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Tornado Hits River Grove

It took just a few seconds for a tornado to make a mess of River Grove Mobile Home Village on April 16. A late afternoon thunderstorm produced a small tornado, an EFO (winds of 65-75 mph), that damaged approximately 30 homes in the area. Gratefully, no one was injured. The tornado started just west of the railroad tracks behind Bottom's Up bar on US1 and then jumped to the east side of the tracks where it blew through River Grove, taking down fences, flipping carports, and damaging roofs. The tornado then proceeded across US1 and damaged boats at Sebastian Marina & Boatyard before it ended its 500 yard sprint, as a waterspout, in the Indian River. Total damage estimates are unknown but are not expected to exceed the limit required for federal or state assistance.

Florida tornadoes are less severe than those in the midwest, where storm shelters offer the best protection from extremely large and powerful tornadoes. Flying debris, even from a weak tornado, can reach lethal velocity and can fall far from a tornado's center. You must remain in your home, even a manufactured home, during a tornado warning. Do not go outside during a tornado warning for any reason. You may not be able to save your home from damage, but saving your life during a tornado is all about protecting your head. In the event of a tornado warning, you need to know the sturdiest part of your home, often an interior closet or bathroom, and seek shelter there immediately. Bring a pillow, cushion or even a bicycle helmet to protect your head. If nothing else, get low and protect your head with your arms, like you would in the event of an airplane crash. Don't go outside until the storm has safely passed.

As we head into the stormy season, the Micco tornado is a great reminder that not every thunderstorm will produce a tornado, but once a tornado is actually heading your direction, you have very little time to make a decision. You should have a plan of action in place before a tornado warning is announced. It's especially important to actually hear the announcements that, at best, can give you 10-15 minutes advance warning of an approaching tornado. Don't depend on your cell phone alone for these emergency warnings. A weather radio, purposely, obnoxiously loud, assures you hear the severe weather announcements, even if you're sleeping. Those few extra seconds can make a difference when your life is at risk.

Barefoot Bay Needs YOU!

With the recent resignation of Lynn Tummolo from the Board of Directors (BOT) for Barefoot Bay Recreation District (BBRD), we are reminded that this community does not run by itself. We need Barefoot Bay residents to run for the BOT every year. This is a volunteer position that requires Trustees to attend two BOT meetings per month, other meetings and workshops as needed throughout the year, and to have a general familiarization with the workings of BBRD and our annual budget. The only legal requirements are that Trustees be residents of Barefoot Bay and are registered to vote here. We require five Trustees for a full quorum and at least one seat on the BOT comes up for election every year. The deadline for qualifying to run for BBRD Trustee is August 28-Sept 1, 2023 and we need individuals in our community to step up and run for this position.

Those interested in becoming a Trustee should attend a few Board meetings (they se Robert's Rules of Order) and a budget workshop, if possible. Talk to current Trustees now, since those conversations must stop once you've been elected to the BOT, due to Florida's Sunshine Laws. Talk to your friends and neighbors, after all, you will need their votes. It's not impossible to work a fulltime job and still be a Trustee, but it can be time consuming, a significant issue if you don't have a very congenial employer. It doesn't hurt if you are the boss and can get away when needed. Most Trustees are retired, still active and want what's best for Barefoot Bay. That's important, since you don't get paid, except in appreciation from your community.

One final note. It's imperative that we avoid candidates that are "one issue" candidates. We have seen those come and go many times, often leaving disappointed. These candidates burnout quickly when they realize their wishlist can't be fulfilled, or worse, get their agenda item passed and then no longer care about serving the rest of their term, let alone the community. It's important to note that Trustees do not "run" Barefoot Bay. They are elected to review and sign off on our annual budget and contracts as well as other matters that come before the BOT, with the singular goal of maintaining and improving our community's assets and amenities.

Do you have what it takes to be a Trustee? If so, Barefoot Bay needs YOU!

Happenings at the BOT meetings-

A budget workshop was held in the evening of March 21st. Many items were discussed. It was a 3-hour meeting. Please refer to the minutes on the bbrd.org website or watch the recorded video. The bottom line is prices and fees have to increase more than we would like, mainly because fees have not changed for a very long time but costs have been rising every year. We are way behind the curve in assessment fee increases, due to the CPI restriction placed on the previous boards, and this one, by the County Commissioners.

