility, while Starship reenters the atmosphere and splashes down in the ocean near Hawaii. If all goes according to plan, this will be the first successful launch and (splash) landing of a full-scale Starship prototype.

The launch of Starship is expected to be an exciting event for space enthusiasts and the general public alike. SpaceX has already invited members of the public to view the launch from its facilities in Boca Chica. The company has also indicated that it plans to eventually launch Starship from its facility in Cape Canaveral, Florida and is currently building a launch pad specifically for Starship. Future Starship launches from the Cape will be visible to millions of people living in the Sunshine State.

The success of this launch will be an important milestone in SpaceX's mission to establish humanity's first permanent presence on Mars. If all goes well, the Starship spacecraft could be the vehicle of choice for future human missions to the red planet and has already been chosen by NASA as the choice for future Artemis moon-based missions. Eventually, Starship could be used to provide transportation for cargo or passengers between any two locations on Earth, taking off and landing in a trip taking less than 30 minutes. Starship, and it's reusability, is a project that has captivated the imaginations of people around the world, and the upcoming launch is sure to be an exciting event for all.







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Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month

March is National Colorectal Cancer Awareness month, the perfect time to bring attention to this deadly-and often avoidable-disease, which is the third leading cause of cancer-related deaths in both men and women in the U.S., according to the American Cancer Society.

Q: I've read that early screening for colorectal cancer is important. Is that really true?

A: Yes. According to the National Foundation for Cancer Research, studies show that early (and ongoing) screening could prevent one-third of colorectal cancer deaths in the U.S. To put that in perspective, the five-year survival rate is 90% if it's detected early, according to the American Cancer Society.

Q: My husband is 65 and I'm 55. Neither of us has had a colorectal screening. Is it too late?

A: No, but you should both speak with your doctor about scheduling colonoscopies as soon as possible as the risk for developing this cancer increases with age.

Q: Are there any lifestyle factors that increase the chance of getting colorectal cancer?

A: Yes. There are many lifestyle-related habits that are linked to an increased risk for colorectal cancer. A major one is obesity, which increases a person's risk of getting colorectal cancer by about 30 percent, according to the National Foundation for Cancer Research. In addition, smoking and excessive alcohol use, diets high in red and processed meats as well as lack of exercise all contribute to an increased risk.

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Q: My father died of colorectal cancer. Does that increase my risk of getting it?

A: Yes, people with "first-degree" relatives, including parents and siblings, who have had colorectal cancer are two to three times as likely to get it.

Q: I am well over 50 and know that I'm long overdue for a colonoscopy, but I just dread having to drink that awful stuff and not eat anything else all day (I get lightheaded easily). What other ways can I get checked, if any, for colorectal cancer?

A: While the most common form of screening is a colonoscopy, there are other ways, including (but not limited to) an at-home fecal blood test such as Cologuard. There are pros and cons to both. If you're unsure of what to choose, and for more information, discuss it with your appropriate medical provider.

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

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Medicare Enrollment Period Extended

Due to the two hurricanes that passed over the State of Florida during 2022, the Federal Government has extended the Annual Enrollment Period (AEP) for Medicare. This action was taken on behalf of Medicare recipients who were unable to enroll in a plan or change their plans during the normal AEP. The extended period will last until March 31, 2023. If you enroll prior to March 31. you may request a start date for the first of the month following your enrollment. 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Rules of the Road

(We are reprinting this article from last year. We have heard all the complaints regarding following the Rules of the Road and how dangerous it can be for those in slower golf carts when aggressive drivers lack patience when following behind them. There's also an unwritten policy where Brevard County Sheriff deputies will not ticket Barefoot Bay golf carts caught driving in the Pedway. That unwritten policy would most likely be forgotten in the event of a serious injury. The Tattler staff captured an accident on video of a Citizen's Patrol vehicle sideswiping a golf cart traveling in the Pedway on Barefoot Blvd that would have been avoided had the Rules of the Road been followed. Both the Patrol officer and golf cart owner should be grateful there wasn't more damage or a physical injury. Use the QR Code to watch the video of the accident on the *Tattler Media YouTube page.*)

The Golf Cart Club hosted an informational meeting on Wednesday, July 20, 2022 with the Brevard County Sheriff's Office regarding the "rules of the road" when driving a golf cart in Barefoot Bay. Barefoot Bay has not always been a golf cart community in the general sense we know today. Less than 15 years ago, you were only allowed to drive your golf cart from your home to the golf course and back. No visiting friends and certainly no cruising the Boulevard to the Winn Dixie for groceries. The Brevard County commissioners, after successful lobbying efforts by the BOT and our legal representation at the time, agreed to allow golf cart use on the county roads within Barefoot Bay with two crossings on Micco Road and extending the use to the Winn Dixie entrance on Barefoot Boulevard.