During the regular Tuesday meeting held on 3/28/2023, there was a presentation made by our auditing firm and the BBRD passed with flying colors. Also there was the announcement of a settlement on a lawsuit that has been around for a while. All settlement funds will be paid by the District's insurance company; there will be no impact to the budget.

The 19th Hole kitchen is back and had a grand opening on Thursday, 4/13. Many different samples of food were passed out and tasted great! A good crowd showed up and a great time was had by all.

The cabana bar is mostly finished and looks great.

By the time this is published, there will be a new maintenance company, BrightView, on our suffering golf course. We are putting a heavy load on their shoulders but by all indications they can handle it and deliver a quality playing surface.

Pool 1 construction is to start soon and may have already started by publication.

Things are starting to wind down as we are nearing the end of our "season." I hope everyone had a great winter and arrives back "Up North" safely.

One last important item: Lynn Tomollo announced her resignation from the BOT, effective the end of April. I, for one, am sorry to see her go. The request for anyone interested in fulfilling the remainder of her term (20 months), was printed in the April 3rd "Peek of the Week." The Trustees are evaluating the letters of intent/resumes and may request an interview with the candidates. The appointment will be placed on a future BOT agenda for consideration by the Trustees.

If you have something to say about Barefoot Bay please come to a meeting and say it. Every meeting has an agenda Item called "Audience Participation." Each person who wishes to speak is allowed to speak for three minutes on whatever topic they want to bring up.

I often get approached by residents with different questions about the Bay. Some are easy to explain but many are more complex. For example, I was asked just the other day, "What do the trustees do besides sit in the manager's office?"

I wanted to share with you a few of the projects we as trustees have been working on in 2022/23. The list is far greater from the six mentioned below, but these have been the most time consuming:

The 19th Hole Kitchen and Walk-in Cooler Project—The Grand Opening was April 13th. I truly hope you all enjoyed the walk-through and will enjoy the new kitchen for years to come

Lounge Outside Bar—Expected completion 2023.

Barefoot Bay Beach Restrooms—Project is now in the construction permitting phase. Expected completion 2023.

Pool #1 Pit and Heater Reconstruction—Project is now in the permitting phase. Expected completion is summer 2023.

Golf Course Irrigation Pump House Foundation Repair—Project is now in the permitting phase. Expected completion is 2023.

Pool Resurfacing—Pool contractor has been selected, construction contract under development and negotiation. Expected completion is summer 2023.


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A Word From Your





Brevard County Increasing Lifeguards to Decrease Beach Problems

Brevard County's beaches are one of the many reasons why a multitude of tourists come to visit the Space Coast each year. However, since December of 2022 there have been over 400 water rescues, and 10 drownings. Contributing to this uptick is an increase in tourism (24 percent increase in tourism this year over last), and also an increase in unsafe beach conditions, such as rip currents.

In response to these tragic events, I am making it a top priority to find the funds in order to make our beaches safer for the tourists and residents who work and play along our coast. Currently, Brevard has 25 lifeguard tower locations, and employs 17 full-time and 47 seasonal lifeguards. The County is putting forth an enormous effort into recruiting and training new lifeguards to increase this number.

Brevard County has also approved the extension of our seasonal lifeguards, implemented roving patrols, and are working with state agencies, organizations, and municipalities to increase the education of rip current dangers through social media, alerts, and mobile messaging boards.

Meanwhile, Brevard County Fire Rescue is developing a report with the purpose of defining the core of lifeguard services across the County. This report would also consider lifeguard tower locations which would be based on beach usage, population, access, and parking areas.

Should I Admit Defeat?

In researching this article, I came up with some grim answers on Section 8 and Section 202 affordable housing. We need a heck of a lot more work to make the system user-friendly. More importantly, it is way past time for the County and cities to work together with nonprofits to address the issue.

Section 202 housing, sometimes called subsidized housing for the elderly, applies to seniors 62 years or older. There are only six locations in Brevard designated as Section 202 housing and all have waiting lists of two, three, or even four years. The Section 8 housing voucher program in Brevard is currently closed, and you cannot get on a waiting list. In some cases, there is no Section 8 housing available to those who already have their housing voucher. Section 8 housing is becoming less available due to this type of housing being renovated, with higher rents forcing out tenants. Landlords and Brevard County need to work together to increase the availability of Section 8 housing.

While there are many hoops to jump through, HUD money could be used to renovate property for affordable housing and that money would never have to be returned if the housing projects are used 40 years for the purpose intended. Do you wonder why Brevard's Housing and Human Services Department has not sought out HUD sources for construction of affordable housing?

The homeless population in Brevard will continue to grow while we address the Lagoon, high speed trains, gun rights, and other hot potato issues. Those up for election never mention affordable housing and other issues affecting seniors that we continue to attract to Brevard County. If we ignore the housing problem, we will admit defeat, when victory could be achieved.

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
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Take Care of Yourself, Including Your Mental Health

Millions of people in the U.S. suffer from mental health issues, and if you are one of them, it's nothing to be ashamed of. Talking about mental health can reduce the stigma and encourage those who are suffering to seek help. Modern day heroes like Olympian Michael Phelps have struggled with depression and anxiety, so remember - you're not alone. In recognition of Mental Health Awareness Month, we've answered some questions here and hope if you, or someone you know, are experiencing signs of mental health issues you will seek the help you need.

Q: My entire life my father has been the most positive person I know, but since he turned 80, I've noticed a shift; he's become, well, the best word is glum. I asked him what's bothering him, and he just says, "getting old." Is this typical of seniors?

A: According to the National Institute on Aging, depression in older adults is a common phenomenon. One of the most common reasons is that as people age, they tend to spend more time alone, and social isolation and loneliness are associated with higher rates of depression.

Q: My son has always been moody, but since he hit his teenage years, he seems more blue than ever. Is this depression or normal teenage stuff?

A: Seeking the help of a professional is the best way to find the answer to that. But generally speaking, according to the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM), published by the American Psychiatric Association, there are a few different types of depression. These include:

Major Depressive Disorder: This includes symptoms lasting at least two weeks that interfere with a person's ability to perform daily tasks. These symptoms include, but are not limited to, diminished interest in all, or nearly all, activities; depressed mood most days; fatigue; sleep disturbance; feelings of worthlessness.

Persistent Depressive Disorder (Dysthymia) - a depressed mood that lasts more than two years, but the person may still be able to perform daily tasks, unlike someone with Major Depressive Disorder.

Substance/Medication-Induced Depressive Disorder - depression related to the use of substances, like alcohol or pain medication.

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






I have been a practice dental hygienist for 45 years. I recently retired. When I was working, I loved explaining to my patients the how and why of taking care of their teeth. I have had several people ask me to put it in writing. So here goes!

Everyone forms plaque in their mouths. Plaque is an accumulation of the bacteria that is naturally found in the mouth. It takes about 24 hours for the plaque to form a biofilm (another word for plaque). Plaque is a soft sticky film of bacteria that can be removed with a brush, floss, soft pick, waterpik, and other dental tools. Once the plaque has formed, anytime someone eats a food with a sugar or a carbohydrate, the bacteria in the plaque metabolize the sugars and carbohydrates and produces a byproduct, which is an acid. I tell the kids that the plaque eats the sugar and goes pee pee all over their teeth. The acid by-product will then soften the teeth and irritate the gums.