The Florida State and Brevard County rules and regulations for driving a golf cart in Barefoot Bay have not changed since that day. First and foremost, when driving a golf cart (or low speed vehicle) you must obey the rules of the road as if you were driving a car. You should make complete stops and signal your turns, either by hand or turn signal. You can drive a golf cart after dark, but only with adequate headlights, tail lights, and a windshield. These are commonly known facts, though we've all seen examples where even the simplest things are forgotten by some golf cart drivers (like stopping at stop signs).

The BCS officer surprised the crowd when he advised golf cart owners they could be ticketed if found driving in the pedestrian lane on Barefoot Boulevard. When asked if a golf cart driver should pull over for motor vehicles behind them, the officer told us no, the golf cart must remain in the motor vehicle lane. The driver of a motor vehicle risks receiving a by Rob Allan


to pull over for a motor vehicle behind them and also accept the risk of getting ticketed if caught crossing the lines into the pedway. There are no other marked pedestrian zones in Barefoot Bay. Pulling to the side makes sense, regardless of vehicle type, when someone is right behind you, which can be difficult to avoid when you're going less than 25 mph.

These facts were also presented during the lively discussion in Building A. Golf carts that can exceed 20 mph must be licensed, registered, and insured and can only be driven by a licensed driver. Golf carts that do not exceed 20 mph can be driven by anyone over the age of 14 years old. You can have no more passengers than seats available. Three people in the front of a golf cart would be illegal. A DUI is a DUI and getting stopped on a golf cart will not save you from jail or an SR22. You can drive your cart to the entrance of the Winn Dixie shopping center, but not along the sidewalk towards the pier. So legally, Family Dollar can't be visited by golf cart, nor can you drive to Cumberland Farms, because golf carts and low speed vehicles are not allowed on US1 or any of the trails along US1.

Most importantly, you can cross Micco Road in a golf cart in only two places, East Drive and Egret Circle/Sebastian Road. It is illegal to cross Micco Road (regardless of signage) from any street other than those two intersections, since you cannot drive on Micco Road or the sidewalk on Micco Road. There is an exception to this rule-if your golf cart is licensed, tagged, insured, has seat belts and can travel 25mph-but the golf cart must drive on Micco Road and not the sidewalk. Unfortunately, you cannot take your golf cart to St. Luke's (for church, bingo, or the thrift shop), even if you live on the south side of Barefoot Bay, because you cannot drive on Micco Road or the sidewalk on Micco Road. One of the most dangerous things we can do in Barefoot Bay is cross Micco Road in a golf cart, broadside and unprotected, even at the approved intersections.



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ticket if observed following too closely, or unsafely passing a golf cart, even if that golf cart is traveling at very low speeds.

Many in the meeting pointed out that no longer being allowed to drive in the pedway could be dangerous, due to impatient drivers and "road rage," but per BCS, it is not only the law, it has always been the law. The striped lane on Barefoot Boulevard is for pedestrians only. Golf carts and bikes must share the road with motor vehicles.

Accordingly, motor vehicles within Barefoot Bay must share the road with a golf cart as if it were any other motor vehicle. The speed limit is 25mph everywhere in Barefoot Bay and most golf carts travel 18mph+, but some may drive much slower. Those needing to get to work via US1 should plan their commute accordingly. There are five side streets to Micco Road, and off the Boulevard, (East, Pinewood, Midway, Lark, and Bird). Golf carts on Barefoot Boulevard do not have

Many of the residents were new and appreciated the efforts of the BCS and the Golf Cart Club to make them aware of the legalities associated with driving a golf cart through Barefoot Bay. Additional efforts are being made by the Golf Cart Club to add or change information signage and to permit access to Kiwi Drive across Fleming Grant Road, but these are for future consideration by the county and are unlikely to happen anytime soon. For those who find these rules "different than it was," these are the legal rules of the road in Barefoot Bay. For those who are "gonna do what I want," if you get pulled over and ticketed by BCS, it will probably only cost you \$60+ for a ticket and some minor annoyance, but it only takes one serious injury or death to prompt Brevard County to reconsider our golf cart privileges in Barefoot Bay, an amenity you may not have even considered an amenity. Follow the rules of the road, and drive with care.