Underneath the tongue is one of the main saliva ducts into the mouth. While saliva is very important and people who don't make enough get more cavities, saliva also has minerals which harden the plaque into the tartar. A side effect of most medications is decreased saliva flow. So, people with dry mouth need to drink more water. Sucking on sugar-free candies helps. I always recommend candies and gums sweetened with xylitol. This is a natural sweetener which is bacteriostatic, which means the bacteria can't digest

If the plaque is allowed to remain in the mouth it eventually hardens and becomes tartar. I always compare it to the algae on a boat growing into barnacles. Once it is in the tartar stage, it damages the gum and the bone. The body sees the tartar as a foreign object just like it would a splinter. If you left a splinter in your finger, your finger would become puffy and inflamed around the splinter, because the body sends white blood cells to fight it. Same with the tartar—the body sends white blood cells to where the tartar is, causing the gums to be red and puffy around the tartar. Then the body tries to protect itself by pulling away from the tartar. It does this in two ways—by recession or by pocketing. Recession is when the gum moves down the tooth exposing the root. Or the fibers that attach the tooth and the gum break down, causing a deeper space between the tooth and the gums. This is what the hygienist is looking for when she does the measurements in millimeters. One through three are healthy, fours are borderline, and anything five or deeper is considered a pocket.

Everyone should have their gums measured annually. Whether one is losing gum attachment from recession or pocketing, they are also losing bone, which is right under the gum. If the gum attachment goes down, the bone dissolves away with it. You need a good amount of bone around each tooth to keep it stable. Too much bone loss leads to loose teeth. I compare it to not having enough dirt around a fence post, which leads to a wobbly post. This is why teeth cleanings are important, at least twice a year, though some people need more frequent due to heavy build-up or a history of gum disease. Sometimes if the gums are not healthy, or it's been a while since the last cleaning and there is heavy build-up of tartar, we recommend deep cleanings. This is done with some numbing and usually half of the mouth is done at a time.

Some of the other things I like to talk to my patients about are other sources of acid that will damage the teeth. Neutral pH is 7. Once the pH of the mouth drops to 5.5 or lower, it starts pulling the calcium and phosphate out of the teeth, which weakens the enamel. Stomach acid can lower the pH of the mouth, as well as acidic foods in our diet. Many people with acid reflux can have tooth damage. This can be combated with baking soda. Baking soda is alkaline which can neutralize the acid. You can swish with a baking soda/water solution. You can even drink this solution if you are having a burning in the esophagus. However, it tastes nasty and will make you burp. You can also brush with a baking soda solution. Fluoride will also help harden up the enamel. I recommend using a fluoride rinse at bedtime. However, fluoride cannot penetrate plague, so clean your teeth first.

An acidic diet will also cause decay. Soda beverages usually have a pH of around 3. Anything carbonated has a low pH. Most fruit juices have a low pH, also coffee, tea, wine and beer. I recommend swishing with water anytime you eat or drink anything. However, some bottled water can be acidic. Spring water will always have a higher pH, which is good. Tap water is neutral, but purified waters usually have a lower pH, because of the way they are filtered

I personally brush my teeth five times a day, first thing in the morning, after breakfast, after lunch, after dinner, and bed time. The most important time to brush is bed time. We say we brush at night for ourselves. We brush in the mornings for our friends. Flossing should be done at least once a day. I am a big believer in Waterpiks. Waterpiks will blow out the food and plaque when set at the higher settings. The water beating against the gums strengthens the gums. A waterpik can get up to 6 mm below the gum line which is good for people with pockets. The waterpik introduces oxygen under the gum line which eliminates the anaerobic bacteria (bacteria that can not live in the presence of oxygen). I prefer an electric toothbrush as it will do a much better cleaning that a manual. The Oral B toothbrush does 55,000 cycles a minute. The best someone brushing by hand can do is about 300 strokes a minute. I also am a big pusher of soft picks. These are plastic tooth picks coated in rubber that massage the gums as well as removes interdental plaque and food. I always told my patients that my motto was "You work hard so I don't have to."

Hopefully you have learned something new here. I try to leave my patients better educated than when they started with me.

19th Hole Kitchen Project Completed.

The 19th Hole kitchen remodeling project is finally complete. The Grand Opening was on April 13 and a large crowd gathered for a tour of the new kitchen and thr ceremonial ribbon cutting. The 19th Hole will soon be returning to the full menu and they'll have the summer to work out the kinks before the larger crowds return this fall. We appreciate the time and effort made by the Barefoot Bay Recreation District (and their contractors) and the patience of the residents and golfers, while the 19th hole offered nothing but hot dogs, candy bars and alcohol after a long, hot day on the golf course.

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