Here is just another problem with off grade vapor barriers in manufactured homes.
In between the vapor barrier and the subfloor is a bit of dead air space or void that attracks moisture buildup. This is an ideal environment for mold growth even if you cant see it.

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And So It Goes...


I've worked full-time for a procurement company in Palm Bay for the past twelve years. It was the longest job I've ever held and allowed me to fulfill the dream of many a salesman, making that million-dollar sale. I was the only sales rep in the company to ever have a seven-figure sale and I did it several times over my time with the company. In each instance, I could "feel" the sale was a strong possibility and so I would visualize receiving the Purchase Order (PO), which is a fancy way of saying I imagined how I would spend the commission checks. I made regular reports to management regarding potential sales, and I felt strongly enough about these big deals to include them on my weekly forecast. I "knew" the PO was coming and each time, I closed the sale. Yet, there was one sale I couldn't make, trying to sell the new owners of the company to let me continue working from home.

Like many companies, our company turned to remote work during the early stages of Covid. The sales reps worked almost exclusively by email and when calls were necessary an online system to route calls worked well from any location. Working from home was a blessing. I had followed the spread of Covid earlier than most, publishing posts online about this new virus and how it seemed to be spreading with extraordinary speed and could soon threaten the globe. Covid-19 killed millions worldwide and more than a million Americans. Covid still kills more Americans than the flu every month.

My fellow employees were younger and predominantly anti-vax while I personally prayed for a vaccine. Once available, I waited while the oldest among us were vaccinated first. The vaccines were developed so quickly, doubt set in about their overall safety. Granted, people are allowed to doubt medical advice. I took the vaccine and was grateful for a new layer of protection other than a cloth mask. I also took the boosters and will continue to follow up with future Covid shots, as well as the annual flu shot. To each their own. I was working from home and since 2020 had not even caught a cold in three years. Towards the end of 2022, the owner of our company decided to sell. He had suffered through a brutal Covid illness and came out of it wanting to enjoy life and did not want to spend his senior years in front of a computer. The new owners found themselves with a sales force that was happy working from home, with several sales reps having moved to different states during that time. We were as productive a sales force working from home as we had been working in the office. Arguably, more productive. I had the largest sales month of any rep in the company, ever, in November 2022. We were rocking.

I was still making the same base salary + commission rate since I was hired in 2010. I had received a few bonus checks for Salesman of the Year, etc. but my actual benefits never changed. Working from home was the only additional benefit I'd ever received during my time there and it was an exceptional benefit. I no longer needed to get up early and drive to work. So, I was more rested. I also saved on fuel and wear and tear on my vehicles and the unavoidable delays long from stopped trains and





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accidents on US1. The time and money savings were hardly insignificant and money not spent, is money earned. Naps in my car during my lunch hour, were replaced with naps in my bed, a few seconds down the hall. Those naps were longer and more comfortable. Finally, I actually lost 40 lbs. I thought I gained weight because I sat in front of a computer all day, but it was actually gas station breakfasts and fast food lunches. The work-from-home benefits were good for my health, my sales, and my overall well-being. I was happy and I hadn't caught Covid.

I believe that every new owner needs to make their own mistakes. We've made plenty in our first year running the Tattler. Making people come back to the office, who are obviously happy, successful, and thriving while working from home is a mistake. We went back to the office two days a week, starting the first week of January and I reluctantly went in. I could sense my anxiety. The room I previously shared with six people, was now shared by eleven with more hires to come. Productivity took a hit as we always seemed to get off to a late start as we set up our computers for the office and dealt with training sessions as we moved to expand our capabilities. The second week came and went. By the following weekend, I had developed a persistent cough and was feeling body aches and pains. For the first time in my life, I took a Covid rapid test. I tested positive. My wife and oldest son soon tested positive, as well. To say the least, I was a little upset.

I had managed to avoid catching Covid for three years and within two weeks of being forced back into the office I was positive for a disease that I had successfully avoided. I feel no long-term effects today, but my wife had a rough two weeks and lost a full week of work. Alternatively, I lost one day and worked with Covid from home. Was it possible I would have caught Covid eventually? Yes. It's also possible that I would not have. The risks were reinforced the day I returned to the office and ran into one of the sales reps wearing a flimsy paper hospital mask. I asked him, "What's up?" He replied, "Oh, the wife has the flu and I have it a little bit, so thought I would try not to pass my germs around." I walked over to his desk to drop off a KN95 that I kept for emergencies and he sat in his open-air cube, without his mask on. "Oh, a KN95. Thanks. I ran out of those," he said. The flu is airborne and admittedly, he shouldn't have been in the office, with or without a mask. But these are the things we can't control when we're in a work environment. One person's cold could be another person's cause of death.

I sat down that afternoon and emailed my manager and the new CEO the following: When the Covid pandemic hit in 2020, <our company>, like many companies, took the extraordinary move of letting most of their employees work from home. I had lost both of my brothers in late 2019 and my mother broke her leg in Feb 2020 and was bedridden until she passed in July of that year. 2020 was not my best year, as I dealt with depression and a downturn in the economy. Our sales reps, most having worked for <our company> for a decade or more, proved that we were more than capable of working from home and we continued to prove that with revenue that was comparable to previous years when we worked in the office. Many of us took advantage of the fact that we could work a little longer each day and some even worked on the weekends.

When we were asked to come back to the office, I dreaded it. I had managed to avoid catching Covid for three years. I was fully vaccinated and was brutally aware that I worked with a majority of anti vaxxers. It took only two weeks for me to catch Covid and I was furious and scared. I am lucky to not have any comorbidities, but Covid felt like I had been hit by a ten-ton truck. My wife caught Covid from me and she was in much worse shape. She is still not at 100%, though she is back at work this week.

Though I'm not as young as many of the other sales reps, my intentions are to work for <our company> until I am 70. But I fear catching Covid again (or the flu, or whatever new pandemic we'll have thrown our way in the years to come). I understand there was a need to meet us and see our sales team in action, but what we do and how we do it is a known factor to <the managers>. Having us come to the office is not necessary and puts many of us at risk, especially the older employees. Even <the previous CEO> mentioned his bout with Covid as a deciding factor in wanting to sell <our company> and enjoy what life he has left. I get that now, more than ever.

I don't want to come to the office anymore. I expressed that to <my manager>, but came in this week because I knew she didn't want me to force anyone's hand. My health and the health of my family are more important today than ever considering the loss of my immediate family only a few years ago.

I am almost 61 years old and am respectfully asking to be allowed to work from home, permanently, for the time I have left here. I've never received a raise and still work for the same base salary I started with in 2010. Working from home was the greatest benefit any employee could ask for. I also want to work part-time moving forward (32 hours a week), which will allow me to continue to receive my health benefits and still take care of my customers.

We already have exceptions and the ability to be flexible will allow <our company> to keep seasoned reps working for years to come. Thank you for your consideration.

Even when I gave them the option to say no to part-time work, they would not



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allow me to work from home. I had a decision to make. I was still owed commissions for multiple sales that would not be delivered for months and I had been given the impression I wouldn't be paid if I quit. I sent another email notifying management that I would "retire" but wanted to work a few more months to be assured I would receive my commissions and, due to my mental and physical well-being, would be working from home until then. The following day, I was informed a 90-day advance notice would not be necessary and that I could "retire", effective immediately. They agreed I would be paid the commissions I had earned. But rather than allow me to work from home and continue to be one of their top sales reps, they let me go after twelve years. Another mistake.

I wonder how we would have reacted to Covid had it manifested itself in pustules all over the body, like smallpox, instead of sniffles and a cough? People respond differently to a disease that disfigures or leaves you with blood running from all your orifices, like the highly contagious Marburg virus that has just reemerged in Equatorial Guinea. Americans lined up for the smallpox and polio vaccines out of fear of those diseases. The unseen scarring of the lungs and very visible intubations in the early days of Covid did not instill the kind of fear that pustules and iron lungs did in the 20th Century. We can expect new viruses and diseases as the world deals with inevitable pandemics in the future. How we handle those future outbreaks in this country and in the workplace directly affects life and death. Working from home should not be a last resort, considering the benefits to employees's health and happiness, our infrastructure, the environment and society, in general. i no longer worry about going back to the office. I'm retired, own a newspaper and can write about it instead.




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


